

BARBADOS: The Britannia Shillings

This presentation highlights details pertaining to the Britannia shilling stamps of Barbados. It contains material prepared by both Perkins Bacon and De La Rue.

Item 1: Die Proof printed on card.



The 1/-. denomination was issued for the compulsory pre-payment of the double packet charge to England. The first consignment consisted of stamps printed in both brown-black and black shades.

The 1/-. die was made via a roller transfer taken from the undenominated die. Both the die and printing plate were manufactured in September, 1858.

Item 2: 1/-. Brown-black



A nicely used block of six: the largest recorded

Item 3: 1/-. Black on cover

Effective April 1, 1863, the packet rate to the United Kingdom was increased to 1/-. per 2 oz. letter.



Cover addressed to England dated May 9, 1863, and franked with a corner copy of the 1/-. Black. Assessed 1/-. 2 oz. letter.

Item 4: 1/-. Printed in Blue

The first perforated consignment of the 1/-. denomination was erroneously printed in blue, the colour of the (1d.).



Incredibly, this blunder was not discovered until the stamps arrived in Barbados. Most of the consignment was destroyed -- about 15 examples survived.

Item 5: 1/-. Brown-black (1863)



The first consignment of perforated 1/-. stamps was invoiced in late 1863.

Nice unused block of fifteen shown above.

Item 6: 1/-. Black (Imperf. between horizontal pair)



This is a particularly elusive variety with only five pairs and a block of four recorded. The variety probably arose from one vertical set of pairs in a single sheet.

Item 7: 1/-. Black (Imperf. block of four)





This is a recent discovery. The perforation marks can be clearly seen but the block is imperforate and is printed on unwatermarked paper. Trial? The perforation marks were added in April, 1863.

Item 8: 1/-. Black (1870)



In 1870, Perkins Bacon first used star watermarked paper to prepare Barbados stamps.

A nice unused block above.

Item 9; 1/-. Black (1871 bootheel cancel)



A different numeral cancel was allocated to each of eleven parishes.

St. Lucy cancels used #11, as shown above. One other St. Lucy cover is recorded.

Item 10: 1/-. Black (1873)



This was the last printing of the 1/-. denomination by Perkins Bacon.

Unused block of 12 -- the second largest recorded.

Item 11: 1/-. Violet (Aniline) (1876)



The first Perf. 14 De La Rue printing of the 1/-. denomination was printed in aniline ink. It is a rather elusive stamp in unused condition -about a dozen copies have been recorded.

Item 12: 1/-. Dull Mauve

Dull mauve was the last De La Rue printing of the 1/-. Value, the one that brought the Britannia shilling saga to an end. Only one plate was ever used in preparing 638,310 stamps over a 23-year period.



The larger of two recorded blocks is shown above. The multiple is printed in a redder shade than is usually found.
