Bermuda issued stamps on 28 September 1865 in the values of 1d, 6d and 1s. These were followed by the 3d in 1873 and the 2d in 1877

DIE PROOF



Very few full die proofs exist of the 1d, 6d and 1s values; and only 3 cut down copies of the 2d are known

PLATE PROOF



Plate proofs exist for all values EXCEPT the 1d stamp. Therefore, there is a debate whether the one penny imperforate is a true variety as it is known both used and unused; or the colour trial for that was sent to Bermuda and used examples are from these.

Most of these are locally applied, however the vertical specimen in red is believed to be ex DLR archieves.




ESSAYS

There was a need for a 5d value for double rate and supplemental rate mail to the United States, therefore, on October 22, 1896 the Colonial Secretary requested the printers De La Rue & Co and the Crown Agents to prepare a 5d value in a new design. De La Rue prepared two essays using the central design of the great seal of Bermuda. This design was taken from woodcuts provided by the Crown Agents. The second essay was approved on August 8, 1901 and De La Rue was instructed to prepare plates for 1d stamps and ¹/₄ d newspaper wrappers. On December 19, 1901, it was decided to use this design for other values as and when required.




