
1 BRIEF INTRODUCTION TO CANADA'S C-FORCE IN HONG KONG

TRANSPORT TO HONG KONG

- Canada sent 2 battalions to help in the defense of Hong Kong (HK) just before the Japanese Invasion of HK on Dec 8th, 1941.
- These were the Winnipeg Grenadiers (WG) and the Royal Rifles of Canada (RRC).
- 1,975 men of all ranks set sail on TSS Awatea and HMCS Prince Robert (150 men only) from Vancouver on Oct 27th, 1941 and made brief stops in Honolulu, Hawaii on Nov 2nd and Manila, Philippines on Nov 15th, reaching HK on Nov 16th.



Early cover sent only 18 days after their arrival in Jamaica. Sender was not required to put his name on the cover. This would soon change. Censor's signature cannot be deciphered.

Sent by Private <mark>Stanley Delbert Symes</mark>, H6928, C Company, WG, from Kingston, Jamaica, 1940 OC?

Censored by Major Kenneth George Baird, who was captured in Sham Shui Po, interned at North Point, Camp H and transferred to Sham Shui Po, Camp S, until liberation. He passed away in March 1990.

In HK he was interned at all 3 camps that were recorded to have held Canadian POWs, i.e. North Point Camp H, Sham Shui Po Camp S and Argyle Camp N. He passed away in May 1997.

Major George Trist reported on the receipt of the censor stamp (marking) and also trouble with Jamaica Customs on duties on importing Cigarettes from home (underlined in red). Capt Ian C Morgan 5477 Earncliffe Ave Montreal P.Q.

Dear Sir;-

Your letter of the 30-11-40 received to-day and I have posted the envelopes enclosed as requested and I hope they reach you and your friends in good order.


The censor stamp which was issued to me in Bermuda was # 39 and except for the difference in the number is exactly the same as the one used by the Command paymaster there. There was no unit name on it and it has no doubt been reissued to the officer commanding the troops who relieved me there.

It is still extremely hot here and one can hardly believe it is so near Christmas, The thermometer goes to around 85 to 90 degrees during the day time and it is not much cooler at maght, And we often wish we could have some of the winter weather you are no doubt getting at this time dr year.

You mention having sent me some cigarettes, They have not arrived yet but this is not unusual as the parcel mail here is very irregular and they will no doubt be delivered within the next week or so, And I am just as well pleased that they were held up as we have only just managed after several months fight to get the local government to admit parcels to the troops free of duty. Previously the duty paid on parcels was very heavy and in the case of cigarettes about twice what they origanally gost at home. Any way I wish to thank you very much for your kindness but it was altogether un-called-for as the posting of a few letters for you was no trouble at all.

I trust that on my return to Canada I shall have the pleasure of making your personal acquaintence, and in the mean time wish you all the best for Christmas and the new year.


Nov 28th, sent 12 days after arrival in HK. Censored by Major K.G. Baird WG. Written by Private Alfred Stanley Johnson WG at Battalion HQ company, who received a MiD (Mention-in-Dispatches) decoration. <u>Besides the 2 battalions sent, there was also an HQ company sent to HK.</u>

ARRIVAL IN HK (2)

Censored by Leonard B. Corrigan WG, Nov 28th. He was wounded in action Dec 24th, with MiD decoration.



Sent by Private William Alexander Kellas, H6903, D Company, WG. MIA Dec 21st, 2 days after Major Gresham and Master Sergeant Osborne VC was killed. He was last seen around Jardine's Lookout. Arrival CDS Bury, Quebec 1942 Jan 10th. 2 weeks after the capitulation of HK



IV) DETAINED IN HK (1) FROM DEC 1941 TO SEPT 1945

Dec 7th 10:30 AM, Censored by Lieutenant Hugh James Young, B-Company, (HKVCA website) 12th Platoon Commander, KIA on Dec 21, 1941. Sent by Private George Ernest Smith, H6910, B-Company, WG. As POW in Sept. 1943 was sent to Japan to work at a nickel mine and refinery. He passed away in January 1966.

Dec 8th at 12:30 PM, invasion already started at 8 AM.

Censored by Second Lieutenant John Elphinstone Park, B-Company, Platoon Commander. Sent by Lance Corporal George Montroy, H6181, C-Company, WG. Wounded in Action Xmas Day. As POW, in Sept. 1943 was sent to Japan to work in a nickel mine and refinery. He passed away in October 1987.




V) UNDELIVERABLE MAIL FROM CANADA TO HK

The large red "S" marked denotes Camp S, Sham Shui Po Camp, where about 7000 British Army & Navy were held with 100 US servicemen. Canadian POWs were moved to this camp from Sept 1942 and many were interned there until liberation. The blue box is "HK POW camp censor" marking and the small oval "chop" is the family name of the censor. Both censored by Niimori 新森.

HOW WERE THESE LETTERS MOST LIKELY TRANSFERRED FROM/TO HK?

2 exchanges were made, both carrying mail and civilian detainees from both sides



MAIL FROM POW IN HK

Sent by Rifleman **Douglas John Martin**, E39302, D Company, 18th Platoon, RR, recorded as wounded-in-action. He was interned in HK until repatriation. He passed away in October 1998. Sent by Major John Neilson Brown CRAWFORD, dateline 1944 Dec 17th. A member of the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps, he was appointed to HKVDC ambulance reporting to Brigade HQ and assigned to WG. He headed the medical facility while as a POW. He was awarded the MBE. He passed away in June 1997.



The use of a POW imprinted envelope, rather than a POW imprinted postcard, is very rare. The British censor label on the left is covering the Japanese censor marking below.

The Japanese had Crawford make a recording on POW life in HK in November 1942. This was broadcast over Radio Tokyo. About 15 people in the Western States picked it up on short wave. They eventually relayed the message to Crawford's wife. (Ellison, *Force C*, pg. 85)



MAIL TO POW IN HK/JAPAN

Sent from Winnipeg 1942 Mar 22nd with Ottawa transit May 25th, addressed to Private **Campbell William John Rutherford**, H6902, D Company, WG. He passed away in September 1989. Sent from Brighton, ON 1942 July 28th, addressed to Rifleman William Harvey Gagne, C40614, RR. He was moved to Japan in Sept 1943 to Port of Niigata as a labourer moving foodstuff, mining coal in Rinko and as a labourer at a foundry in Shintesta, until liberation. He passed away in June 1996.



Barely visible is: Received 1943 March 20th in blue pencil on back. Rare to record a notation of arrival date on POW mail.

The date stamp is Showa 18th year (1943) Oct 17th. Rare to record an arrival date on POW mail. Very rare if it was a marking.



4 THE DOWLING CORRESPONDENCE

Signalman Lawrence Fredrick Dowling B32015, Brigade HQ, Royal Canadian Corps of Signals (RCCS)

The first 2 Canadian casualties of WWII were 2 Royal Canadian Corps of Signals stationed at Sham Shui Po during the first attack. This was the same unit and location where Dowling was posted!

Record only showed he was interned at Sham Shui Po, Camp S, from Sept 1942 till liberation. It did not show whether he was interned at North Point, Camp H, before Sept 1942. (HKVCA website)

With item 4 in this correspondence, we can now add to the knowledge that he was indeed interned at North Point, Camp H before Sept 1942, as there were directing instructions to deliver to Camp H.

Dowling belonged to this very small HQ force, which was the third component dispatched to Hong Kong. They were often forgotten and overshadowed by their much bigger cousins, The Winnipeg Grenadiers and Royal Rifles of Canada.



Item 1: Sent from St. Catharines, ON 1942 May 1st. By the time it reached Dowling in 1943 June 28th, he was already interned at Camp S. Censored by Niimori 新森.

Thanks to Mark Bailey, whom within hours of seeing these covers, researched and proved that BR stands for Bowen Road Hospital. He was able to substantiate from interview notes with Leslie Malcolm Canivet (Royal Canadian Ordnance Corps), Dowling's buddy, that Dowling was indeed at Bowen Road Hospital. **Item 2:** Sent from Toronto, ON 1942 Sept 8th written by his aunt, directed to Camp S and received 1944 Oct 22nd. Censored by Matsuda 松田. The BR in red has been crossed out and S added.

This item had relatively similar originating and receiving dates when compared to the previous item, even though this had no endorsement to be shipped by SS Gripsholm. 5845 seemed to be a POW number put on in HK. Item 4: Sent from St. Catharines ON 1944 Jan 28th written by his mother, directed to Camp S and received 1945 Jan 28th. Censored by Hasegawa 長谷川.



With Mark Bailey's research, now we know that Dowling moved from Bowen Road Hospital to North Point (Camp H), and when that closed he was moved to Sham Shui Po Camp.

NOTICE TO ALLIED PRISONERS OF WAR AND CIVILIAN INTERNEES

The Japanese Government has accepted the Allied peace terms set forth in the Potsdaw Declaration. Final negotistions are being concluded.

An official representative is on his way for humanitarian purposes and liaison with this headquarters. He will be an initial, pre-Allied occupation representative in the interest of welfare needs and general conditions in the area or camp to which he is sent.

He will coordinate with the Red Cross and Japanese Military and Government, all plans to assure the security of the personnel concerned, to take emergency action to properly house, feed, clothe and furnish medical assistance to such personnel, and to assist in maintaining order in camps awaiting occupational forces.

He will <u>not</u> have authority to act for the Allied Forces in the rendering of any decisions, military, civil or otherwise. Until such time as allied occupational forces arrive to accept the surrender of Japanese military forces, those military forces are responsible for all such control and decisions in conformity with the terms of surrender and the dictates of the Supreme Allied Command.

I am sure that you were greatly relieved when you received word that your son, ESO470 Afr. Lester, Wilbert was officially listed as a prisoner of war. The suspense of all these long months has been trying on everyone who had a dear one at Hong Kong, and I know you will now wish information as to what is being done regarding the forwarding of mail and parcels.

Unfortunately, up to the present the Japanese have not permitted the forwarding of parcels except on the diplomatic exchange vessels, and the steamer GRIPSHOIM which was scheduled to leave some time ago on its second trip is still waiting in New York, but as soon as arrangements with the Japanese for the exchange of personnel are completed, the steamer will sail. All mail that has been received at the Post Office in Ottawa will go forward on the GRIPSHOIM and in addition the Canadian Red Cross are sending food percels, and the Canadian Government, through the Red Cross, have shipped medicines, tobacco and cigarettes, winter and summer uniforms and warm clothing, as well as boots and blankets.

We believe that this will all reach Hong Kong before the winter weather sets in there.

As the GRIPSHOIM on its present trip is entirely loaded with all the above items, there is no space for additional packages, but you can be assured that as soon as an opportunity offers for shipment of next-of-kin parcels you will be notified and a label will be sent to you so that you can forward a parcel.

You may continue to send mail addressed as follows, and it will be forwarded via Russia until the opportunity offers to forward it by steamer direct.

Prisoner of War Post Base Post Office, Ottawa. Postage Free

Lester became a POW after the capitulation of Hong Kong. His father was notified about the Fall of Hong Kong by the letter in this cover dated **1942 January 7**. At the time, the fate of Lester was unknown. The letter had since been lost.

A follow-up letter dated **1942 October 31** from Royal Rifles of Canada to Lester's father. It took that long to confirm Lester was still alive and had became interned as a POW.

It also told of Gripsholm's second trip to exchange personnel with all mail addressed to the POWs that were already sent to Ottawa.
