PREFACE.

In presenting the first "Gazetteer of British Guiana" to the public, the "Daily Chronicle" does so in the hope that, to some extent at least, it will assist in tearing aside the veil of ignorance which covers their own country that is such a peculiar characteristic of the Guianese.

It is an undoubted fact that the average local school child knows more about the countries, towns, rivers and mountains of Great Britain than it does of those of the country of its birth, whilst, judging from news paragraphs concerning the interior appearing in the Press, Guianese adults are in little better plight. Take a hundred average men in the street and ask them what and where Dadanawa is. Perhaps twenty may say it is a place somewhere in Rupununi, but it will be surprising if one out of the hundred could say whereabouts it is on that 270 mile long stream and that it is the home ranch of the Rupununi Development Company, Ltd., the largest ranching establishment in the Colony.

Unlike the usual form of gazetteer this does not indicate place positions by their latitude and longitude, but by their distance from known fixed points. The reason for this is that, owing to the absence of accurate surveys available it is not possible to give precisely correct co-ordinates, and because, to the average man, the statement that Kaieteur lies fifty-two miles up the Potaro River is more rapidly understandable than one which states it to be in Lat. $5^{\circ} 10'$ North and Long. $59^{\circ} 30'$ West. As an example:—

"AWENDAPARU—Ck., R.B. Kartuni River (Puruni River—Mazaruni River) 2 miles up" means that Awendaparu is a creek on the right bank of the Kartuni River, 2 miles up from its mouth, the Kartuni being a tributary of the Puruni River, itself a tributary of the Mazaruni River.

L.B. and R.B. indicate respectively the left and right banks of a river *when facing down stream*.

The official local definition of a river is any stream approximating 10 miles or more in length.

The sketch map shows the key points from which the 3,000 places mentioned are described.

The boundary of the Colony of British Guiana commences at high water mark at the mouth of the Courtenyne River which, by International Commission, has been fixed at Plantation No. 61, Courtenyne Coast, 39 miles from New Amsterdam and extends thence up the left bank of the Courtenyne River, at high water mark, to its source, thence along the watershed between the Rivers Courtenyne and Amazon to the source of the Essequibo River, thence along the watershed of the Rivers Essequibo and Branco to the source of the Takutu River, thence along the thalweg of the Takutu River to the mouth of the Ireng River, thence up the thalweg of the Ireng River to its source, thence along the watershed of the Rivers Branco and Essequibo to the summit of Mount Roraima, thence in a straight line to the source of the Wenamu River, thence down the midstream of the Wenamu River to the Cuyuni River, thence down the thalweg of the Cuyuni River to the mouth of the Akarabisi River, thence up the midstream of the Akarabisi River to its source, thence along the watershed of the Barama and Cuyuni Rivers, Barama and Cuyuni Rivers and Barima and Aguirre Rivers to the source of the Amakura River, thence down the midstream of the Amakura River to the mouth of the Haiowa Creek thence in a straight line to the source of the Muruma Creek, thence down the midstream of the Muruma Creek to its mouth, thence in a straight line to the coast at Punta Playa.

Note :—The thalweg of a river is its deepest channel and is not necessarily the midstream.

BRITISH GUIANA POSTAL GUIDE.

SECTION I.—GENERAL.

BUSINESS HOURS OF THE POST OFFICE.

1.—General Business Hours.—The hours during which the General Post Office, Georgetown, and the Post Office at New Amsterdam, are open to the public for the transaction of business are as given below:—

Week days.

For sale of Stamps, Postal Orders, Post-cards, &c., from 6 a.m. to 5.30 p.m.
 „ issue and Payment of Money Order, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.
 „ do. do. Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.
 „ registration of letters ... from 6 a.m. to 5.30 p.m.
 „ despatch of Telegrams ... from 6.30 a.m. to 5.30 p.m.

Sundays.

New Amsterdam Office { from 8 a.m. to 9 a.m.
 { and 4 p.m. to 5 p.m.

The following are the hours fixed generally for business at District Post Offices:—

Sundays and Public Holidays.

For the sale of Stamps, registration of letters and telegraph business—8 a.m. to 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. to 5 p.m.

Week days.

For ordinary Postal and Telegraph business ... 6.30 a.m. to 5.30 p.m.
 „ the sale of Postal Orders ... 6.30 a.m. to 5.30 p.m.
 „ Money Order business ... 6.30 a.m. to 4 p.m.
 „ Savings Bank business ... 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

These two last-mentioned classes of business are suspended during the half hour immediately preceding the despatch, and following the receipt of Mails.

DELIVERIES.

2.—Definition of Delivery.—The delivery of a Postal packet at the house or office of the person to whom the packet is addressed, or to him or to his servant or other person authorized to receive the packet according to the usual manner of delivering that person's letters, is a delivery to the person addressed.

3.—Town House-to-House.—On week days there are three house-to-house deliveries in Georgetown, viz., at 7 a.m. the whole city; 11 a.m. the whole city; 4 p.m. the whole city, except Albouystown, Lodge and Wortmanville. At New Amsterdam there are three house-to-house week-day deliveries, 7 a.m. 11.30 a.m. and 2.45 p.m., and deliveries as far as Kendalls, East Coast, on Mondays, and Thursdays, and at Sandvoort on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays.

4.—Country House-to-House.—There are house-to-house deliveries within certain limits in the following Postal Districts, viz., Skeldon, Port Wellington, Mahaicony, Mahaica, Belfield, Enmore, Buxton, Beterverwagting, Plaisance, Grove, Bagotville, Vreed-en-hoop, Fellowship, Leonora, Tuschen, Taymouth Manor, Anna Regina, Danielstown, Bartica, Whim, Sisters, Wales, Nigg, Kitty, Aurora, Ann's Grove, Suddie, Reliance, Blairmont, Weldaad, Albuoystown, Agricola, Providence, Met-en-Meerzorg, Leguan, Wakenaam.

5.—Prohibitions to Letter Carriers.—All letter carriers are prohibited from distributing any letters, newspapers, &c., except such as have passed through a Post Office, whether before beginning their rounds, whilst on their rounds, or after they have completed them. Nor are they allowed to receive any payment beyond the postage for the delivery or collection of any letter &c.; nor to deviate from the route laid down for them. The prohibition from receiving payment in addition to the postage does not, however, extend to *Christmas boxes*.

6.—Delivery at Window.—No person living within the town free delivery, unless he rent a private box, can claim to have his letters delivered at the office window if a delivery by letter carrier or a despatch by messenger is about to take place; but letters which arrive by a mail, after which there is immediate delivery by letter carrier, may be obtained by any person on application at the office window, so long as the office is open for delivery.

7.—Receiving Boxes.—To facilitate the delivery a letter-box should be affixed to every house door.

8.—Interception of Correspondence.—A fee of 12 cents is charged to every person requiring Inland Correspondence or Correspondence arriving by mail steamer, or both detained in Georgetown, and delivered either on application at the General Post Office or otherwise, or sent to an address other

than that to which it is directed. All applications must be made in writing, and applications will not be attended to until the fee is paid. The registration of Special Instructions as regards detention will remain in operation for such time as may be fixed in such instructions, and in the absence of any such fixture for a period of one month.

9.—Change of Residence.—Persons changing their residence should furnish the Post Office both at the place which they are leaving and at the place to which they are going, with written instructions regarding the disposal of postal articles (including telegrams and money orders) received to their address. The instructions must be simple and direct, and must state whether they are intended to apply to all postal articles, and whether the postal articles referred to are postal articles addressed to the person giving the instructions only, or also to members of his family or household. No fees are chargeable in respect of redirection to changes of address.

PRIVATE BAGS.

10.—Fee for Private Letter Bag.—Persons living in the country will find it advantageous to have Private Letter-bags. The fee for a Private Letter-bag is \$5 a year, payable in advance.

11.—Period for which rented.—A bag cannot be taken for a less period than one year. A period of one week after the commencement of each term is allowed for the payment of the rent, and if the rent be not then paid the arrangement is liable to termination.

12.—Bags to be provided.—Two bags must be provided by each person. The bags must be so constructed as to secure their contents from inspection, and must be furnished with a lock, one key of which must be handed to the Postmaster General. The name of the owner must be legibly painted on each bag.

13.—Plantation Bags.—In the case of a Letter-bag rented for the use of a Plantation the only persons who are entitled to receive their correspondence in it are the Managers, Overseers, and Employés; but letters addressed to the care of the Managers or Overseers will be enclosed in the Letter-bag.

14.—Prohibition.—Letters containing coins or valuables may not be transmitted in a private letter-bag. If discovered

they will be compulsorily registered and charged on delivery with a double registration fee.

15.—Delivery of Bags.—Private Letter-bags will be made up in Georgetown, New Amsterdam, on travelling offices and at other offices by arrangement, and will be sent to the Post Office nearest to the holder's residence or, if more convenient, dropped at any point along the route traversed by the Mails. A Private Letter-bag must invariably be returned every day to the office at which the bags are made up, whether there are letters to be sent or not.

16.—Mail will not wait.—In no case will a mail-coach or mail-boat wait for the arrival of the person sent to take the mail bag, and if the person sent is not at the appointed place at the time named for the passing of the mail, the bag will be taken and left at the next Post Office along the route. Similarly a mail waggon or mail-boat will not wait to take up mail bags.

PRIVATE BOXES.

17.—Applications for Private Boxes.—Any person desiring to have a private letter box assigned to him at any Post Office at which such boxes are provided must make application for the same in writing to the Postmaster General, who will allot such description of box as may be available and suitable to the requirements of the applicant. Where the applications exceed the number of boxes available the Postmaster General will allot the available boxes in such manner as may seem best to him. At Post Offices where Letter boxes are available and where there are house-to-house deliveries there are no counter-deliveries of letters except *poste restante* letters.

18.—Charges.—The charges for letter boxes are payable in advance, and are as follows:—

(a.) For a term exceeding six calendar months and not exceeding one year,—

For a box of No. 1 size	\$1 00
For a box of No. 2 size	1 50
For a box of No. 3 size	5 00
For a box of No. 4 size	6 00

(b.) For a term not exceeding six calendar months one half the above mentioned rates.

19.—Key Deposit.—A deposit of one shilling must be made by the renter on the delivery to him of a box key, and such sum will be returned to him when he surrenders such key uninjured.

20.—Restrictions.—No box can be assigned to more than one person except in the case of a Firm, Company, Corporation or Society.

21.—Deliveries.—Unless a renter gives notice to the contrary, all letters directed to him or to his care or to his address will be deposited in his box:

Registered and unpaid postal packets will not be placed in a box, but will be retained for delivery, and notice of such detention will be given to the box holder concerned, by means of a card placed in his box.

22.—Clearances.—Unless a renter gives notice in writing to the Postmaster General that he does not want his letters delivered by Letter Carrier, his box will be cleared when the Letter Carriers go out on their rounds of delivery.

23.—Damages.—Any injury or damage to a box arising through the willful act of a renter or his agent will be made good by the Postmaster General at the expense of the renter, who must on demand, repay to the Postmaster General the cost thereof.

EXPRESS.

24.—Delivering Offices.—In Georgetown and at New Amsterdam, and at every postal telegraph office, Inland letters and Parcels can be specially delivered immediately on arrival at the Post Office if desired by the sender. The sender must in such case indicate on the Article by the words "Express Delivery" that it is intended for special delivery.

25.—Articles to be Specially marked.—Letters and other ordinary postal matter intended for express delivery from the Post Office of destination, may be posted in the ordinary manner, but shall be clearly marked for such express delivery as set forth in the preceding regulation, and shall also have a thick perpendicular line drawn on each side of the envelope. Parcels must be similarly marked and must be handed in over the counter of a Post Office.

26.—Fees.—The fees for such delivery must be prepaid in stamps affixed to the Article and are, as follows:—

For a letter or other ordinary or registered Postal matter:—

For every mile or part of a mile from the office of delivery... .. 6 cents.

For a parcel not exceeding 1 lb. in weight—

For every mile or part of a mile .. 6 cents.

For a parcel over 1 lb. in weight—

For every mile or part of a mile ... 6 cents.

For every lb. or part of a lb. beyond the first lb. ... 3 cents.

27.—Only one attempt made.—Only one attempt will be made to deliver an express packet by special messenger. After a fruitless attempt such packet is treated as an ordinary packet.

28.—Postal Matter from certain places abroad. Arrangements have been made also for the express delivery of Postal Matter received from places abroad enumerated in the section of this Guide which relates to Foreign Mails.

MAILS.

29.—Definition of Mail.—"Mail" includes every conveyance by which postal packets are carried, whether it be a Carriage, Coach, Cart, Horse, Vessel or any other conveyance, and also a person employed in conveying or delivering postal packets.

30.—Mails are made up—for the different districts as follows:—

32.—Stamps available to the Public at Post Offices.—Postage Stamps of all denominations are sold at all Post Offices. Revenue Stamps Value \$4.80, \$12, may also be purchased at the General Post Office.

33.—Post Cards in use.—

Inland Post Cards (for circulation between Post Offices of British Guiana only)—each...	... 1 cent.
Foreign Single (for transmission to countries of the Postal Union only)—each 2 cents.

34.—Registered Letter Envelopes bearing a 4 cents stamp embossed in blue on the flap, for payment of the registration fee, each ... 5 cents.

35.—Newspaper Wrappers are sold at the following Prices:—

Bearing a 1 cent stamp (green), each 1 cent.
Bearing a 2 cents stamp (red), each 2 cents.

These Wrappers may be used only for Newspapers, or for such documents as are allowed to be sent at Book-rate of postage, and must not enclose any letter or communication of the nature of a letter (whether separate or otherwise).

36.—Postage Envelopes.—Are sold at the following prices:—Bearing 1 cent stamp (green) stout paper at face value. Bearing 2 cents stamp (red) stout paper, 10 for 21 cents. Bearing 5 cents stamp (blue) thin paper 10 for 51 cents, or in smaller quantities at 1 cent over face value.

37.—Spoilt or Defaced Stamps not to be used.—Postage Stamps which have been obliterated by the Post Office,

or which are defaced, torn, cut, or otherwise rendered imperfect, cannot be used for the payment of postage. The using, for the payment of postage, of a stamp that has once passed through the post, with intent to cause loss to the Government, is an offence punishable by a penalty not exceeding \$50 or 3 months' imprisonment with hard labour.

MISCELLANEOUS REGULATIONS AND SUGGESTIONS.

38.—Post Office Monopoly.—The exclusive privilege of conveying letters from one place to another within the Colony, is vested by law in the Postmaster General and every person who without authority performs services not excepted by the law from the exclusive privilege of the Postmaster General renders himself liable to the penalties therein provided for.

39.—Packets Detained for Customs Duties.—Letters and packets received from abroad, if supposed to contain articles liable to Customs duty, are detained for examination. The letters or packets must then be opened by the addressee (or some other person appointed by him) in the presence of an Officer of the Department, and any duty which may be due must be paid by the addressee before the letter or packet can be delivered. The printed notice which is sent to the addressee intimating the detention of the packet must be presented at the examining office when the packet is claimed.

40.—Unpaid and insufficiently paid Letters.—Letters posted without prepayment will be charged double postage on delivery, and when only partially prepaid, will be charged on delivery a sum equal to double the deficiency.

41.—Where Postage Stamps are to be placed.—Postage Stamps should be placed on the front, that is on the address side and in the right hand upper corner. On re-directed letters care should be taken not to place fresh postage stamps over those which have been previously used.

42.—Addresses should be legible and complete.—The addresses of all Inland Letters and other Postal Articles must be written in some European language, and should be legible and complete. The name of the Post Office in the delivery of which the address is situated, must invariably be given as part of the address. When not inserted there is great liability to non-delivery and delay.

43.—Letters should contain full Address of writer.—Every letter should contain the full address of the writer, in order to ensure its return if the person to whom it is directed cannot be found.

44.—Responsibility of Post Office.—The Post Office is not responsible for any loss or inconvenience which may arise from the non-delivery, mis-sending or mis-delivery of any letter, book, or other postal packet (even if the packet be registered), nor is the Post Office responsible for any injury which a packet may sustain during its transmission.

45.—Packets should be well guarded.—To guard against injury all postal packets which are likely to suffer from stamping or from great pressure should be placed in strong covers; and even with this precaution no fragile should be sent through the Post.

46.—Services which cannot be required of Postmasters.—Information respecting letters which pass through a Post Office, except to the persons to whom they are addressed. District Postmasters are not permitted to correspond with the public on official matters; Postmasters are not allowed to return any letter or other packet, or to delay forwarding it to its destination according to the address; Postmasters are not bound to accept cheques or to give change; Postmasters, and Postmen are forbidden to deliver any article on which postage is due without receiving immediate payment of the amount of Postage marked upon it, or to deliver any registered article or any parcel without obtaining the signature by the addressee on the receipt and acknowledgement.

47.—Articles on which Postage is due may be refused.—The addressee of an article is not bound to pay the postage due on it if he forthwith return it unopened. In which case he should write the word "refused" across the cover.

48.—If Articles accepted Postage due must be paid.—If any person take delivery of an article on which postage is due, he must pay the amount marked upon it, and any complaint of overcharge which he may have to make, will be heard subsequently by the Postmaster General.

49.—Remedy of Post Office in case of Refusal to Pay Postage due.—If a person who has taken the

delivery of any article on which postage is due, refuses to pay the amount marked as due, it will be recovered from him under the Post Office Ordinance.

50.—Complaints against the Post Office.—In cases of complaint of overcharge, or of delay in the delivery of any article, the cover or wrapper, with the Post Office marks upon it, should always be forwarded with the letter of complaint. In cases of complaint of the loss of any article sent by the person complaining, it is desirable that the actual posting of the article should be, if possible, established as the first step. In a large proportion of complaints it is found that articles entrusted to the messengers or servants were never posted, or were not posted at the time believed, or that the posting is altogether uncertain. Letters containing complaints against the Post Office need not be stamped, provided that they are addressed to the Postmaster General. Complaints cannot be attended to unless preferred within six months of the date of the occurrence to which they relate.

51.—Signs of injury.—Where a letter when delivered bears signs of injury, the addressee should call attention to the fact of such injury at the time of delivery and if possible open the letter in the presence of an Officer of the Post Office. The cover should be forward to the Postmaster General with information as to the parties in whose presence it was opened.

52.—Caution as to sending Coin, &c. by Post.—Neither money nor any other article of considerable value ought to be sent through the Post, except by means of a money order or in a registered packet. Any person who sends money or jewellery unregistered not only runs a risk of losing his property, but exposes to temptation everyone through whose hands the article passes, and may be the means of ultimately bringing some Post Office servant to ruin. The Government considers itself relieved of responsibility to make enquiry in respect to the loss of unregistered packets containing money or other valuables.

53.—Exceptional Detention of Postal Packets, other than Letters.—The Postmaster General has power to delay the despatch or delivery of Book Packets, Post Cards, Patterns and Samples, and Parcels, when it is necessary to do so in order to secure the due despatch of the letter mails. He is also empowered to delay parcels when he considers it expedient for the safety and protection of parcel mails do so.

SECTION II.—INLAND POST.

LETTERS.

1.—**Definition of term "Inland."**—"Inland," means posted within the Colony and addressed to some place in the Colony, and when used in relation to post or postage means the post carrying or the postage charged on the packet.

2.—**The Postage on Letters is as follows:—**

For a Letter not exceeding 1 oz. ... 2 cents.
 " " above 1 oz. but not exceeding 2 ozs. ... 3 cents.
 " " above 2 ozs. but not exceeding 4 ozs. ... 4 cents.
 and at the rate of 1 cent for every additional 2 ozs. up to 2 lbs.

Letters not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. in weight posted in Georgetown for delivery in Georgetown, or in New Amsterdam for delivery in New Amsterdam, or in any Postal District for delivery within the same postal district, can be sent for a pre-paid postage of ... 1 cent.

For Letters exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. in weight the rate is the same as for letters to other parts of the colony.

2.—**Conditions as to Size and Weight.**—No letter unless it be sent by the Governor or to or from one of the Government Offices may exceed 2 lbs. in weight; nor be more than 18 inches in length, or 9 inches in width and depth.

POST CARDS.

4.—**Official Cards.**—Official Post Cards impressed with a one cent stamp may be obtained at any Post Office in the Colony and are available for transmission between places within the Colony.

5.—**Attachments disallowed.**—Nothing whatever may be attached except adhesive stamps in payment of additional postage, or stamp duty, and a gummed label (not to exceed two inches long and $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide) bearing the address at which the card is to be delivered.

6.—**Size may not be altered.**—A Post Card may not be folded, nor may it be cut or altered in such a way as to reduce the size below $5\frac{1}{2}$ by $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches. The Postage stamp also must be left intact.

INLAND POST.

7.—**Penalty for infringement of Rules.**—If any of the foregoing rules be infringed the card will be treated as a letter and will be liable on delivery to the usual charges as the same.

8.—**Private Cards.**—Private cards prepaid one cent may also be used as Post Cards. If composed of ordinary card board they must not be thicker than the material used for the Official Post Card. The maximum size must correspond as nearly as possible to the size of the Inland Official card.

9.—**Rules apply to Private Cards.**—The preceding Rules whenever so applicable apply to private Post Cards.

10.—**Unpaid Cards.**—A private Post Card posted unpaid will be chargeable with double postage.

NEWSPAPERS.

11.—**Newspaper Rate.**—The inland postage on Newspapers is 1 cent for each newspaper posted in the colony. Newspapers when made up in packets of two or more, may be forwarded at the rate chargeable for Book-packets. These rates are also applicable to newspapers forwarded to Canada, by mutual agreement.

12.—**Prepayment.**—The postage must be prepaid either by an adhesive stamp or by the use of a stamped wrapper.

13.—**Covers must be open at ends.**—Every newspaper or packet of newspapers must be posted either without cover, or in a cover open at both ends, so as to admit of easy removal for examination. The cover must not be fastened by means of gum, sealing-wax, postage stamps or otherwise. If this rule is infringed the newspaper is liable to be treated as a letter. It is recommended that the addresses be written on exposed parts of the newspapers (themselves, as well as on the covers).

14.—**Conditions as to size and weight.**—A packet of newspapers must not exceed two lbs. in weight, two feet in length and one foot in width and depth.

15.—**Penalty for breach of conditions.**—A newspaper, which contains any enclosure (except supplements) will be charged as a letter unless the enclosure be such as may be sent at the rate for book-packets, and the entire packet be fully

prepaid at that rate. A newspaper which has any letter or any communication of the nature of a letter, written in it, or upon its cover, will be charged on delivery as an insufficiently paid letter.

CIRCULARS AND PRICES CURRENT.

16.—Postage on Circulars and Prices Current.—1 cent for each article. Circulars are letters which from internal evidence appear to be intended for transmission in identical terms to several persons, and the whole or the greater part of which is produced by means of ordinary type, engraving, lithography, or other mechanical process. Answers to Circulars and Orders for the supply of Newspapers or Magazines are admitted at the Circular rate of postage.

17.—Conditions as to Packing.—Circulars should be entirely open at the ends or sides, as for the purpose of inspection a corner of the cover cut off is not sufficient. And if sent without covers they must not be fastened by means of gum, wafers, seals, &c. Paper fasteners or string may be used. When posted in a cover, which, from any cause, cannot be readily removed, they are closed for inspection and will be treated as letters.

18.—Posting in Bulk.—When Circulars and Prices Current are posted in large numbers it is desirable, in order to facilitate their despatch, that they should be tied in bundles with the addresses all in one direction, and handed over the counter instead of being placed in the letter-box.

19.—May be sent by Book-post.—Circulars and Prices Current may be made up in packets and forwarded at the rate chargeable for book-packets.

BOOK PACKETS.

20.—Postage on Book-packets.—For a packet not exceeding 4 oz. ... 1 cent.

For each additional 4 ozs. ... 2 cents.

These rates are also applicable to book-packets forwarded to Canada, by mutual agreement.

21.—What a Book-packet may contain.—A Book-packet may contain:—

(a)—Newspapers and publications of all kinds.

(b)—Books, whether blank or printed; engravings, photographs, drawings, plans, maps, printed music, and proof sheets, with or without the manuscript relating thereto.

(c)—And quantity of blank paper, parchment, or card-board.

(d)—And generally anything printed, engraved, lithographed or papyrographed, on paper, parchment or card-board.

(e)—Bills of account whether sent for payment or returned after payment with a receipt, provided they contain no other communication to the person to whom they are addressed.

(f)—Business papers, written or drawn wholly or partly by hand, not being of the nature of a letter or having the character of a personal communication, such as deeds, bills of lading, invoices, accounts, &c.

(g)—Manuscripts of all kinds, including manuscript music, not being of the nature of personal correspondence. Manuscript sent to a newspaper for publication, may also be sent as a book packet, even when it has the form and character of personal correspondence.

With the above articles may be sent any legitimate binding, mounting or covering, loose or attached, and anything that ordinarily appertains to such articles, as pen and pencils in the case of a pocket book, photographs in the case of a photograph book, card plates in the case of visiting cards, &c. But no written communication of the nature of a letter, or having the character of a personal communication, may be enclosed with these articles, or written upon them. This, however, does not exclude inscriptions or entries stating who the sending is or to whom the articles are to be given.

With any of the above-mentioned articles may be sent anything that is necessary for their safe transmission through the post, such as rollers, &c.

22.—Conditions as to Packing.—A Book-packet may be posted either without a cover (in which case it must not be fastened by means of gum, wafer, sealing-wax, postage stamp or otherwise) or in a cover entirely open at both ends, so as to admit of the contents being easily withdrawn for examination,

The privilege of transmission at the low rate of postage applicable to book-post is forfeited by any packet the contents of which are in any way fastened into the cover, or the cover of which cannot from any cause be withdrawn without difficulty. A Book packet may however be tied at the ends with string or may be secured by paper fasteners.

23.—Conditions as to Size and Weight.—No book-packet may exceed 2 lbs. in weight nor be above 18 inches in length and 9 inches in width and depth.

24.—To secure Return if not delivered.—In order to secure the return of book-packets which cannot be delivered the names and addresses of the senders should be printed or written outside, thus: "From..... To....."

PARCELS.

25.—Parcels up to 11 lbs. weight.—Parcels are received and transmitted by Post between any of the Post Offices hereinafter mentioned in Class A. up to a limit of 11 pounds weight.

27.—Maximum Dimensions, Class A.—Parcels forwarded to Post Offices of Class A shall not exceed in length three feet six inches, or in length and girth measured together, six feet, such girth being measured round the thickest part of each parcel.

28.—Maximum Dimensions, Class B.—Parcels forwarded to any Post Office in Class B. shall not exceed in length two feet, or in length and girth measured together, three feet, such girth being measured round the thickest part of each parcel.

29.—Rates of Postage.—The postage on parcels transmitted by Inland Post is as follows:—

30.—Packing.—A parcel must be packed and enclosed in a reasonably strong case, wrapper, or cover, fastened in a manner calculated to preserve the contents from loss or damage in the Post, to prevent any tampering therewith and to protect other postal matter from being damaged thereby.

31.—Prepayment of Charges.—All charges, whether postage, re-direction or express delivery, on a parcel (including

service parcels) must be prepaid at the time of posting by means of postage stamps affixed to the parcel, or to an official label supplied free at the Post Office. The sender or his messenger must affix the stamps, Officers of the Postal Department being prohibited from doing this. Should a label be used, the sender should see that it is affixed before he leaves the Office.

32.—Mode of Posting.—In order that a packet may be sent by parcel post it must be presented at the counter of a Post Office for transmission as a *parcel* and must bear the words "Parcel Post" written conspicuously in the left hand top corner.

33.—Prohibitions and Restrictions.—The following articles are not permitted to be sent through the Post:—Fish, meat, and all articles of a perishable nature; glass bottles or glass in any form, unless enclosed in boxes or tins, or otherwise securely packed to prevent fracture; anything of a greasy or oily nature; live birds, animals and insects; bladders or other vessels containing liquids or semi-liquids such as jelly, paint, and varnish (these latter can however be sent in tins or cans securely fastened); gunpowder, matches, or anything of an explosive or inflammable nature; razors, scissors, knives, or other sharp instruments, unless they are packed and guarded in such a manner as to afford protection to the contents of the mail bag; and parcels which bear on the outside or contain within any writing, drawing, or thing of indecent or offensive nature.

34.—To secure return if not delivered.—In order to secure the return of a parcel which cannot be delivered, the name and address of the sender should be printed or written outside in the left hand bottom corner, where it may not be mistaken for the address of the parcel. The parcel will be subject to a fresh charge for postage if returned or sent to the sender to another address.

35.—Enclosure to another address prohibited.—A parcel must not contain a letter, packet, or parcel intended for delivery at an address other than that borne on the parcel itself: but there is no objection to an enclosure bearing the same address as the parcel itself.

36.—Parcels for North West.—Parcels intended for transmission by the weekly steamer to the North West

District must be handed in over the counter of the City Post Offices not later than the following hours:—

Cornhill Street 5.30 p.m. Mondays.
Bourda Post Office 5.30 p.m. Mondays.

Parcels received after the above-mentioned hours will be detained for despatch by the following Steamer. Parcels should be distinctly addressed, and to avoid errors in the Post Office, the address should state the District Office at which delivery is to be made. The Post Offices in the North West District are:—

Morawhanna, Barima River, (at Mora Passage.)
Arakaka, Barima River.

Baramanni, Waini River (junction with Baramanni River.)

Parcels for places on the Barama-Barima Road should be addressed to Arakaka Post Office.

REGISTRATION.

37.—Fee for Inland Registration.—The fee for registering a letter, newspaper, book-packet, or other article, passing through the post between any two places in the colony is 4 cents.

38.—Prohibitions.—No articles addressed to initials or to fictitious names can be registered. The prohibition, however, does not extend to articles addressed to the care of a person or firm.

39.—Conditions as to Enclosing.—Every article presented for registration must be enclosed in a strong cover, securely fastened. If money is to be sent, either in coin or postage stamps, it should be enclosed in a Registered Letter Envelope, sold by the Post Office at 5 cents each, and if coins are sent, they must be packed and enclosed in such a way as to move about as little as possible. Any officer to whom a postal packet is tendered for registration is instructed to refuse to register it if the packing thereof is in his opinion obviously such as to afford inadequate protection to the contents.

40.—Prepayment compulsory.—Registered articles must be fully prepaid as regards both postage and registration.

41.—Acknowledgments.—The Sender of a registered article may obtain an acknowledgment of its due receipt by the Addressee on payment of an extra fee of four cents at the time of registration.

42.—Manner of Registering.—Every article to be registered must be presented at the counter to an Agent of the Post Office, and a receipt obtained for it; and it should on no account be dropped into a letter box. If, contrary to this rule, an article marked "Registered" be dropped into a letter-box it will, if directed to any place in the colony, be charged on delivery a registration fee of eight cents, instead of the ordinary fee of 4 cents. Letters containing coin or valuables posted without registration, will be compulsorily registered and charged on delivery a registration fee of 8 cents.

43.—Object of Registering.—The registration of a packet makes its transmission much more secure, inasmuch as under ordinary circumstances a registered packet can be traced through its whole course. Thus the loss of a registered packet is a rare occurrence. Nevertheless large sums of money or other articles of great value should not be sent through the post, even if the packet be registered; as the machinery of the Department is not arranged with a view to such transmission. By law the giving of a receipt does not make the Post Office revenue liable for the loss of registered packets or their contents; though any officer who may neglect his duty will be called to strict account. Sent in unregistered packets valuable articles are exposed to risk, and offer a temptation which ought not to be created; and the department cannot in any way be responsible for the safe conveyance of such packets.

44.—Latest time for Registering.—Postal Packets can be registered at any time during the ordinary hours for business. When intended for despatch by a particular mail they should, as a rule, be presented for registration half an hour before the closing of the letter-box for that mail. At Georgetown on the despatch of the mails for Europe, articles bearing a late fee, in addition to the ordinary registration fee, may be registered at any time, within the time previously announced in public notice.

THINGS NOT TO BE SENT.

45.—Anything likely to Injure the Mail or Mail Officers.—Nothing which, either from its own nature or by reason of insecure packing, is liable to injure the contents of mail bags or harm the person of anyone engaged in postal service, may be sent by the Inland Post. Of this character are explosive substances, such as gunpowder, matches, percussion caps, and such substances as glass, liquids, oil, &c. In the use of parcels, however, the transmission of drugs or medicines in glass phials, securely packed in proper cases, is not prohibited.

46.—Lottery Matter.—No letter, circular, advertisement or ticket of or concerning any lottery, whether such lottery is conducted or held in or out of the Colony may be sent by post.

47.—Anything Indecent or Obscene.—No indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or any other indecent or obscene article may be sent; nor may any letter, post card, newspaper, packet, or parcel having on it any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, libellous, or grossly offensive nature.

FREE CORRESPONDENCE.

48.—Officers entitled to free Postage.—The following Public Officers and Heads of Departments are entitled to frank and to receive post free all Official Postal Matter sent or received by them through the Inland Post.

49.—Other free Correspondence.—The following postal matter may be sent free under the provisions of the laws relating thereto:—

Under *Coroners Ordinance*, No. 6 of 1887—All correspondence, papers and documents transmitted by or to the Attorney General, or by or to a Coroner relating to any matter dealt with under that Ordinance.

Under *Registration of births and deaths Ordinance*, No. 1 of 1868. All letters of persons giving written notices of birth or death to Registrar and Registrar's written acknowledgment of same. All letters and packets addressed to Registrar or Supt. Registrar, and all letters from General Register Office.

Under *Political Constitution Ordinance*, No. 9 of 1896—Writs sent by returning officers as registered letters.

Under *Savings Banks Regulations*, Ordinance No. 6 of 1889—All Declarations, Pass Books, Acknowledgments, Notice of Withdrawals, Warrants and all other documents and correspondence passing between the Savings Banks and any depositors in relation to the business of the Banks.

50.—How to deal with Articles improperly sent post free.—If any Postal Matter purporting to be on the Public Service forwarded to any of the Heads of Departments, of Public Officers, and Functionaries, is found not to be *bona fide* on the Public Service, it must without delay be sealed and returned to the Post Office to be dealt with in the same manner as unpaid Postal Matter, and the postage recovered from the sender.

51.—Heads of Department responsible.—Heads of Departments are not permitted to delegate the privilege of franking to any Clerk or other person in their Office, but a Head of Department may use an official stamp for the purpose, he being personally responsible that the privilege be not abused. The Postmaster General must be furnished with specimen impressions of all stamps before the same are brought into use.

52.—Conditions to be observed.—Each letter or packet sent free of postage from a Public Department under these Regulations must be posted in a cover bearing the name of the Department or the official title of the sender printed or legibly written in the bottom left hand corner, and the words "On His Majesty's Service" or the letters "O.H.M.S." on the top, and must be franked or stamped with the official stamp across the right hand top corner.

53.—Penalty in case of non-observance of conditions.—Official postal matter which does not comply with the requirements of these Regulations may be treated by the Postmaster General as ordinary postal matter and dealt with accordingly.

54.—Rules do not apply to Parcel Post.—The foregoing rules do not apply to parcels sent by Parcel Post. Articles forwarded "On Service" by Parcel Post must be prepaid by postage stamps, and are subject to the same regulations as Ordinary Parcels.

RETURNED LETTERS.

55.—Period of time letters are kept.—All letters, post cards, packets, newspapers and parcels, addressed to any Post Office in the Colony are retained for a period of two weeks. If originating abroad and not called for at the end of one month from the time of receipt in the Returned Letter Office, they are advertised in the *Official Gazette*. If not applied

for at the expiration of the second month, they are sent back to the country of origin. In the case of those posted in the Colony, they are opened and, with the exception of newspapers, returned to the writer.

56.—Letters for persons at out-lying places.—Letters, &c., addressed to Gold-diggers and others resident at a distance from a Post Office are, however, exceptionally retained one month.

57.—Treatment of Letters in R.L.O.—On reaching the Returned Letter Office if any inland letter be found not to contain the sender's address or any article of value, it is destroyed. Any letter or packet which on being opened, is found to contain value, is for its safety, recorded and returned registered, and, unless registered at the time of posting, a double registration fee is charged on the sender.

58.—Fully prepaid letters, &c., returned free.—Fully prepaid letters, if not found to contain articles of value, are returned to the writers free of charge.

59.—Postage on unpaid Postal Matter will be collected from senders.—The postage, &c., charged upon letters and other articles sent by post received in the Returned Letter Office will be charged upon the letters when sent to the writers, and the amount of such postage is, by law, recoverable from the senders of the letters.

LETTERS TO BE CALLED FOR.

60.—Poste Restante.—There is a *Poste Restante* at the General Post Office, Georgetown, where letters "to be called for" can be obtained. No letters are taken in "to be called for" at the Branch Receiving Offices, and any so directed and posted will be sent to the Returned Letter Office to be returned to the writers.

61.—For whom intended.—The *Poste Restante* being solely intended for the accommodation of strangers and travellers who have no permanent abode in Georgetown, letters for residents should not, excepting under special circumstances, be addressed to the Post Office "to be called for," and any letters so addressed will be sent out by the Letter Carrier after the expiration of one month. Even strangers are not as a rule allowed to use the *Poste Restante* for more than two months, at the end of which time they are expected to have their letters sent to a private address.

62.—Initials or fictitious names.—Letters addressed to initials or fictitious names at the *Poste Restante* are not taken in, but are at once sent to the writers.

63.—Re-direction to Poste Restante not allowed.—Letters may not be re-directed from a private address to the *Poste Restante*.

64.—Particulars of letters to be given.—All persons applying for letters at the *Poste Restante* must be prepared to give the necessary particulars to the clerk on duty, to prevent mistakes and to ensure the delivery of the letters to the persons to whom they properly belong. Information must also be given as to the place and district from which the letters are expected, and if necessary some proof of identification produced.

65.—Period for which letters are kept.—Letters from abroad addressed to the *Poste Restante*, Georgetown, are retained for one month, after which time they are advertised in the *Official Gazette*, and if not claimed within one month from the date of publication they are sent to the Returned Letter Office for disposal in the usual manner.

66.—Letters addressed to ships.—Letters, &c., for Captains, Officers, Crews, and Passengers of all ships coming into port at Georgetown, are specially forwarded to the Consignee's Office on the arrival of the ship.

SECTION IV.—FOREIGN POST.

1.—Definition of term "Union Country."—The "Universal Postal Union" has been established with a view to secure, as far as possible, uniformity in procedure and in rates of postage between the various countries of the world. The countries which have joined this Union are called "Union Countries."

2.—List of Union Countries.—The following is a list of the countries which are comprised in the "Universal Postal Union":—

other precious articles, but only in case their insertion is forbidden by the Legislation of the countries concerned. See note * § 2.

POST-CARDS.

9.—Available for Union Countries.—International post-cards, single and reply, are issued for the use of the public; they may be sent to any Union country. A single post-card has a 2 cents stamp embossed on it; a double, or reply, has a 2 cents stamp embossed on each portion. The first portion of a double post-card is intended to contain the sender's communication; the second or reply portion is intended to contain the addressee's answer, and, when detached and posted by the latter, will be entitled to free transmission.

10.—Special Rules as to Address, &c.—Post-cards bearing written or printed communications on the left hand half of the address side may be sent to all British possessions to which the 2 cents postage applies and to certain Foreign countries—with these exceptions the face of the card is reserved for the postage stamp, and for the address, which may be written or be shewn, upon a gummed labelled not exceeding 2 inches in length by 1 inch in width. The sender of a post-card may also add his own name and address on the face or on the back of it by means of a stamp, autograph stamp, or any other typographical process. Engraving or advertisements may be printed on the face, but must not interfere with the indication of the address or with the stamping or marking of the Postal Service. Except stamps for the prepayment and the labels mentioned in this paragraph no paper or other article may be attached to a post-card. The sender of the post-card with reply paid may indicate address on the face of the reply half, either in writing or by sticking a label on it. The prepayment of the reply half by means of the postage stamp of the country of origin only holds good if the reply half be sent to that country, otherwise it is charged as an unpaid letter.

11.—Private Cards.—Post-cards, both single and with reply paid, emanating from private industry, are admitted to international circulation, provided that they fulfil the conditions laid down, and that they be in conformity with the post-cards issued by the country of origin, in regard to size and to the substance of the paper.

12.—Penalty for Breach of Rules.—If any of the above rules should be infringed with regard to a post-card, it will be forwarded to destination taxed as a letter.

NEWSPAPERS OR OTHER PRINTED PAPERS.

13.—Definition of term "Printed Papers."

The following are considered as printed papers and allowed to pass as such:—Newspapers and periodical works, books, stitched or bound, pamphlets, sheets of music, visiting cards, address cards, proofs of printing with or without the manuscripts relating thereto, papers impressed with points in relief for the use of the blind, engravings, photographs and albums containing photographs, pictures, drawings, plans, maps, catalogues, prospectuses, announcements and notices of various kinds, printed, engraved, lithographed or autographed, and in general all impressions or copies obtained upon paper, parchment, or cardboard, by means of printing, engraving, lithography, autography, or any other mechanical process easy to recognize, except the copying press and the typewriter.

14.—Postage.—Postage on newspapers or other printed papers is 1 cent for every two ounces or part of that weight, except to Canada, with which country newspapers and periodicals are exchanged at Inland rates.

15.—Conditions as to Payment.—The postage must be prepaid at least partly. Unpaid packets will be stopped.

16.—Conditions as to Size and Weight.—The limits of size for packets addressed to the United Kingdom and British Colonies or Possessions, or to Non-Union Countries are 2 feet in length by one foot in width or depth, but to Foreign Countries in the Postal Union, the length is limited to 18 inches; packets in the form of a roll may not exceed 2 feet 6 ins. in length and 4 in. diameter. The limits of weight are 5 lbs. for British Colonies and Possessions, and for Non-Union countries; and 4 lbs. for other countries.

17.—Prohibitions.—Stamps for Prepayment whether obliterated or not and all printed articles constituting the sign of a monetary value. Printed papers of which the text has been modified after printing, either by hand or by means of a mechanical process, or bears any mark whatever of such a kind as to constitute a conventional language. Cards bearing the inscription "Post Card" are not allowed at the rate for printed matter.

COMMERCIAL PAPERS.

18.—Definition of "Commercial Papers."—The following are considered as commercial papers, and allowed to pass as such:—All papers and all documents, whether writings or drawings, produced wholly or partly by hand, not having the character of an actual and personal correspondence, such as papers of legal procedure, deeds of all kinds drawn up by public functionaries, way bills or bills of lading, invoices, the various documents of insurance companies, copies of or extracts from Acts under private signature, written on stamped or unstamped paper, musical scores or sheets of music in manuscript, the manuscripts of works or of newspapers forwarded separately, pupils' exercises with corrections but without any comment on the work, &c.

19.—Postage.—The postage on commercial papers is the same as for printed papers, except that the lowest charge is five cents.

20.—Conditions as to Payment.—Postage on commercial papers must be partly prepaid (in cases where full prepayment is not compulsory). Commercial papers if not fully prepaid, will be charged on delivery with double postage, or double the amount of the deficiency.

21.—Conditions as to Size and Weight.—Commercial papers transmitted to Union countries are subject so far as regards form and conditions of transmission to the regulations prescribed for printed papers.

22.—Conditions as to Packing.—Packets of commercial papers must be posted in unclosed envelopes, or in covers entirely open at both ends, so as to admit of the contents being easily withdrawn for examination; the covers, however, may be tied at the ends with string.

23.—Penalty for Breach of Conditions.—Packets of commercial papers with regard to which any of the foregoing conditions have not been observed will not be forwarded.

SAMPLES.

24.—What Sample Packets may contain.—Bona fide Samples of merchandise without saleable value are allowed to pass under the following conditions:—

They must be placed in bags, boxes, or removeable envelopes in such a manner as to admit of easy inspection.

They must possess no saleable value, nor bear any writing, except the name or the commercial style of the sender, the address of the person for whom they are intended, a manufacturer's or trade mark numbers, prices, and indications relative to weight or measurement and dimensions or to the quantity to be disposed of, or such as are necessary to determine the origin and the nature of the goods.

No article liable to Custom Duties, except as hereinafter provided, and no goods for sale or consigned in execution of an order (however small the quantity) may be sent as a sample.

25.—Postage.—The postage is the same as for printed papers except that the lowest charge is 2 cents. For the postage, reference should be made to the **Schedule of rates** in this Section.

26.—Conditions as to Packing.—Articles of glass, packets containing liquids, oils, fatty substances, dry powders, whether dyes or not, as well as packets of live bees, may be admitted to transmission as samples of merchandise, provided that they be packed in the following manner:—

- (1.) Articles of glass must be securely packed (boxes of metal, wood, leather or cardboard) in a way to prevent all danger to the correspondence and postal officers.
- (2.) Liquids, oils, and fatty substances easily liquefied must be enclosed in glass bottles hermetically sealed. Each bottle must be placed in a wooden box furnished with sawdust, cotton, or spongy material in sufficient quantity to absorb the liquid in case the bottle be broken. Finally, the box itself must be enclosed in a case of metal, or wood, with a screw-top, or of strong and thicker leather.
- (3.) Fatty substances which are not easily liquefied, such as ointments, soft-soap, resin, &c., the transmission of which offers less inconvenience, must be enclosed in an inner cover (box, bag of linen or parchment, &c.) which must itself be placed in a second box of wood, metal, or strong and thick leather;
- (4.) Dry powders, whether dyes or not, must be placed in cardboard boxes, which themselves are enclosed in a bag of linen or parchment.
- (5.) Live bees must be enclosed by boxes so constructed as to avoid all danger and to allow the contents to be ascertained.

27.—Limits of Size and Weight.—The limit of weight for packets of samples for British Colonies or Possessions or for non-Union countries is 5 lbs., but for foreign countries in the Postal Union the limit is 12 oz. A packet of samples sent to any British Colony or Possession or non-Union country must not exceed 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth, but to any foreign place comprised in the Postal Union a packet must not exceed 12 inches in length, 8 in width, or 4 in depth, unless it be in the form of a roll, in which case the limit of size is 12 inches in length and 6 inches in diameter.

28.—Specimens.—Transmission at the sample rate is accorded to articles of natural history, dried or preserved animals and plants, geological specimens, &c., when sent for no commercial purpose and packed in accordance with the general regulations concerning samples of merchandise.

29.—Tobacco.—With a view of affording Tobacco growers facilities for transmitting Samples of their production to the trade in the United Kingdom, parcels containing type samples of manufactured tobacco sent *bona fide* for the purposes of the trade, and not exceeding 4 lbs. in weight, will be delivered to the addressees, subject to the payment of the Customs duty.

ARTICLES GROUPED TOGETHER.

30.—Conditions.—It is permitted to enclose in one and the same packet samples of merchandise, printed matter, and commercial papers, but subject to the following conditions:—

- (1.) That each article taken singly do not exceed the limits which are applicable to it as regards weight and size;
- (2.) That the total weight do not exceed 5 lbs. per packet;
- (3.) That the minimum charge be 5 cents if the packet contains commercial papers, and 4 cents if it consists of printed matter and samples.

REGISTRATION.

31.—Fee.—Registration is applicable equally to letters, postcards, newspapers, book-packets, and samples addressed to places abroad, but not to parcels sent by parcel post except in

the case of parcels sent to or from the United States. The fee chargeable for registration to places abroad is 4 cents.

32.—Acknowledgments.—The sender of a registered article addressed to any Foreign Country or British Colony in the Postal Union, may obtain an acknowledgment of its due receipt by the addressee on paying a fee of 5 cents in advance at the time of registration. For enquiry as to the delivery of registered articles a fee of 5 cents must be paid unless, it can be shewn that there is reason to suppose that the article has been lost in the post.

33.—Prohibitions.—No article addressed to initials or to a fictitious name can be registered. It is prohibited to send to a country of the Postal Union any registered packet containing coin, jewellery or precious articles, &c., marked on the outside with the declared value of the contents; and such articles presented for registration will be returned to the senders. The transmission out of the Colony of gold or silver bullion or precious stones by letter post is prohibited.

34.—Condition as to Enclosing.—Every article presented for registration must be enclosed in a strong envelope, securely fastened. Envelopes are sold by the Post Office at 5 cents each.

35.—Prepayment Compulsory.—Registered articles must be fully prepaid as regards both postage and registration fee.

36.—Manner of Registering.—Every article to be registered must be given to an agent of the Post Office, and a receipt obtained for it; and it should on no account be dropped into a letter-box.

37.—Places with which insured letters are exchanged.—Letters for the undermentioned Countries accepted for insurance:—

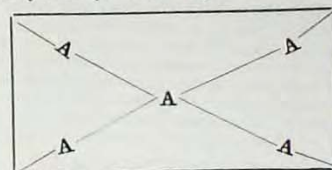
38.—Advantages of Insurance.—Insured letters
have all the safeguards of the registration system; and, subject
to the following regulations, compensation will be paid if they
or any of their contents are lost in the Post.

39.—Letters must be handed in.—Letters intended
for insurance must be presented at the counter of a Post Office.

They must not be dropped into a letter-box or handed to a
postman or mail cart driver.

40.—Prohibitions.—Insured letters may not contain
coin, anything made of gold or silver, precious stones, jewellery
or any other article liable to Customs duty in the country of
destination. Insured letters must not be addressed to initials or
in pencil. Postcards or packets of "Printed Papers" or
"Commercial Papers" or Sample Packets cannot be insured.
The letters to which the insurance system is specially
applicable are those which contain bank notes, bonds, coupons,
securities, &c.

41.—Conditions as to Packing, &c.—Every letter
packet tendered for insurance must be enclosed in a strong
cover, which must be securely fastened and sealed with fine
wax, in such a way that it cannot be opened without either
breaking the seals or leaving obvious traces of violation.
Envelopes with black or coloured borders must not be used.
Seals must be placed over each flap or seam of the cover of a
packet; and if the packet is tied round with string or tape, a
seal must be placed on the ends where they are tied. The seals
on an ordinary envelope should be placed as shown below:—



42.—Sealing.—All the seals on a letter must be of the
same kind of wax, and must bear distinct impressions of the
same private device. Coins must not be used for sealing; and
the device must not consist merely of straight, crossed, or
curved lines which could readily be imitated.

43.—Onus of properly enclosing.—If a letter
tendered for insurance does not, in the opinion of the officer of
the Post Office to whom it is tendered, fulfil the foregoing con-
ditions as to packing and sealing, it is his duty to refuse to
insure it. Nevertheless the onus of properly enclosing and
sealing the letter lies upon the sender; and the Post Office

assumes no liability for loss arising from defects of the cover or the seals which may not be observed at the time of posting.

44.—Declaration of value.—The amount for which a letter is insured (which must not exceed its actual value) must be written by the sender both in words and in figures at the top of the address side of the cover, thus:—"Insured for fifteen pounds (£15), 378 francs." No alteration or erasure of the inscription is allowed. If a mistake is made, the entry must be completely obliterated and an entirely new one made by the sender.

46.—Prepayment compulsory.—The fee (which includes the registration fee) must be prepaid, in addition to the full postage, by means of postage stamps, which the sender must affix to the cover of the letter.

47.—Manner of affixing Stamps.—As few stamps as possible should be used to prepay the postage and insurance fee. They must not be folded over the edge of the cover, and when more stamps than one are used, they must be affixed with spaces between them.

When any Insured Postal matter is sent in transit through a Country participating in the Exchange of Insured Postal matter the charge for intermediate services is added to the abovementioned charge and is collected from the sender.

48.—Acknowledgments.—A certificate of posting must always be obtained by the sender of an insured letter. He may also obtain acknowledgment of the delivery of the letter under the same conditions as those applicable to registered letters.

49.—Irregular Insurance.—Letters which, though addressed to a country or place to which the insurance system does not extend, have been irregularly insured, will be forwarded as registered letters; and if they or their contents are lost in the Post, the regulations as to the compensation payable in the case of registered letters will be applicable.

50.—Redirection.—When an insured letter is redirected from one country to another, a fresh insurance fee becomes payable for each such transmission. If this fee is not prepaid, it is collected from the addressee on delivery. Insured letters can only be redirected to countries which have adopted the insurance system.

51.—Compensation.—Compensation for the loss in the Post of a letter or its contents will not exceed the amount of the actual loss, and will not be paid at all for a letter containing any prohibited article, or for any letter which has been delivered without external trace of injury and has been accepted without remark by the addressee; nor does it follow as a matter of course that compensation will be given when loss arises from tempest, shipwreck, earthquake, war, or other causes beyond control. No claim for compensation will be admitted if made more than a year after the letter was posted.

52.—Decision of Postal Administration.—No legal liability to give compensation in respect of any letter for which an insurance fee has been paid attaches to the Postmaster General, either personally or in his official capacity. The final decision upon all questions of compensation rests with the Postal Administration of the country in which the loss has taken place.

RE-DIRECTION.

53.—Within the Union.—Letters, &c., sent to or received from a country of the Postal Union and afterwards re-directed to any place in the colony or to another country within the Union are not liable to any additional charge, nor, if registered, to an additional fee for registration unless re-directed

to a country to which the postage is higher than that originally paid. Thus a British letter re-directed to Surinam or Cayenne should have additional stamps affixed to it representing the difference between the British postage and the Union rate of five cents, applicable to Surinam and Cayenne, otherwise the difference will be charged on delivery. Letters that have been in the first instance addressed to a place in the country where they were posted are chargeable on re-direction with the same postage, less the sum prepaid, which would have been charged had they been addressed in the first instance to the place of their ultimate delivery, but, if registered, without additional fee.

52.—Inland Letters Re-directed to Non-union Countries.—Letters, &c., addressed from one part of the colony to another, and then re-directed to a country not in the Postal Union, are liable to an additional Foreign rate, and, if registered, to an additional fee for registration.

53.—Newspapers from Abroad.—No charge for re-direction is made on newspapers from any place abroad unless they have opened, in which case they are liable to postage as books.

ARTICLES NOT ALLOWED TO BE SENT.

56.—Dangerous and Offensive Substances.—Explosive, inflammable, dangerous, damaging or offensive substances, such as gunpowder, matches, percussion caps, saltpetre, indigo, assafetida, &c., may not be sent by the Foreign Post; or any other article, which either from its own nature, or by reason of insecure packing, may be likely to injure the contents of the mail bags or the person of the mail officers.

57.—Anything Indecent or Obscene.—Indecent or obscene prints, paintings, photographs, lithographs, engravings, books or cards, or any other indecent or obscene article, or any letter, newspaper, publication, post-card or packet, having on it any words, marks or designs of an indecent, obscene or grossly offensive character, will not, if the character of the article be observed, be forwarded by the Foreign Post.

58.—Lottery Matter.—The transmission of any letter, circular, advertisement or ticket of any, or concerning any lottery is forbidden.

59.—Further Prohibitions.—Commercial papers, samples and printed papers which are not prepaid at least

partly, which contain letters or manuscript notes having the character of actual or personal correspondence or which or not made up in such a manner as to admit of an easy examination of the contents. Articles of the same categories which exceed the prescribed limits of weight and size.

Samples of merchandise having a saleable value. Samples and other articles which from their nature may expose the Postal Officials to danger, or soil or damage the correspondence. Explosive, inflammable or dangerous substances, animals or insects, living or dead.

All articles falling under the foregoing prohibitions will, if detected, be detained and returned to the senders.

EXPRESS DELIVERY SERVICE.

60.—Express Services.—Letters or parcels sent abroad can be delivered in advance of the ordinary delivery in Countries with which an International Express Service has been established.

61.—Places to which express letters may be sent.—Arrangements have been made for the express delivery of letters in the following countries, viz.:—

63.—Fee on Letters, &c.—For Letters, or other ordinary or registered postal matter, the express delivery fee is Six Cents, and such fee must be prepaid by means of the post-

age stamps of this Colony in addition to the Postage rate on the article.

64.—Fee on Parcels.—For Parcels the express delivery fee to be prepaid in postage stamps, is Ten Cents, in addition to the Postage.

65.—Articles to be specially marked.—All postal packets intended for express delivery must be marked by the sender "Express Delivery," written boldly on the cover of the packet. Letters must also have a thick perpendicular line drawn on each side of the envelope.

66.—Local Deliveries.—The express delivery of postal packets coming to this colony from any of the beforementioned Countries or Colonies is confined to delivery from the General Post Office, Georgetown, and the Post Office at New Amsterdam, Berbice, and the Country Offices which are telegraph stations.

CORRESPONDENCE BY PRIVATE VESSELS.

68.—Address on Letters Outwards.—Correspondence desired to be despatched by private vessels taking mails should be marked by the sender, the name of the vessel being given if transmission by a particular vessel is desired, but the Post Office must still have discretion as to transmission by that particular opportunity. Correspondence not so marked may be forwarded by private vessel if there be no regular mail communication with the country of destination.

69.—Charges on Letters Inwards.—The following charges are made on the delivery of letters brought to the

colony by ship without having passed through a Post Office previous to arrival:—

For each Letter, per ½ oz. 2 Cents.

The gratuity to be paid to the ship's Captain by the Post Office is fixed at one cent for each letter irrespective of weight.

70.—Consignees' Letters.—The owners, charterers or consignees of any vessel, not a Post Office Packet, and the owners, consignees, or shippers of goods on board any such vessel, are entitled to have their letters delivered by the master of the vessel before he delivers the other letters to the Post Office and free of inland postage, but the letters brought by any one such vessel to any one such person, shall not collectively exceed six ounces in weight, and the owner, charterer, or consignees shall be described as such on the address and superscription, and in the case of owners, shippers, or consignees of goods, it shall also appear by the ship's manifest that they have goods on board the vessel.

FORBIDDEN ARTICLES, ENCLOSURES, &c.

72.—Counterfeit Coin, Decaying Substances, &c.—No parcel is admissible which contains base or counterfeit coin, articles infringing trade-mark or copyright laws, any letter, circular, advertisement or ticket of or concerning any lottery, any article or substance liable to become offensive or injurious through natural decay during the time ordinarily occupied in transmission (for example, butter, &c., addressed to a tropical or sub-tropical country, or having to pass through the tropics in course of transmission, unless enclosed in a hermetically sealed tin), or any article or substance specially prohibited from importation into the Colony or Country to which the parcel is addressed.

73.—Perishable Articles.—Many perishable articles, even though in good condition at the time of posting, may become offensive and worthless owing to the length of the journey, although delivered in proper course of post.

74.—Limit to Value.—Parcels for Ascension, St. Helena, South and Central Africa, and uninsured parcels for Egypt and Zanzibar may not exceed £50 in value. When the contents of a parcel for the United States exceeds one hundred dollars in value the parcel should be accompanied by the Invoice duly certified by a Consul or Officer of the United States.

75.—Jewellery, &c.—*Parcels containing coin, watches, jewellery, or any article of gold or silver, cannot be sent by Parcel Post to any Foreign Country or British Possession included in the insurance system (for list of such places see column 5) unless they are insured for at least part of their value, and are packed and sealed in accordance with the special regulations given on § 71, p. 73.*

There may not be posted or tendered for conveyance by Post to or through the United Kingdom any Parcel containing coin or bullion other than a parcel containing coin or bullion not exceeding five pounds in value, or containing coin which is clearly designed for purposes of ornament.

76.—Prepayment of Postage.—The postage must in all cases be prepaid at the time of posting by postage stamps.

77.—Time of Posting.—Parcels may be posted during the usual hours of business at a Post Office except on Sunday, Christmas Day, Good Friday, and a Public Holiday, and on any day on which the Parcels Mails are made up only during such hours as may be previously announced by public notice.

78.—Mode of Posting.—All parcels must be handed in at the Post Office to an officer on duty at the counter, and parcels for places abroad must be accompanied by or have affixed to them Customs declarations stating the contents and their value.

79.—Penalty for Breach of Rules.—Any packet intended for transmission as a parcel but posted in a Post Office Letter Box or otherwise than according to the regulations, will be detained and forwarded as a letter or book packet, as the case may be; or if not fully prepaid with a letter or book packet rate of postage, it will be forwarded to its destination as a parcel charged with the sum of six cents in addition to the postage.

80.—Re-Directed Parcels.—Parcels arriving in this colony from abroad and re-directed from one address to another in the Colony will be liable to a charge equal to the inland rate for Parcels, which will be added to the other charges leviable for Customs Dues, &c. If returned or re-directed from one country to another, a Parcel will be charged a full rate of postage. If, however, the addressee has removed to a country with which there is no arrangement for Exchange of Parcels, the Parcel will be treated as "undelivered."

81.—Re-Importation on Duty Paid Articles.—The Customs Regulations require that persons intending to export goods upon which duty has been paid and upon which no drawback has been claimed, and intended to re-import the same without payment of further duty, or on payment of further duty as may be chargeable on account of such goods being increased in value by repairs, improvements, additions thereto, or otherwise, during the time between the exportation from the colony and re-importation, must, before making due entry of such good for exportation give notice in writing, to be delivered in duplicate two days at least before the shipment, and to contain a full and true description with, if possible, the date of importation, the name of the ship importing the same, and the date on which duty was paid, the date of the intended exportation and the time when it is expected that such goods will be re-imported into the Colony, as well as to the nature of any repairs, improvements, or additions intended to be made or done to the same.

82.—Delivery at Places served by Letter-Carriers.—Delivery of small parcels will be made by Letter-Carriers as far as possible. Where Letter-Carriers are not employed or where they are unable to deliver Parcels, delivery must be

taken from the Post Office by the addressee personally or upon a written order. Standing orders may be given for delivery.

83.—Undelivered Parcels.—Parcels which cannot be delivered will be kept for a reasonable time before being finally disposed of.

84.—Insurance of Parcels.—Any Parcel addressed to the countries and places with which insured Parcels are exchanged may be insured during transit to its destination.—See Col. 5, § 71.

85.—Fee.—The sums payable for insurance, which must be paid by means of Postage Stamps affixed to the Parcel, are the same as for letters. See § 45 p. 48.

86.—Rules as to Insurance.—Insured Parcels have all the safeguards of the registration system and subject to the following rules, compensation will be paid if they are lost or damaged in the Post:—

(a.) A certificate of posting must always be obtained by the sender.

(b.) No parcel can be insured for more than the sum set in the list given on page 48 against the name of the Country or Colony to which it is addressed, or for a sum above the real value of the contents. *Over-insurance is a bar to compensation*, but to obtain the safeguards of the registration system contents having no saleable value may be insured for a nominal sum.

(c.) Parcels containing coin, watches, jewellery, or any article of gold or silver cannot be sent by Parcel Post unless they are insured for at least part of their value and are packed and sealed in accordance with the special regulation.

(d.) The sum for which a Parcel is to be insured must be on the cover thus: "Insured for £ s. d." The number of pounds should be entered in words. No alteration or erasure of the entry is permitted.

(e.) Every insured parcel must be packed carefully and substantially, with due regard to the nature of the contents and the length of the journey, and must be sealed with wax or lead in such a way that it cannot be opened without either breaking the seal or leaving obvious traces of violation. For instance, seals must be placed over each join or loose flap of the covering of a parcel; and if string be used in packing, a seal must be placed on the ends of the strings where they are tied.

(f.) All the seals on a parcel must be of the same kind of wax or lead, and must bear distinct impressions of the same device; and the device must not consist merely of straight, curved or crossed lines. Coins must not be used for sealing.

(g.) Parcels containing coin, watches, jewellery, or any article of gold or silver, must be enclosed in strong boxes or cases, which must be sewn up, or otherwise fastened in wrappers of linen, canvas, or strong paper, or other substantial material. In such cases the seals must be placed along the edges of each join or loose flap at distances not more than three inches apart. The address of such parcels must be written on their actual covering.

87.—Claim for Compensation.—A claim for compensation must be made within three months from the date of posting, and when the claim relates to damage or loss of any article enclosed, the parcel must be presented for inspection as nearly as possible in the state in which it was delivered. When a parcel bears signs of injury, the addressee should call attention to the fact at the time of delivery, and if possible open the parcel in the presence of the officer of the Post Office.

89.—Private Vessels.—Irregular communication with Great Britain, the United States and the West Indies is afforded by the Merchant Steamers trading with Demerara. The despatch of Mails by such steamers is specially announced beforehand in the local press.

SECTION V.—MONEY ORDERS.

1.—Forms.—When applying for Money Orders, the public should use the printed "Requisition Form" supplied gratuitously at all Money Order Offices.

2.—Remitter and Payee.—A Remitter is the person who applies for a Money Order. A Payee is the person named in a Money Order, as the person to whom the Money is to be paid.

3.—Rates of Commission.—The Commission charged on Inland Money Orders and on orders drawn on any office in the Dominion of Canada is 2 cents for each \$2 40, or portion of that sum. No Inland Money Order is issued for a higher sum than \$100.

The Commission charged on all Foreign Orders except to Canada is 4 cents for each 10/., or portion of that sum.

4.—Money Order Office.—The Offices authorized to transact Money Order business are denoted in Section III, on page 30, by an asterisk.

5.—Places upon which Orders can be Drawn.—The following list of places with which Money Orders may be

If it is desired to remit a specific sum in full the amount which will be deducted on "Through" Orders should be added to the remittance.

The name and address of the Payee should be given with such completeness as shall secure identification and prevent risk of wrong delivery.

It is necessary for the remitter of a Foreign Order to write to the Payee informing him (the Remitter's) name as entered in the Order.

Orders for INDIA are advised direct to Bombay; for SURINAM, direct to Paramaribo; for the UNITED STATES and CANADA, BARBADOS and the WINDWARD ISLANDS by the Office of issue direct to the Office of payment. Orders for the other places named in this List are sent through the UNITED KINGDOM, are subject to a deduction in the United Kingdom for commission at the rates set forth in the preceding paragraph and to conversions and re-transmissions as follows:—

AUSTRIA and HUNGARY.—The amounts of Money Orders issued in the United Kingdom upon Austria and Hungary are converted at the London Office into the French currency of Francs and Centimes, as shown in this column; and at the Office of Vienna or Buda-Pesth, as the case may be such sums are converted into Austro-Hungarian money in accordance with the value of the Piece of 20 Francs in Gold current in those cities on the day in which the Advice Lists are received from London.

Orders for BULGARIA and SERBIA are re-advised in London through Bale (Switzerland); for CHILI, CONGO FREE STATE, GREECE and URUGUAY, through Brussel (Belgium); for MONTENEGRO and SALVADOR through Turin (Italy); and for FINLAND through Malmö (Sweden). The amounts are re-advised in the currency of the country of payment less a deduction of about 1 per cent. by the office which acts as the intermediary.

PORTUGAL, with THE AZORES, MADEIRA and PORTUGUESE COLONIES.—The amounts of Orders to be paid in Portugal, the Azores, and Madeira are converted at Lisbon into Portuguese money as closely as practicable according to the current rate of exchange. The amount of the order for Portuguese Colonies are re-advised by the Lisbon Office less a deduction of about 1 per cent.

8.—Particulars Required.—No Money Order can be issued unless the applicant furnish in full the surname and the initial of one christian-name, at least, both of the remitter and payee, together with the remitter's address. In the case of Foreign Orders, the full address of the payee must be given.

Exceptions.—In the case of Inland Orders or when Orders are made payable in the United Kingdom, the remitter is at liberty to desire, at the time of issue, that the Order be crossed like a cheque thus, & Co., and be made payable only through a bank, in which case it is left to his option to give or withhold the name of the payee. The designation of the bank need not be furnished.

2nd.—If the remitter or payee be a peer or a bishop, his ordinary title is sufficient.

3rd.—The usual designation of a firm is sufficient, except in the case of a company trading under a title which does not consist of the names of the persons composing it, as

the *Demerara Wood-Working Company*, but even a designation of this nature may be accepted, provided the order be presented through a bank.

9.—Orders may be Crossed.—The holder of a Money Order payable in the United Kingdom is always at liberty to direct, by crossing it, that the order be paid through a bank even though its payment was not originally so restricted; and when the Order is thus presented the question put on the presentation of an ordinary Money Order is dispensed with.

10.—Nearest Money Order Office.—When application is made for a Money Order payable in London, or at any other town where there is more than one Money Order Office, the remitter should be prepared to say at which of such offices he wishes it to be paid, otherwise the Order can be cashed only at the Head Office.

11.—Orders cannot be Cancelled.—An Order once issued cannot be cancelled and should repayment or transfer to a different office be required, application on the subject must be made to the Postmaster General.

12.—Payment.—Before an Order is presented for payment the Order must be signed by the person to whom it is made payable. Then if the signature be in agreement with the information given in the advice, and the person presenting the order is able to give the name of the remitter, the Order will be paid, unless the Postmaster have good grounds for believing the applicant is neither the right claimant nor deputed by him. If the Payee is unable to write, his mark shall be witnessed in writing in the presence of the paying officer by two persons known to such officer. Payment of an order cannot be demanded on the same day as that on which the Order was issued.

13.—Non-Responsibility of Post office.—No application can be entertained for compensation for alleged injury from the non-payment of an Order at the expected time. After once paying an Order, by whomsoever presented, the office is not liable to any further claim.

14.—Precautions to be Observed.—To guard against fraudulent payment of a Money Order, the remitter is recommended,—

1st.—When he is well-known to the payee to sign the letter enclosing the order with his initials only.

2nd.—When this is not the case to register the letter enclosing it.

3rd.—When it is not considered expedient to adopt either of these courses to send the remitter's name (without a knowledge of which payment cannot be obtained) in a separate letter from that containing the Money Order; although this latter precaution is much less effective than either of the others.

15.—Stoppage of Payment or Lapse of Orders.—Payment of any Inland Order may be stopped. Every Order lapses at the end of six months from the month in which it was issued, but may be renewed for another six months on application in writing by the payee or remitter. The charge for such service is at the Inland rate of commission.

16.—Duplicate Inland Orders and Alteration of Particulars.—Should an Inland Money Order miscarry or be lost a duplicate will be granted on a written application, with the necessary particulars, to the Postmaster General. An additional commission will be charged. Provided, however, that where the letter containing the order was lost in transit through the Post the Postmaster General will remit the charge. If alteration in the name of the payee or remitter of an Inland Money Order be required, application, accompanied by the payment of a second commission, must be made by the remitter to the Postmaster General. Should transfer of payment of an Inland Money Order from one office to another, or repayment of the amount of an Order be required, an application giving number, date, offices, of issue and payment and full particulars of the Order must be made to the Postmaster General. A second commission will be charged for the re-issue.

17.—Void Orders.—If an Inland Order be not paid before the end of twelve months from the calendar month in which it was issued (for instance if issued in January and not paid before the end of the following January) the Order becomes void, and all claim to the amount of the Order is lost.

INLAND TELEGRAPH ORDERS.

18.—Rate of Commission.—Orders may be transmitted by telegraph to any Money Order Office having telegraphic communication. The commission payable on such Order is as follows:—

On every 10/ or portion of that sum ... 4 Cents

19.—Charge for Advice.—In addition to the commission a charge is made at the ordinary inland rate for the Official telegram authorising payment at the office of payment, and for the repetition thereof. Any telegraphic communication which the remitter may wish to despatch to the payee must be paid for at the ordinary inland rate.

20.—Limit of Value.—No Telegraph Money Order can be issued for a greater sum than one hundred dollars.

21.—Payment of Telegraph Orders.—The Order can only be paid on the production of satisfactory evidence that the party claiming the same is entitled thereto. In other respects Telegraph Money Orders are subject to the regulations which govern the transmission of ordinary Money Orders.

22.—How to Proceed.—When applying for a Telegraph Order the remitter must fill up the usual Money Order Requisition Form, and hand the same to the Postmaster, together with the amount of the Order, the commission at the special rate, and the telegraph charges for transmitting the advice. In return he will be given stamps for the prepayment of telegraph charges together with the usual Money Order Form; he must affix the stamps to the telegraph forms and across the order form he must write the words "payment authorized by telegraph," and hand it back to the Postmaster.

23.—Payment of Telegraph Order.—On receiving notice of a remittance by telegraph, the person to whom the money is payable should at once proceed to the Money Order Office of payment to obtain the same. Before paying an order, the Postmaster is required to satisfy himself as to the identity of the payee, either from personal knowledge or the production of the remitter's message, together with correct answers to the usual questions. A receipt will be taken in the form provided for the purpose, and should the name signed to it be found to agree with the name of the payee as advised by telegraph, the amount due will then be paid. No receipt stamp is necessary. It is required that the remitter's message be left with the Postmaster to be sent to the chief office with the receipt and advice.

24.—Repayment and Transfer of Payment.—If repayment or transfer of payment of a Telegraph Order be required, the remitter or payee, as the case may be, must make application to the Postmaster General, when a new order will be issued, less the usual commission. If repayment or transfer of

payment be desired by telegram, the cost of the telegraph advice will be deducted from the new order in addition to the commission.

25.—Hours when Issued.—A Telegraph Order shall only be issuable between the hours during which ordinary money order business is transacted at the office of payment.

SECTION VI.—POSTAL ORDERS INLAND.

1.—Where obtained.—Inland Postal Orders issued by the Postmaster General are obtainable at the General Post Office at any Money Order Office* and at such District Offices in the Colony as may from time to time be authorised to issue the same.

2.—Denominations and Charges.—The following are the amounts for which Inland Postal Orders are issued, and the Commission charged for the same:—

3.—Where Payable.—The Postal Orders so obtained are payable at any Money Order Office in the Colony, or at such other Offices in the Colony, as may be notified by public advertisement from time to time.

4.—Particulars to be filled in by Purchaser.—The person to whom a Postal Order is issued must, before parting with it, fill in the name of the person to whom the amount is to be paid and may fill in the name of the Money Order Office at which the amount is to be paid.

* The following Offices which are not Money Order Offices are authorized to issue Postal Orders:—Barramundi, Mullah, Onai, Purani, X.P. Mile. For list of Money Order Offices see page 39.

5.—Particulars to be Supplied for Inquiries.—Should the purchaser of a Postal Order, with a view to tracing a miscarriage or loss, desire inquiry to be made he must furnish the serial number of the Order, its date and Office of Issue, without which the Postmaster General will not undertake such inquiry.

6.—To be Promptly Transmitted.—A Postal Order must be transmitted by the purchaser with the least possible delay after being purchased, to its destination.

7.—Payable on Demand.—Postal Orders issued at any of the Offices will be payable on demand at any Money Order Office in the Colony, subject to the hereinafter conditions: Provided that in all cases the amount payable will not include any commission that may have been paid by the purchaser.

8.—Must be Receipted.—When a Postal Order is presented at a Money Order Office for payment it must be receipted by the person presenting the Order. A Postmaster may require the person presenting the Order to sign his name on the Order before its payment, although the receipt has already been signed. If the person is unable to write, his mark must be witnessed in writing in the presence of the paying Officer by two persons known to such Officer. No paying Officer may act as witness, but such Officer must certify the payment by adding his initials on the Order.

9.—Must not be Mutilated, &c.—No Postal Order which has been cut in halves or otherwise mutilated, and rejoined, will be paid without the express authority of the Postmaster General.

10.—If Crossed only Paid through Bank.—If a Postal Order be crossed, payment will only be made through a Bank, and if the name of the Bank be added, payment will only be made through that Bank.

11.—May be refused with Erasure or Alteration.—If any erasure or alteration be made, or if the Order is neither date stamped nor signed by the issuing Postmaster, payment may be refused.

12.—No Claim after Payment.—After a Postal Order has once been paid at a Money Order Office, to whomsoever it is paid, the Postmaster General will not be liable for any further claim.

13.—Spoilt Order.—The amount of a spoilt Postal Order will be refunded on payment by the purchaser of a fee equal to the original commission.

14.—After Three Months.—If an Order be not paid within three months from the last day of the month of issue, a fee equal to the original commission will be charged. The fee thus paid must be affixed in postage stamps to the back of the Order.

BRITISH ORDERS.

15.—British Orders Obtainable.—British Postal Orders of the form as issued by the Imperial Post Office are obtainable for the transmission of small sums from the Colony to the United Kingdom and other places hereinafter mentioned, at the General Post Office, any Money Order Office and at such other District Offices in the Colony, as may from time to time be arranged for by the Postmaster General.

16.—Denominations and Charges.—The following are the amounts for which British Postal Orders may be obtained, and the charges (including Commission) for the same:—

17.—Broken Amounts, not including fractions of a penny, may be made up by Postage Stamps, not exceeding three in number nor five pence in value, affixed to the face of a Postal Order in the space provided for that purpose.

18.—Ordinary Stock.—Orders for the denominations which are most in demand are kept in stock; but Orders which are not in stock can be obtained at one or two days' notice.

19.—Use of Counterfoil.—Each Order is provided with a numbered counterfoil which should be detached by the sender before posting and kept by him as a means of identifying the

Order should it be lost. Unless this is done, and the name of the payee is inserted in the Order, the Postmaster General cannot undertake to trace the Order in case of loss or miscarriage.

20.—Places of Issue and Payment.—The Postal Orders so obtained will be payable:

- (i) At any Money Order Office in this Colony or Post Office specially authorised to issue Postal Orders. (see § 1.)
- (ii.) At any Post Office in the United Kingdom where Postal Orders are sold;
- (iii.) In the undermentioned British Possessions and other places abroad:

21.—Particulars to be Filled In.—The person to whom a Postal order is issued must before parting with it fill in the name of the person to whom the amount is to be paid and may fill in the name of the Money Order Office at which the amount is to be paid.

22.—Particulars required for Inquiry.—Should the purchaser of a Postal Order, with a view to tracing a miscarriage or loss, desire inquiry to be made by the Postmaster General he must furnish the serial number of the order, its date and office of issue, without which the Postmaster General will not undertake such inquiry.

23.—To be promptly transmitted.—A Postal order must be transmitted by the purchaser, with the least possible delay after being purchased, to its destination.

24.—Payable on Demand.—Postal Orders issued at any of the offices or any of the places enumerated in Section 20 will be payable on demand at any Money Order Office in the Colony, subject to the hereinafter conditions: The amount payable will not include any poundage that may have been paid by the purchaser.

25.—Must be Receipted.—When a Postal order is presented at a Money Order Office for payment it must be receipted by the person presenting the order. A Postmaster may require the person presenting the order to sign his name on the Order before its payment, although the receipt has already been signed. If the person is unable to write, his mark must be witnessed in writing in the presence of the paying officer by two persons known to such Officer. No paying Officer will act as witness but such Officer will certify the payment by adding his initials on the Order.

26.—Must not be Mutilated, &c.—No Postal Order which has been cut in halves or otherwise mutilated, and re-joined, will be paid without the express authority of the Postmaster General.

27.—If crossed payable through Bank.—If a Postal Order be crossed, payment will only be made through a Bank, and if the name of the Bank be added payment will only be made through that Bank.

28.—May be Refused for Erasures or Alterations.—If any erasure or alteration be made, or if the Order is neither date stamped nor signed by the issuing Postmaster, payment may be refused.

29.—No claim after payment.—After a Postal Order has once been paid at a Money Order Office, to whomsoever it is paid, the Postmaster General will not be liable to any further claim.

30.—Spoilt order.—The amount of a spoilt Postal Order may be refunded on payment by the purchaser of a fee equal to the original Commission.

31.—After Three Months.—If an Order be not paid within three months from the last day of the Month of Issue a fee equal to the original poundage or commission will be charged. The fee thus paid must be affixed in Postage Stamps to the back of the Order.

SECTION VII.—SAVINGS BANK.

1.—Savings Bank Offices.—The Post Office acts as a bank for Savings throughout the Colony. The following Offices are Savings Bank Offices at any of which deposits may be made or withdrawn without change of Pass Book:—

2.—Hours of Business.—These Banks are opened for the purpose of receiving and paying deposits on every day, except on Sundays and public holidays, between eight o'clock in the morning and four in the afternoon. At Carmichael Street, Georgetown, the Bank remains open on Saturdays to 8 p.m.

3.—Deposits.—Deposits may be made by and in the name of—

- A person of full age and not under legal disability;
- A married woman; and
- A minor of the age of fourteen years and upwards.
- In the joint names of two or more persons entitled to make a deposit.
- In the name of one or more persons as trustee or trustees for another person, whose name shall also be entered in the title of the account.
- (1.) By a Friendly Society, through its trustees, either in the name of such Society, or in the name of such Trustees, the full name of such Society being entered in the title of the account.

(2.) The expression "Friendly Society" means a Society legally registered in the manner required by the Ordinances in force relating to Friendly Societies, and includes a registered branch.

(g.) (1.) By the Trustees or Treasurer of a Charitable Society.

(2.) The expression "Charitable Society" means a Penny Savings Bank, Charitable or Provident Institution or Society, or shall include a charitable donation or bequest for the maintenance, education or benefit of the poor.

4.—Deposits of Minors, etc.—Deposits may be made on behalf and in the name of a minor or infant under the age of fourteen years by one of the parents of such minor or infant or by any other person.

5.—Limitation of Deposits.—Deposits of twenty-four cents and upwards may be made by a depositor, but no depositor's account may exceed a total sum of \$1,500.

6.—Interest.—Interest calculated yearly at the rate of Two Dollars and Forty Cents per centum per annum is allowed on every complete sum of Five Dollars deposited, but whenever the sum standing in the name of any depositor amounts, with interest, to more than \$1,500, interest is payable on \$1,500 only. Interest is computed from the first day of the month next following the day on which a complete sum of Five Dollars has been deposited or on which deposits of a less amount have made up a complete sum of Five Dollars, and ceases on the first day of the month in which moneys are withdrawn. The interest is calculated to the 31st December in every year, and is then added to and becomes part of the principal money.

7.—Security.—The direct security of the Government of the Colony is given to every depositor for the repayment of all moneys deposited by him together with the interest due thereon.

8.—Declaration to be made.—(1.) A depositor, on making a first deposit and whenever thereafter he is required so to do, must state his name in full, his occupation, and his residence to the officer appointed to conduct the Savings Bank, subscribe with his name, or with his mark, if he is unable to write, a declaration in the form framed for that purpose.

(2.) Such declaration must be witnessed by one of the following persons, that is to say,—

- (a.) The Officer appointed to conduct the Savings Bank; or
- (b.) Some person known to such Officer; or
- (c.) A Minister of Religion; or
- (d.) A Justice of the Peace; or
- (e.) An Officer of the Immigration Department; or
- (f.) Any other person approved by the Postmaster General in that behalf.

9.—Trust Accounts.—Where a first deposit is made in the name of one person as Trustee for another person whose name is also entered on the title of the Account, a declaration in the prescribed form shall be made by the Trustee.

10.—Charitable Society Accounts.—When a first deposit is made by the Trustee or Treasurer of any Charitable Society, the prescribed declaration shall be made by the Officer of the Society making the deposit, and in every such case such Officer shall specify the capacity in which he acts.

11.—Pass Book.—When a first deposit is made, a Pass Book is delivered to the depositor. The amount of every deposit is entered by the Officer receiving the same in the Pass Book, and such Officer affixes his initials and the date stamp of his office opposite each entry.

12.—Acknowledgment of Deposits.—The Postmaster General upon receiving information of a deposit, transmits to the depositor to his address or to such other place as he may notify at the time of making the deposit an acknowledgment that the deposit has been received. A depositor who does not, within ten days from the day on which he has made a deposit, receive such an acknowledgment should at once make inquiry, as to the same, of the Postmaster General. If the sum mentioned in an acknowledgment is not identical with the sum actually deposited, or entered in the Pass Book, the depositor should at once call the Postmaster General's attention to the discrepancy.

13.—Prohibition.—If any money is deposited in a fictitious name the same with interest thereon lapses and accrues to the Public Revenues.

15.—Minimum Withdrawal.—No withdrawal may be made of a less amount than twenty-four cents, but a depositor

may at any time withdraw and receive the whole amount deposited, with the interest, or any sum that may be due and payable to him for such interest, although such interest may not amount to twenty-four cents or a multiple thereof.

15.—Mode of Withdrawal.—Any depositor who wishes to withdraw the whole or any part of the sum deposited must give notice in the prescribed form, a printed copy of which may be obtained at any Post Office Savings Bank. On receipt of such application, a warrant for the amount required will be sent to the applicant by Post. The warrant must be presented, together with the Pass Book, and the paying Officer will then enter the amount repaid in the depositor's Pass Book, and attest the entry with his name and the date stamp of his office. Any authorization by a depositor for payment to another person on his behalf must be in the prescribed form, a printed copy of which may be obtained free of cost.

16.—Withdrawal from Joint Account.—An application to withdraw money deposited in the joint names of two or more persons must be made by all such persons or by the survivor amongst such persons, and the warrant issued on such application will be made out in the names of the applicants.

17.—From Trust Account.—An application to withdraw money deposited in the name of one or more persons as Trustee or Trustees for another person must be made jointly by all the persons named in the title of the account or by the survivor amongst such persons, and the warrant issued on such application will be made out in the names of the applicants.

18.—From Friendly Society.—An application to withdraw money deposited in the name of a Friendly Society or of the Trustees or any Officer of a Friendly Society must be made by a Trustee of such Society or the Treasurer, Steward or Secretary or any other Officer of such Society, and the warrant issued on such application will be made out in the name of the Society or of its registered Trustees for the time being or of its Treasurer for the time being, if authorized by the Rules of the Society to receive the moneys of the Society.

19.—From Charitable Society.—An application to withdraw money deposited in the name of the Trustees or Treasurer of any Charitable Society must be made by the persons filling the offices of Treasurer, Steward, or Trustees for the time being, and the warrant issued on such application will be made out in the names of the applicants.

20.—Payment may be made to one Person.—When an application for the withdrawal of money is made by more persons than one, the applicants may request that the sum to be withdrawn may be paid to any one or more of them to the exclusion of the others, and in such case the warrant will be made out in the name of the persons specified in such request.

21.—Responsibility of Postmaster General.—The Postmaster General will in no case be responsible for the misapplication by any Friendly Society, Charitable Society or any Trustees, Officer, or representative of any such Society of any sum paid to such Society, by Trustees, Officer, or representative.

22.—Notice by Telegraph.—Any depositor desirous of saving time in the withdrawal of money may on payment of the cost thereof require the Postmaster of the District to notify the Postmaster General of such withdrawal by Telegraph, but in every such case it is still necessary for the depositor to forward the usual written notice of withdrawal.

23.—Transfer of Deposits.—Where deposits have been made in the name of one or more persons as Trustee or Trustees for another person whose name is also entered in the title of the account, upon the application of such last named person, the Postmaster General may remove the name of any Trustee from the title of the Account, and may substitute the name of another or other Trustees in the place thereof, or may enter the account in the name of the person on whose behalf the deposits were made. Where the name of a new Trustee is substituted such Trustee must make the declaration required upon the making of a first deposit.

24.—Book to be sent up for Examination.—Every depositor must once in each year, on the anniversary of the day on which he made his first deposit, and at any other time when required so to do by the Postmaster General, forward his Pass Book to the General Post Office, Georgetown, in a cover which may be obtained at any Post Office Savings Bank, in order that the entries in the said Pass Book may be compared with the entries in the books of the Postmaster General, and that the interest due to the depositor may be entered in his Pass Book.

25.—Loss of Pass Book.—Where a Pass Book is lost application for a new one must be made in the prescribed form, and upon payment of the cost and charges in connection therewith and of the sum of twenty-four cents, the Postmaster General may issue a new Pass Book to the applicant.

26.—When a Depositor cannot Write his mark must when a first deposit is made, be affixed to the prescribed declaration in the presence of a witness who must attest the same. Any authority to receive the amount payable on a warrant must be executed by the depositor in the presence of a witness.

27.—Exemption from Postage.—All documents and correspondence passing between the Postmaster General and any depositor or other person in relation to Post Office Savings Bank business may be transmitted free of postage.

28.—Depositors Dying Intestate.—Where a depositor dies leaving a sum of money the amount may whenever the estate does not appear to be insolvent, be paid and divided amongst the heirs *ab intestato* of the deceased. Application for such payment must be addressed to the Postmaster General. Payment of any money to any person appointed executor of any deceased depositor by virtue of a will is valid with respect to any demand of any other person as the lawful representative of such depositor against the funds of the Savings Bank.

29.—Unclaimed Deposits.—Any sum which remains unclaimed for a period of five years next after the date of the last deposit or payment, is carried to a separate account, and after publication for three successive Saturdays in each year in the *Official Gazette* during a period of three years, if not claimed lapses and accrues to the Public Revenues.

30.—Any Depositor in the Local or Imperial Post Office Savings Bank may arrange for the transfer of his deposits from one to the other by application for such transfer in the prescribed form.

SECTION VIII—ELECTRIC TELEGRAPHS.

INLAND TELEGRAMS.

1.—Charge.—The charge for Telegrams throughout British Guiana is 12 cents for the first 12 words and 6 cents for each additional 6 words or part of that number. The names and address of the receiver, also that of the sender, if telegraphed, are counted. The receiver's name and address shall consist of not less than 2 words.

2.—Delivery.—Telegrams are delivered free within one mile of the nearest delivery office. When the addressee resides beyond the free delivery boundary a charge of 6 cents a mile or part of a mile is made to the sender. The charge is calculated from the boundary of the district, within which portorage is levied.

3.—Prepayment by Stamps.—The prepayment of the charges for transmission and for portorage on a telegram shall be affected by means of postage stamps to be affixed to the message form by the sender.

4.—Posting.—Telegrams may be posted in an envelope free of postage addressed "Telegram, Immediate," in any Post Office Letter Box, and telegrams so posted shall be sent on by the next collection from such Letter Box to the nearest convenient Postal Telegraph Office for transmission, provided the proper amount for transmission and for portorage (if any) have been prepaid by means of postage stamps affixed to the message form.

5.—Insufficient Payment.—Telegrams posted insufficiently prepaid may be forwarded and the deficiency charged to the addressee, but unpaid telegrams shall not be forwarded.

6.—Address.—As prompt delivery is of the essence of a telegram, the address should be sufficiently full to enable the Department to effect the delivery without difficulty. An Address ordinarily used for letters is not necessarily correct or sufficient for telegrams. The address of the sender need not be telegraphed but should be furnished to enable the Department to communicate with him if necessary. When the address is not to be telegraphed, it should be written on the back of the form.

7.—Registration of Addresses.—Any person desiring to register an abbreviated or arbitrary address must make application for registration to the Postmaster General. The charge for the service is One Dollar per annum, payable in advance. The address must consist of two words, one of which must be the name of the town or place of delivery, the other must be a Dictionary word containing not more than ten letters in English, French, German, Dutch, Italian, Spanish, Portuguese, or Latin. No Surname is accepted for registration. A fee of One Dollar is payable for every change of address occurring during the year of registration.

8.—Repetition.—If the receiver of a telegram doubts its accuracy, he may have it repeated by depositing half the amount paid for its transmission to him. The deposit will be refunded to him if it should turn out that the telegram has been inaccurately transmitted.

9.—Prepayment of Reply.—The sender of a telegram may prepay a reply not exceeding forty-eight words in length, a Reply Pass will then be delivered to the addressee, who will be at liberty to send his reply from any Telegraph Office at any time within 14 days after the date of the original telegram. If the pass be not used, the money is repayable on application by the sender, accompanied by the Reply Pass, to the Postmaster General, within three months of the issue.

10.—Re-transmission.—Telegrams re-directed to a second address, either by an Officer of the Postal Department, or by an agent of the addressee shall be subjected to an additional charge, if any additional service is performed, at the customary rate of charge for such service.

11.—Charge for Extra Copies.—Copies of a Telegram directed to more than one person in the same free delivery shall be delivered at a charge of 4 cents per copy, but where any copy of a telegram is required to be delivered at a greater distance than one mile from the Telegraph Station, it shall be subjected to a further charge of the portorage thereon.

12.—Incorrect Charges.—Should the sender of a telegram have reason to think that an incorrect charge has been made for portorage he must write to the Postmaster General on the subject. Postmasters and Telegraphists are required to charge the sums entered in the printed portorage tariff and are allowed no discretionary power in this respect.

13.—Urgent Messages.—Telegrams marked "Urgent" shall be accepted at any Telegraph Office and shall be given precedence of all ordinary messages. The charge for an urgent telegram is double that for an ordinary telegram.

14.—Message for Transmission on different Circuits.—Whenever the same text is required to be transmitted as a distinct message to more than one addressee, separate copies must be lodged for each circuit over which the message is to be sent. When this rule is not attended to by the sender the Department will not be responsible for the delay which may occur from only one copy of the message being available for use.

15.—Messages for Ships.—On Telegrams addressed to persons on board vessels not alongside a steamer, the sender is required to make a deposit of \$1 for boat hire. Any unexpended balance of that amount is refunded.

16.—Service Messages.—All Telegrams sent to and by Government Officials, duly franked and handed in as Government Service messages are accepted free of charge as regards transmission. Any extra charge for portage has, however, to be paid.

17.—Charge for Unintelligible Words.—Telegrams written in plain language in any European tongue are charged for according to the number of words they contain: but all unintelligible words not forming part of any European language are charged for at the rate of five letters to a word.

18.—Compound Words.—No combination of words is counted as one word, with the exception of those which are ordinarily written as one, or coupled by hyphens, such as "mother-in-law," "non-delivery," "sub-lieutenant," "alms-house," "twenty-one," "O'Neil," "MacDonald," &c.

The following exceptional compound words are charged for as one word:—

Midday.	Se'ennight.	To-night.	Yesterday.	Threepence.
Midnight.	Cannot.	To-morrow.	Halfpenny.	and up to
Noonday.	To-day.	Yesternight.	Twopence.	Eleven pence.

So, too, are names with the prefix "St.," such as St. Philip's, St. Paul, &c.

19.—Abbreviations.—Abbreviations of auxiliary verbs designated by apostrophes (such as can't, won't, don't, I'll, you'll, couldn't, shouldn't, &c.) are counted as one word. By writing words in this way, however, there is a greater risk of error. The oblique stroke "/" when used with letters counts as a word except in the case of the following expressions: "o/o"; "a/c"; "B/L"; and "c/o" which are counted as one word each; a.m. and p.m. are counted as one word each.

20.—Numbers.—Numbers expressed in figures are counted at the rate of five figures to a word. For example, 73856 counts as one word. Fractions are counted according to the number of figures employed, one figure being added to the bar or mark of division between the numerator and denominator, thus, " $\frac{1}{2}$ " counts as one word, " $\frac{2}{3}$ " as one word, " $\frac{109}{100}$ " as two words.

In groups of figures a stop or oblique stroke is counted as a figure. In ordinal numbers the affixed st, nd, rd, or th, is counted as two figures thus, "1st" counts as one word, "1432nd" as two words.

21.—Compound Figures and Names.—Where a figure or a group of figures is followed or preceded by a letter (except in the case of ordinal numbers) the letter is counted as a word: thus, 104a or a104 counts as two words. A mark of division between the figures and the letter would count as an extra word: thus, a/104 would be counted as three words. All names are counted as compound words if composed of more than one word. For example, "La Bonne Intention" is counted as three words, "Mon Repos," two words. All names of Telegraph Offices, for which there are code words, are however counted as only one word each.

22.—Characters and Instructions.—When the sender desires words to be underlined, or placed in a parenthesis, or within inverted commas, two extra words are charged for. Stops are counted as one word if the sender desires them to be signalled. When the sender desires that special instructions, such as "private," "confidential," "to be opened at once," or the like, shall be written on the envelope of the message, he must write those instructions immediately after the address of the receiver. Instructions are charged for as part of the message, except in the case of the following special instructions as to delivery:—"By Estate's Messenger," "By Post," "To be left till called for."

23.—Failure to Deliver.—The sender, upon being informed that his message cannot be delivered in consequence of the addressee being unknown at the address furnished, must, should he furnish a correct address, or require the telegram to be presented a second time, pay the cost of a fresh telegram. In the latter case, should it afterwards turn out that the failure in the first instance was the fault of the Department, the extra charge will be refunded on application to the Postmaster General.

24.—Telegram may be Cancelled.—The sender may have his telegram cancelled, and if the application be made before the commencement of transmission the sum paid will be returned on application to the Postmaster General, but if transmission has commenced, no part of the sum paid for transmission will be returned. If transmission has been completed, an official telegram, prepaid, by the sender as an ordinary telegram, will be

sent to the Postmaster at the Terminal Office. In this case no part of the sums paid will be returned, but if the official telegram should arrive too late to accomplish its object, the sender will be informed that the attempt to cancel his telegram has failed.

25.—Delivery on Road or at Post Office.—If the addressee of a Telegram is known to the messenger, it may be delivered wherever on the road the messenger may meet him. When telegrams are addressed to a Telegraph Office to be called for, they are kept for two clear days; and if no application be made for them within that time, they are sent to the Chief Office, Georgetown.

26.—Interruption of Communication.—When in consequence of an interruption of communication a telegram cannot be transmitted to the Terminal Office, notice of the interruption is given to the sender.

27.—Indecent or Obscene Messages.—Telegrams which are indecently or obscenely worded, or which appear to contain matter of a libellous or grossly offensive character, will not be transmitted.

28.—Non-Responsibility of Post Office.—The Postmaster General is not liable for loss or damage which may be incurred or sustained through any mistakes or default in transmission, or delivery of a telegram. All claims for return of the cost of messages must be addressed to the Postmaster General.

29.—Late Messages.—All Telegraph Offices close at 5.30 p.m., and telegrams handed in after 5.15 p.m., therefore run the risk of not reaching their destination until the following morning. Postmasters may accept telegrams after 5.15 p.m., but, of course, they are not delivered until the following morning. However, provided that the terminal office is open and its attention can be gained. Upon each telegram so accepted, they are allowed to charge the following gratuities in addition to the cost of the message :—

12 cents to the officer dealing with the message at the forwarding office.
12 " " " " " " " receiving office.
12 " " " " " " " transmitting office,
if the message has to be transmitted.)
8 " " messenger who has to deliver the telegram.

30.— Foreign messages.—Telegrams addressed to places outside the colony, are accepted on payment of the Inland rate, plus the rate chargeable from Georgetown according to the tariff of the Cable Company.

31.—Messages Wired to be Posted.—Telegrams addressed to places outside the colony will be forwarded by post from Georgetown or other Station on payment of the ordinary charge for postage, in addition to the Inland telegraph rate. The words "post from ——— to ———" must be inserted by the sender in the address.

32.—Messages Posted for Transmission by Wire.
—Messages may be posted at any Post Office in this colony to be sent on by wire upon the arrival of the Mail Steamer. The telegram-letter should in such a case be addressed as follows:—

"TELEGRAM, IMMEDIATE!"

"The Superintendent on duty,"

"Post Office."

Every such telegram-letter must be fully prepaid at the ocean postage rate from this colony, and the message enclosed should bear the charge for transmission in the postage stamps of the United Kingdom affixed thereto by the sender. Under the Regulations of the Imperial Post Office telegrams posted insufficiently prepaid are forwarded and the deficiency charged to the addressee, but unpaid telegrams are not forwarded. The rates for transmission in England of inland telegrams are sixpence for first 12 words, and a half penny for each additional word. Addresses are charged for.

33.—News Messages.—Where the transmission of cable or other public news is desired by a resident in a country district arrangements may be made with the Post Office for the transmission of the same provided it will not delay the ordinary traffic. The charge is 12 cents for every 100 words or portion of that number of words.

34.—Preservation of Records.—The originals and copies of Telegrams are preserved for a period of twelve months from the date of transmission but within such period application may be made to the Postmaster General in writing by an interested party for the preservation for a further period of six months of any Telegram required for judicial proceedings.

PRESS MESSAGES.

35.—Charges.—Press telegrams addressed to newspapers published in British Guiana, and *bona fide* for insertion will be accepted at any Telegraph Office (provided in the case of messages exceeding 200 words in length, 24 hours' notice of intended despatch is given to the Postmaster General), between the hours of 7 a.m. and 10 a.m., and 3 p.m. and 5.30 p.m. The rate for transmission is 1/ for every 100 words, or portion of that number of words to each address, the charge to include the free delivery of the message within a mile of the terminal office.

36.—Conditions.—Press Messages must not be addressed to the Editor, Manager or other Officer. For example, a Press Message for the *Daily Chronicle*, must be handed in addressed, *Daily Chronicle*, Georgetown.

The following particulars will not be transmitted at the Press tariff :—

- (1.) Letters to Editor.
- (2.) Anything for the publication for which in a newspaper a money payment is usually required—as for example, Advertisements, and Notices of Births, Deaths and Marriages.
- (3.) Anything written either wholly or in part in cipher or in a foreign language.

37.—Repetition.—The receiver of a Press Message may obtain a repetition of any portion of it by payment of half the original cost of such portion; and if it appears that the portion repeated was in the first instance incorrectly transmitted, the amount paid for it will be refunded.

38.—May be Handed in in Portions.—Press Messages may be handed in, in portions, but in such cases in order that the several portions may be charged together as one telegram, the following rules must be observed :—

- (I.) The whole message must relate to one matter (as for example, a report of a speech or meeting) it must be complete in itself and such that the several portions of which it consists must be read consecutively in the order in which they are tendered so as to render the message intelligible.
- (II.) Each portion must be for the same newspaper or newspapers.

- (III.) The interval for handing in each portion must not exceed 30 minutes. When the interval of 30 minutes is exceeded the succeeding portion will be treated as regards charge for transmission as the commencement of a fresh telegram.

In the case of messages handed in in portions the words "more to follow" must be written at the foot of each portion except the last, which should contain the words "end of message." The words "continuation of (here give title of newspaper) message" should be written at the head of each portion after the first. These words are not charged for.

39.—Over-time Fees.—Press Messages will be accepted before 7 a.m., and after 5.30 p.m., provided sufficient notice is given to the Postmaster General to have the necessary arrangements made, and on payment of the following Fees :—

For every 500 words or portion of that number of words handed in, 6d. for the telegraphist at the forwarding office and the same amount for the telegraphist at the office to which the message is sent. These fees are chargeable to each person requiring the special accommodation, and are to be paid at the same time as the cost of the telegram.

40.—Ordinary Regulations Apply.—In all other respects, the Regulations in force in respect of ordinary private telegrams apply to Press Messages.

41.—Manuscript must be Legible.—To prevent errors in transmission, it is requested that all manuscript handed in be perfectly legible, and the Post Office will not be responsible for errors traceable to illegible handwriting. All manuscript should be written in ink.

42.—Private Messages may be given Precedence.—If private messages are handed in while the transmission of a Press message is taking place, it will be optional on the part of the District Postmaster to stop transmission until after the private message has been forwarded.

43.—Notice to Postmaster General.—The Postmaster General must be informed of the intended despatch of all telegrams exceeding 200 words in length. The notice must state the date and probable time of despatch, the number of words to be handed in, the newspaper or newspapers to which the report will be sent, and whether the message will be handed in complete or in portions.

44.—Porterage Charges.—The places to which telegrams may be sent and the Porterage charges thereon as follows:

SECTION IX.—TELEPHONE EXCHANGE SYSTEM.

TOWN AND SUBURBAN TELEPHONE SERVICES.

1.—Exchanges.—Georgetown Exchange (Metallic Circuit) for 600 renters—Continuous night and day service. New Amsterdam Exchange (Single Wire) for 100 renters—Hours of attendance, week-days, 6.30 a.m. to 10 p.m., and Sundays, 8 a.m. to 10 a.m.; 3 p.m. to 9 p.m.

2.—Agreement.—In the case of every Telephone Wire and Apparatus let on lease, a Memorandum of Agreement must be made and signed by the Postmaster General, of the one part, and the Renter of such Wire and Apparatus, of the other part.

Where any connection with an Exchange is desired which exceeds two miles in length, the Postmaster General may first require that an agreement be signed by the applicant binding himself to hold the wire for a period of three, five, seven, or ten years as may be determined upon in such case.

3.—Charges within Town.—The annual rent charged for each telephone line and apparatus within a limit of two miles from the Exchange is as follows:—

4.—Charges for Country Connections.—For services beyond such distance, there is charged a further annual rental, this is to say,—

(a.) Where poles are already erected, for each additional quarter of a mile or portion thereof, the sum of \$2 50; and

(b.) Where the service involves the erection of new poles, for each additional quarter of a mile or portion thereof, the sum of \$5 00.

In addition to the above charges the Postmaster General may, if he think fit, before commencing to erect a Telephone, require a deposit of any sum not exceeding Five Dollars to cover the cost of erection of such Telephone, in case the Renters fails to pay the first year's rent.

5.—Business Premises.—The term "business premises" includes any room or place adjacent to any store or shop, and occupied by the same person, and any Hotel or Club.

6.—Joint Connection.—Two or more persons occupying offices in the same building may be connected up under the same Exchange number on payment of the usual rental for connection with the Exchange and an additional rental of six dollars per annum for every additional set of Telephone Apparatus supplied.

7.—Additional Apparatus.—Where the Renter requires more than one set of Telephone Apparatus for use in the same building the rent of such additional Apparatus, including a switch, shall be six dollars per annum. If in a separate building a special charge is made according to the distance.

8.—Local Switch Boards.—Local Switch-Boards when required are supplied and afterwards maintained at an annual rental of \$2 50, the Renter to provide, at his own cost, for the attendance at the same. The Rent of each extra set of Telephone Apparatus connected to a Local Switch-Board is Five Dollars per annum, over and above the charge for the first connection with the Exchange.

9.—Extra Names.—The names of Partners in Firms and names in addition to those of the Renter, may be inserted in the Telephone List, at the request of the Renter, in connection with his number, for an extra charge:—For each additional entry, 10 cents.

10.—Special Rates.—In cases where natural difficulties and extra expense or natural difficulties or extra expense are or is involved in the construction or maintenance of a Telephone Line the Government reserves to itself the right of charging special rates.

11.—Payable in Advance.—All charges shall be payable at the General Post Office quarterly in advance after the expiration of the first year, and for the first year such charges shall be payable in advance, unless an express provision is embodied in the aforesaid Memorandum of Agreement to rent the Wire and Apparatus for a period of 12 months, in which case such charges shall be payable quarterly in advance. The Service will be discontinued, and the Wire and Apparatus be removed, if the rent is not paid within 10 days after it has become due.

12.—Alterations.—A new change of residence by the Renter will be treated as a new Service unless the additional expense incurred in the removal is borne by the Renter. The Postmaster General may, if he thinks fit, before commencing such removal, require a deposit of any sum not exceeding Five Dollars to cover the cost thereof.

13.—Damages to be made Good.—Any damage to the Wire and Apparatus arising through the wilful act or default of the Renter, or his servants or agents, shall be made good at his expense, and the Renter shall on demand, repay to the Postmaster General the cost thereof. No alteration shall be made in the Wire or Apparatus, either permanently or temporarily, except with the permission in writing of the Postmaster General. In the event of partial or total destruction by fire or other causes of the Apparatus supplied for the use of a Renter, such Renter shall be liable for the cost of replacing the same.

14.—Restriction as to Use.—The use of the Telephone is restricted to the individual, firm, corporation or house represented by the Renter; and in any case where it is found that the Telephone has been made use of by some person other than the Renter or on his behalf, the Postmaster General may discontinue the Service by notice in writing as from the time of the service of such notice or from any other time specified in such notice, but such discontinuance shall not affect the right of the Postmaster General to recover any rent or other money which may be arrear or unpaid.

15.—Accident to Wire or Apparatus.—In case of accident to the Wire or Apparatus, every effort shall be made to repair the same as soon as possible after the receipt by the Electrician of a written notice of such accident from the Renter; but the Postmaster General shall not be liable for any

loss occasioned by the total or partial interruption of Telephonic communication, nor shall any abatement be made from the rent by reason of such interruption.

16.—Notice to be given of Discontinuance.—

Where the Renter desires the Service to be discontinued, he shall give to the Postmaster General one month's notice in writing to that effect, and, on the expiration of such period, the Agreement between the Postmaster General and the Renter shall be deemed to have terminated. The Postmaster General may give the Renter one month's notice in writing that he intends to discontinue the Service, and, on the expiration of such period, the Agreement between the Postmaster General and the Renter shall be deemed to have terminated. On the termination of an Agreement, the Postmaster General, or any person authorized by him in writing, may enter at any reasonable time on the land or buildings of the Renter where the Wire and Apparatus are fixed, for the purpose of removing the same.

COUNTRY SERVICE.

17.—Private Wires.—All the provisions of the foregoing Regulations so far they are not inapplicable thereto, apply to Country Telephone Services, but subject as follows, that is to say,—

- (1.) Where a private wire is led into a Country Postal Telegraph Office, there is charged for such wire an annual rental, that is to say,—
 - (a.) Where poles are already erected, for each quarter of a mile or portion thereof, the sum of \$3; and
 - (b.) Where the Service involves the erection of new poles, for each quarter of a mile or portion thereof, the sum of \$6;
- (2.) The rent for each set of Telephone Apparatus is \$10 per annum, and such charge includes maintenance; repairs, and renewals;
- (3.) Ordinary switches when required are supplied and afterwards maintained at an annual rental of \$1 each. Switches, if specially made to suit the requirements of the Renter, are charged for specially.

- (4.) Where a wire is led into a Postal Telegraph Office, a charge is made for desk accommodation and Clerk's services of \$24 per annum.

18.—Charges Payable in Advance.—All charges must be paid yearly in advance, and each private wire Renter is required to sign a Memorandum of Agreement, binding himself to rent the wire or apparatus, or both, for a period of three years at least. Where a Renter desires to take a wire for a longer period than three years, the above-mentioned terms may be modified.

19.—Country Exchange.—Where a sufficient number of wires are led into a Postal Telegraph Office the Postmaster General may open an Exchange and provide means whereby any two wires may be joined together at will in order that messages may be transmitted direct by one private wire Renter to another. Where an Exchange is opened, the terms to each Renter may be modified, subject to such Regulations as may be made in that behalf.
