CONDITIONS UPON WHICH METERED MAIL WILL BE ACCEPTED WITHOUT STAMPS AFFIXED AS PROVIDED BY SECTIONS 435½ AND 452, POSTAL LAWS AND REGULATIONS

Metered mail.—Matter mailed without stamps affixed under sections 435½ and 452, Postal Laws and Regulations, on which the required indicia are printed by means of a device having recording mechanism to be set by the postmaster for a given number of impressions or a certain amount of postage and which automatically locks when such impressions or amounts of postage have been exhausted, is commonly referred to as "metered mail." The following conditions apply to metered mail:

1. *Application for permit.*—Persons or firms desiring permits for mailing, without stamps affixed, first, third, or fourth class matter, or second-class matter chargeable with the transient rate or the rates applicable to copies mailed for local delivery by carrier at letter-carrier offices, as metered mail, should apply to the postmaster personally or through a representative who is thoroughly informed as to the matter to be mailed and authorized to act for the applicant. Permits will be issued and the matter will be accepted for mailing, including that (except third-class matter mailed under the provisions of sec. 435½, P. L. and R.) addressed to all foreign countries in the Universal Postal Union, under the provisions of the regulations above mentioned and under the conditions herein set forth.

2. *Only approved devices to be used.*—Only such devices as have been approved by the Post Office Department and which have recording mechanism to be set by the postmaster for a given number of impressions or a certain amount of postage, and which automatically lock when such impressions or amounts of postage have been exhausted, may be used for printing the prescribed indicia on metered mail. Such devices shall in every instance be obtained from the person or concern to whom such approval has been given, and such person or concern shall maintain control of the device and be responsible for the proper servicing and maintenance of it in such manner that it will operate correctly and in accordance with the postal requirements. All applications for permits for metered mail must be sent to the Third Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Classification, and be accompanied with a specimen imprint of the indicia to be used on the mailings. The application must give the name of the device and be accompanied with a sample of the envelopes to be used.

3. (a) *Indicia.*—In the upper right corner of the face or address side of the envelope, wrapper, address label, or tag of each separately addressed piece mailed under these provisions, or on an approved label or sticker properly affixed thereto,

must be printed the indicia, which may be in the form and within the sizes illustrated below, such indicia not to be obstructed or confused with any other matter whatever:

(b) On first-class metered matter the amount of postage paid in money, permit number, name of the post office, and date of mailing shall be printed.

(c) The indicia illustrated above may be used on metered matter of the second, third, or fourth class by omitting the date. In the case of third-class matter mailed under the provisions of section 435½, Postal Laws and Regulations, the inscription "Sec. 435½, P. L. & R.," must be printed above the term "U. S. Postage."

(d) The indicia for matter on which the postage is 2 cents or more may be in red or in any color of sufficiently strong contrast to the paper upon which printed.

The indicia for matter on which the postage is less than 2 cents may be of any color other than red which is of sufficiently strong contrast to the paper on which printed.

In all cases the permit indicia on matter addressed to those countries of the Universal Postal Union to which matter is not mailable under the domestic conditions and rates of postage must be in red.

(e) The name of the postal station of the mailing office at which the matter is presented for mailing, may, if desired, be shown in the outer circle in connection with the name of the post office; also an hour may be shown in the indicia in connection with the date of mailing of first-class matter, and in such case the matter should be presented for mailing in ample time to be dispatched at the hour so indicated.

4. (a) *Preparation and presentation of matter for mailing.*—Each separately addressed piece should bear, in the upper left corner of the address side, the name and address of the sender, including the street address or number of his post-office box when the office is one having letter-carrier service. If, however, the sender does not desire to show his name or street address, or either, in the return card, the number of a post-office box rented by him may, in the case of ordinary mail, be shown in lieu thereof in connection with the name of the post office and State. When the sender desires to omit the return card from third-class matter and does not care to have the matter returned if undeliverable, the matter may be so accepted, provided it is not inclosed in window envelopes, but this practice is discouraged, since it is desirable to have the return card in all cases. Matter other than that of the first class must be wrapped or enveloped so as to be easy of inspection by postal officials.

(b) To facilitate the handling of such matter in the mails, the mailer must in all cases face the matter, and in the case of matter of the second, third, or fourth class must comply with requests of the postmaster for the separation thereof into States, cities, etc. Matter of the first class, especially large mailings of identical pieces, should, as a means of cooperation, also be so separated by the mailer in

cases where this is practicable, and such separation will expedite its handling and dispatch.

(c) The matter, regardless of its class, must be presented at the post office or station thereof designated by the postmaster. In no case may such matter be deposited in street letter boxes.

In a few unusual situations where it seems to be advantageous to the post office itself, certain "pick-up" arrangements exist. While the department does not favor the "pick-up" system as applied to private mailing, and aims eventually to eliminate this entirely, nevertheless, where such cases exist and the mailer desires to change from the stamp system to the permit system, the "pick-up" privilege may be continued in the discretion of the department under such arrangements and precautions as may be prescribed in each case, but in no instance may the matter be picked up unless turned over to the "pick-up" carrier by the mailer or his representative together with the statement of mailing provided for herein.

Metered matter of the first class may be presented in any quantity and need not be identical as to contents or weight. The pieces comprising a mailing of first-class matter on which the indicia are printed by a single-denomination printing device must be separated according to postage paid—i. e., those subject to 2 cents each to be in one lot, those subject to 4 cents each in another lot, and so on. The pieces comprising a mailing on which the indicia are printed by a multi-denomination printing device must be separated so that those subject to 2 cents postage each will be in one lot, those subject to 4 cents each in another lot, and those subject to more than 4 cents each in another lot.

Matter of the second and third classes mailed under the provisions of section 452, Postal Laws and Regulations, must be presented in quantities of NOT LESS than 300 identical pieces and matter of the fourth class in quantities of not less than 250 identical pieces.

Bulk mailings of identical pieces of third-class matter under the provisions of section 435 $\frac{1}{2}$, Postal Laws and Regulations, must be presented in quantities of not less than either 20 pounds or 200 pieces.

Each mailing of metered mail must be accompanied with a statement on Form 3602-A, signed by the person to whom the permit is issued, showing the permit number, the class of matter, meter number, readings of registers for last piece, the number of pieces then presented or, if the indicia were printed by a multi-denomination printing device, the amount of postage represented by the pieces comprising the mailing covered by the statement, value of the impressions made but not used, with reason for nonuse, and, when the pieces are identical, the weight of a single piece.

When a mailing of second, third, or fourth class matter extends over two or more consecutive days and the number of pieces presented on the last day to complete the mailing is less than above prescribed such number will be accepted.

(d) Each separately addressed package may contain a number of different pieces, but every package in a mailing of second, third, or fourth class matter must contain exactly the same matter; that is, be "identical." The parcels in a mailing of identical pieces of fourth-class matter may be addressed to different zones.

(e) When matter of the first, second, or third class mailed without stamps affixed is accepted for registration, it shall bear on the address side the complete indicia prescribed in paragraph 3 of these conditions, except that in the case of first-class matter the circle containing the date and name of the post office and State shall be omitted and the matter shall be postmarked on the back of the envelope as prescribed by paragraph 3, section 874, Postal Laws and Regulations.

5. (a) *Verification of mailer's statement.*—Mailings of second, third, and fourth class matter must be verified by one of the methods set forth on the front cover page of the book of receipts, Form 3603, preferably by the weight and ratio process.

(b) In the case of first-class metered matter such examinations shall be made as will enable the receiving employees to ascertain that the particular mailing presented is from an authorized metered permit holder, that the impressions of permit indicia on individual pieces are of the requisite denomination to pay the full postage chargeable, that the date and hour of mailing indicated in the indicia are right, and that the matter otherwise complies with the postal requirements. Each mailing shall be examined to such extent as may be necessary to satisfy the postmaster or the employees designated to receive the matter that the number of pieces as shown by the statement is correct. At least once a week all the pieces comprising such a mailing shall be carefully verified by applying the weight

and ratio process or, if this is not sufficiently accurate, by making a hand count or by running the pieces through a canceling machine after removing the canceling device.

(c) For the purpose of making such examinations and verifications provided for herein the postmaster shall designate some convenient place in his office to which all such mailings shall be brought; and he shall place in charge of such work some responsible employee or employees whose duty it shall be to personally receive such mailings and make such examinations and verifications thereof.

The purpose of such examinations and verifications is to determine the accuracy of the count, to detect possible frauds, and, in short, to secure fully paid and prepaid postage.

(d) The attention of postmasters is directed to their full responsibilities in these respects.

6. (a) *Postage.*—The postage at the rate applicable to the class to which the particular matter belongs is chargeable upon each piece or package for a separate address, the same as if paid by stamps affixed thereto, except in the case of third-class matter mailed at the bulk pound rates under the provisions of section 435½, Postal Laws and Regulations. Credit for postage shall never be allowed.

(b) The mailer must bring the meter or printing and recording head to the post office and have the postmaster set it for a given number of impressions or amount of postage, to be paid at the time the device is set. Such devices may not be used until they shall first have been checked into service and sealed at the local post office. All the keys to the device must remain in the custody of the postmaster. In such case a receipt for the amount so collected will be issued to the mailer on Form 3603 instead of a receipt for each mailing as presented; but the mailer must submit with each mailing a "statement of mailing" on Form 3602-A, such statement to be verified in the manner set forth in paragraph 5 (b).

(c) The postage must be fully prepaid and the indicia should show the correct amount, but when there is an occasional instance in which through inadvertence or unavoidable cause the indicia do not show the full amount chargeable on the matter, the additional postage may be paid with stamps affixed. The senders should not, however, intentionally prepare matter for mailing with postage prepaid by two methods, as this is objectionable and not sanctioned. When the indicia are printed by a multi-denomination printing device and it is necessary to print more than one denomination or more than one impression of a denomination on the same piece of mail to cover the full amount of postage chargeable thereon, the circle forming a part of the postage indicia in which is contained the name of the post office and State should be shown only once on the piece of mail, the other part or several parts of the required postage indicia being printed in the upper right portion of the address side to the right of that part of the postage indicia showing the name of the post office and State in the circle. These indicia must be so printed that no one part will overlap another and must not be placed over the return card, the address or any other matter appearing on the address side.

(d) In the event the printing and recording mechanism of any metered device fails to record its operations correctly and properly, the permit holder must immediately discontinue the use of the device and deliver it to the local postmaster to be checked out of service before correction or replacement is made.

7. *Improper use of permit indicia.*—Envelopes, wrappers, labels, or tags bearing metered permit indicia must not be used for distributing matter *otherwise than through the mails, and may not be used at a post office other than the one the name of which appears in the indicia.* Permits will be revoked in cases of the misuse of such envelopes, wrappers, etc.

8. *Monthly statement to mailer.*—A monthly statement showing the number of mailings during the month and the amount of postage paid thereon will be sent to the holder of each permit. This provides the sender of the mail with a means of checking and verifying the sums charged him for postage. If no mailings were made during the month, the statement should be so indorsed.

9. *Refunds.*—When impressions paid for in connection with a device set by a postmaster can not be used because of misprints, spoiled envelopes, or cards, etc., an application for a refund of the postage to the extent of 90 per cent of the face value of such impressions up to and including the 2-cent denomination and to the extent of 95 per cent of the face value of impressions of greater denominations, if accompanied with the envelopes or cards bearing complete impressions, will be considered under the provisions of section 456, Postal Laws and Regulations.

10. For any further information or instructions regarding the acceptance of permit matter postmasters should address the Third Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Classification.

CONDITIONS UPON WHICH NONMETERED MAIL WILL BE ACCEPTED WITHOUT STAMPS AFFIXED AS PROVIDED BY SECTIONS 435½ AND 452, POSTAL LAWS AND REGULATIONS

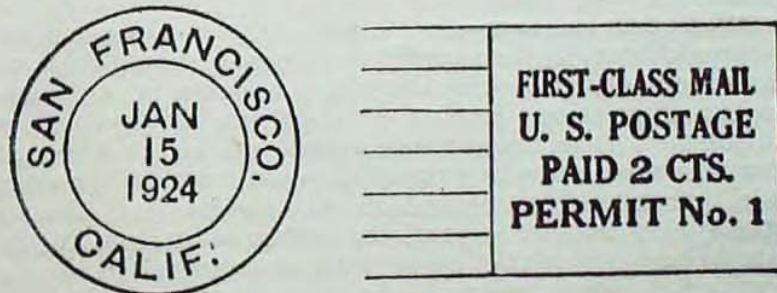
Nonmetered mail.—Matter mailed without stamps affixed under sections 435½ and 452, Postal Laws and Regulations, on which the required indicia are printed by means of a device not having recording mechanism to be set by the postmaster for a given number of impressions or a certain amount of postage to be paid for at the time of setting is commonly referred to as "nonmetered mail." The following conditions apply to nonmetered mail:

1. *Application for permit.*—Persons or firms desiring permits for mailing without stamps affixed first, third, or fourth class matter, or second-class matter chargeable with the transient rate or the rates applicable to copies mailed for local delivery by carrier at letter-carrier offices, as nonmetered mail, should apply to the postmaster personally or through a representative who is thoroughly informed as to the matter to be mailed and authorized to act for the applicant. Permits will be issued and the matter will be accepted for mailing, including that (except third-class matter mailed under the provisions of section 435½, P. L. and R.) addressed to all foreign countries in the Universal Postal Union, under the provisions of the regulations above mentioned and under the conditions herein set forth.

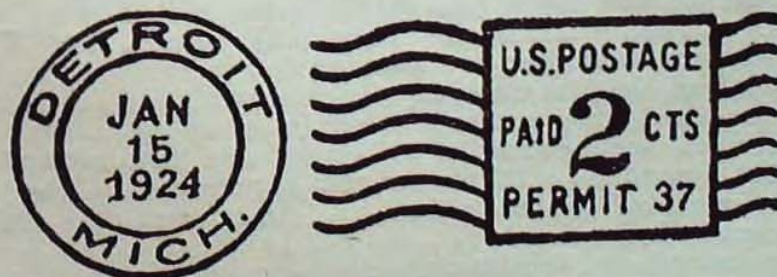
2. *Where applications are to be sent.*—All applications for permits for nonmetered first-class mail must be sent to the Third Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Classification, and be accompanied with a specimen imprint of the indicia to be used on the mailings. The application must give the name of the device and be accompanied with a sample of the envelopes to be used.

3. (a) *Indicia.*—In the upper right corner of the face or address side of the envelope, wrapper, address label, or tag of each separately addressed piece mailed under these provisions, or on a label or sticker properly affixed thereto, must be printed the indicia which may be in the form and within the sizes illustrated below, such indicia not to be obstructed or confused with any other matter whatever.

(b) On nonmetered first-class matter the amount of postage paid in money, permit number, name of the post office, and date of mailing shall be printed in one of the forms, A or B, and approximately of the size indicated above, the diameter of the outer circle to be not less than 1½ inches and the entire indicia to extend over not more than 4 inches nor less than 3 inches.

(c) On nonmetered matter of the second, third, or fourth class the forms prescribed for first-class matter may be used by omitting the date and, in the case of Form A, omitting the words "First-class mail," or Form D, indicated below, may be used. On matter of the third class mailed under the provisions of section

435½, Postal Laws and Regulations, the inscription "Sec. 435½, P. L. & R." must be printed above the term "U. S. Postage" in all cases. In case Form D is used the figure representing the amount paid in money shall be printed from type not smaller than 14-point nor larger than 36-point and the other indicia not smaller than 10-point nor larger than 24-point. The amount of postage paid may be omitted from the indicia on nonmetered third-class matter mailed under section 435½, Postal Laws and Regulations.

(d) The indicia for matter on which the postage is 2 cents or more may be in red or in any color of sufficiently strong contrast to the paper upon which printed.

The indicia for matter on which the postage is less than 2 cents may be of any color other than red which is of sufficiently strong contrast to the paper on which printed.

In all cases the permit indicia on matter addressed to those countries of the Universal Postal Union to which matter is not mailable under the domestic conditions and rates of postage must be in red.

(e) The name of the postal station of the mailing office at which the matter is presented for mailing may, if desired, be shown in the outer circle in connection with the name of the post office; also an hour may be shown in the indicia in connection with the date of mailing of first-class matter, and in such case the matter should be presented for mailing in ample time to be dispatched at the hour so indicated.

4. (a) *Preparation and presentation of matter for mailing.*—Each separately addressed piece should bear, in the upper left corner of the address side, the name and address of the sender, including the street address or number of his post-office box when the office is one having letter-carrier service. (b) To facilitate the handling of such matter in the mails, the mailer must in all cases face the matter, and in the case of matter of the second, third, or fourth class must comply with requests of the postmaster for the separation thereof into States, cities, etc. Matter of the first class, especially large mailings of identical pieces, should, as a means of cooperation, also be so separated by the mailer in cases where this is practicable, and such separation will expedite its handling and dispatch.

(c) The matter, regardless of its class, must be presented at the post office or station thereof designated by the postmaster. In no case may such matter be deposited in street letter boxes.

Matter of the second and third classes mailed under the provisions of section 452, Postal Laws and Regulations, must be presented in quantities of NOT LESS than 300 identical pieces and matter of the fourth class in quantities of not less than 250 identical pieces.

Bulk mailings of identical pieces of third-class matter under the provisions of section 435½, Postal Laws and Regulations, must be presented in quantities of not less than either 20 pounds or 200 pieces.

The individual pieces of nonmetered first-class matter must be identical as to weight: *Provided*, That persons and concerns given a permit prior to June 8, 1928, to mail nonidentical pieces of first-class matter as nonmetered mail may continue to do so during the life of any special machine they acquired for that particular purpose before June 8, 1928.

Each mailing of nonmetered first-class matter must, in order to make it advantageous to the Postal Service as well as the mailer, consist of not less than 300 pieces. When, however, in occasional instances a mailer whose mailings of such first-class matter ordinarily consist of 300 pieces or more may have a smaller quantity, or when in order to cooperate with the Postal Service a mailer whose total daily mailings may not be much in excess of 300 pieces, presents a portion thereof early in the day, such mailings will be accepted, provided it will be to the mutual advantage of the mailer and the Postal Service to do so.

The pieces comprising a mailing of first-class matter must be separated according to postage paid—i. e., those subject to 2 cents each to be in one lot, those subject to 4 cents each in another lot, and so on.

Each mailing of nonmetered permit matter must be accompanied with a statement on Form 3602, signed by the person to whom the permit is issued, showing the permit number, the class of matter, the number of pieces then presented, and the weight of a single piece. In the case of third-class matter mailed under the provisions of section 435½, Postal Laws and Regulations, on which postage is paid at the pound rate, the mailer's statement on Form 3602 shall show the number of pounds presented and such other information as may be provided for on the form.

When a mailing of first, second, third, or fourth class matter extends over two or more consecutive days and the number of pieces presented on the last day to complete the mailing is less than above prescribed, or in the case of first-class matter a day's mailing may, for the reasons above set forth, consist of less than the minimum number of pieces prescribed, such number will be accepted and an explanatory indorsement made on receipt Form 3603, as contemplated by paragraph 6, section 452, Postal Laws and Regulations.

(d) Each separately addressed package may contain a number of different pieces, but every package in a mailing of second, third, or fourth class matter must contain exactly the same matter; that is, be "identical." The parcels in a mailing of identical pieces of fourth-class matter may be addressed to different zones.

(e) When matter of the first, second, or third class mailed without stamps affixed is accepted for registration, it shall bear on the address side the complete indicia prescribed in paragraph 3 of these conditions, except that in the case of first-class matter the circle containing the name of the post office and State shall be omitted and the matter shall be postmarked on the back of the envelope as provided by paragraph 3, section 874, Postal Laws and Regulations.

5. (a) *Verification of mailer's statement.*—Mailings of second, third, and fourth class matter, regardless of the means by which the indicia are printed thereon, must be verified by one of the methods set forth on the front cover page of the book of receipts, Form 3603, preferably by the weight and ratio process.

(b) Each mailing of nonmetered first-class matter shall be examined to see that it is from an authorized permit holder, that the impressions of permit indicia are of the requisite denomination to pay the full postage, that the date and hour of mailing shown in the indicia are right, that the matter otherwise complies with postal requirements, and each mailing shall be carefully verified in such manner as may be necessary in order to determine the number of pieces therein and whether they correspond with the number shown in the mailer's statement so as to ascertain the proper amount of postage to be collected or charged against the mailer's deposit. If the pieces comprising such mailings are identical as to weight, they may be verified by the weight and ratio process set forth in the instructions on the front cover page of the book of receipts, Form 3603. When the pieces comprising such mailings are not identical as to weight, they may be verified by the weight and ratio process if by reason of the fact that they run approximately uniform it is practical to verify them in such manner. (Nonidentical pieces of nonmetered first-class mail may be accepted only from persons and concerns given a permit prior to June 8, 1928, to mail such matter, and then only during the life of the special machine acquired for that particular purpose before that date.) If it is not practical to verify the pieces by the weight and ratio process, they shall be verified by such means as will establish the correctness of the mailer's statement either by actual count of the pieces or by running them through a canceling machine after removing therefrom the canceling device.

(c) For the purpose of making such examinations and verifications provided for herein the postmaster shall designate some convenient place in his office to which all such mailings shall be brought; and he shall place in charge of such work some responsible employee or employees whose duty it shall be to personally receive such mailings and make such examinations and verifications thereof.

The purpose of such examinations and verifications is to determine the accuracy of the count, to detect possible frauds, and, in short, to secure fully paid and pre-paid postage.

(d) All first-class matter, irrespective of the kind of device by means of which the indicia are printed, should be handled and dispatched as promptly as the facilities available will permit.

(e) The attention of postmasters is directed to their full responsibilities in these respects.

6. (a) *Postage.*—The postage at the rate applicable to the class to which the particular matter belongs is chargeable upon each piece or package for a separate address, the same as if paid by stamps affixed thereto, except in the case of third-class matter mailed at the bulk rate of 12 cents or 8 cents a pound under section 435½, Postal Laws and Regulations. Postage in full on the entire quantity must be paid at or before the time the matter is presented for mailing, either in money, or, at the option of the postmaster and at his risk, by check drawn to his order. The postmaster may receive from the mailer a deposit of money in advance (for which a receipt shall be given) sufficient to pay for more than a single mailing. The deposit shall be charged with the proper amount of each mailing, but if the amount on hand is not sufficient at any time to cover the postage due on the entire mailing, the excess shall be held until an additional deposit is made. Credit for postage shall never be allowed.

(b) The postage must be fully prepaid and the indicia must show the correct amount, except in the case of third-class matter mailed under section 435½, Postal Laws and Regulations. The postage may not be prepaid by two methods—that is, partly in money and partly by stamps affixed—as this is objectionable and not sanctioned.

7. *Improper use of permit indicia.*—Envelopes, wrappers, labels, or tags bearing permit indicia must not be used for distributing matter *otherwise than through the mails, and may not be used at a post office other than the one the name of which appears in the indicia.* Permits will be revoked in cases of the misuse of such envelopes, wrappers, etc.

8. *Monthly statement to mailer.*—A monthly statement showing the number of mailings during the month and the amount of postage paid thereon will be sent to the holder of each permit. This provides the sender of the mail with a means of checking and verifying the sums charged him for postage. If no mailings were made during the month, the statement should be so indorsed.

9. For any further information or instructions regarding the acceptance of permit matter postmasters should address the Third Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Classification.

CHANGE IN CONVERSION RATES

ORDER No. 8610.

FEBRUARY 28, 1929.

It is ordered that on and after March 4, 1929, in the issue of postal money orders the money of the United States shall be converted into that of the Netherlands and the Netherland East Indies at the rate of \$0.40 to the florin and into that of Spain at the rate of \$0.16 to the peseta.

PRESERVATION AND ASSEMBLING OF HISTORICAL POSTAL DATA

ORDER No. 8611.

FEBRUARY 28, 1929.

It is ordered that special consideration be given to the collection, preservation, and the assembly in the department of historical postal data, including that of departmental and field service. The object should be to make, as near as practicable, a collection of such information, which should be preserved and made available for use, and avoid the possible destruction or loss which may otherwise occur. It will not be the purpose to take from a local custodian important historical data which, for special reasons, should be so retained. In such case information with reference to its existence and character should be furnished and where duplicates may be had and copies made without specific expense, these should be added to the collection in the department.

Postal officials are therefore requested to make a survey from time to time of matter under their jurisdiction and communicate with the department with reference thereto.

Among the objects which may fall under such a survey would be old records, early maps and post routes, graphic or photographic representations of the

service in any of its features, local postal histories, either printed or manuscript, old reports, personal recollections of the service reduced to writing or printed, etc.

The collection will be assembled by and in charge of Mr. Joseph Stewart, Executive Assistant to the Postmaster General.

GEORGE ROGERS CLARK COMMEMORATIVE STAMP

Postmasters and others connected with the Postal Service are notified that the department has issued a new 2-cent George Rogers Clark postage stamp to commemorate the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the surrender of Fort Sackville.

The new stamp is the same shape and size as the 5-cent air mail stamp, $1\frac{3}{32}$ by $1\frac{15}{32}$ inches, and is printed in two colors—the border in red and the vignette in black. The central design shows the surrender of Fort Sackville at Vincennes, Ind., to George Rogers Clark, reproduced from a photograph of the painting by Frederick C. Yohn. The word "Vincennes" appears beneath the central design, and at the top of the stamp are the words "U. S. Postage" in white Roman letters. Above the vignette is a ribbon bearing the words "George Rogers Clark," with the word "Commemorative" in a curved panel directly beneath. In panels on either side of the stamp are acanthus scrolls and in both upper corners are the years "1779" at the left and "1929" at the right. In both lower corners within circles with dark backgrounds is the white numeral "2" with the word "Cents" at the bottom of the stamp.

The new George Rogers Clark stamp was first placed on sale February 25, 1929, at the post office at Vincennes, Ind., and for the benefit of stamp collectors and dealers it was placed on sale the following day, February 26, at the Philatelic Agency, Division of Stamps, Post Office Department. These stamps will also be placed on sale at other post offices as promptly after February 25 as production will permit.

Central and direct accounting postmasters desiring a supply of the new stamp may draw requisitions for limited quantities on Form 3201, the words "Clark Commemorative Stamps" to be written plainly on the blank. District postmasters may obtain small quantities of this stamp to meet the local demand by requisition on their central-accounting postmasters.

The following notice, which appeared on page 1 of the January, 1921, Supplement of the Postal Guide is republished.

SALARY VOUCHERS ON CHANGE OF POSTMASTER, FIRST AND SECOND CLASS OFFICES

At first and second class post offices, upon change of postmaster between regular pay days, no additional salary payment will be made. The outgoing postmaster need not submit with his final account to the Comptroller the vouchers covering salary payments made by him during the quarter in which the change occurs, but will submit instead disbursement summaries (Forms 1500, 1501, 1858, 1906) showing in detail all salary payments made by him on regular pay days during that quarter. He will also note in red-ink figures at the top of each individual salary voucher the amount of salary he has actually paid to each employee during the quarter and which was included in the disbursement summary.

The incoming postmaster will claim credit in his account for all salaries paid by him to the close of the quarter, including amounts earned and accrued during the term of his predecessor, but not paid until the regular pay day following the transfer. He will also submit with his account the vouchers covering all salary

payments during the quarter, and disbursement summaries showing in detail all payments made by him.

These instructions should also be observed in every case where a final account is required to be rendered although the same postmaster continues in office.

AIR MAIL—SELL IT TO THE PUBLIC

At all air mail exchange offices as well as offices not directly on air mail routes, where the air mail service may be used to advantage, postmasters are directed to make its use by patrons as easy and attractive as possible with the facilities available. The widest possible publicity should be given to the advantages of the use of the air mail service and how it may be used. Such information is real news and newspapers will gladly publish it.

Every postal facility should be adapted to make the use of the air mail service convenient and to facilitate the dispatch of the air mail. Simple prerequisites for securing air mail service are the necessary postage with the indorsement "VIA AIR MAIL" and a convenient place of dispatch.

Every street letter box in cities so connected with air mail exchange offices as to make the use of the air mail service advantageous should be available for the dispatch of air mail. Time cards, arranged to show the time when air mail must be deposited for dispatch may be secured on requisition of the Fourth Assistant, Division of Equipment and Supplies. Postmasters who have not already done so are directed to equip street letter boxes with these time cards and to make public announcement of the fact that street letter boxes are available for the dispatch of air mail if deposited therein within hours which will connect with air mail schedules.

The schedules of the dispatches of mail from post office stations should be adjusted, if necessary and feasible, so as to connect with air mail dispatches and the public should be informed as to stations convenient to their places of business or residences where air mail may be dispatched.

In giving publicity to the advantages of the air mail service, full information should be furnished not only of air mail schedules showing time of arrival at destination, but also in cities not on air mail routes with schedules of trains connecting with air mail dispatches and what is more important, the difference in time in favor of the use of the air mail service.

The value of air mail service to any community depends on the publicity which the postmaster gives to it and its advantages to the patrons of his office, and making it as easy to use as the ordinary mail.

VEHICLE HIRE FROM POSTAL EMPLOYEES LIMITED TO CITY CARRIERS

Legislation has been enacted authorizing the rental of vehicles from letter carriers for use in the city delivery service.

The effect of the legislation is to sanction the rental of vehicles from letter carriers in accordance with the practice which has prevailed for the past several years, and to prohibit the rental of vehicles which may be owned by postmasters, postal clerks, or other postal employees. It does not affect the rental of vehicles from private parties.

In the light of this legislation it will be necessary to discontinue immediately the use of any vehicle in the city delivery service owned by a postal employee other than a letter carrier. It is not believed that the General Accounting Office will question payments made up to the present time, but the use of such vehicles must be discontinued immediately.

Postmasters using their own vehicles or vehicles owned by postal employees other than letter carriers should arrange immediately for the rental of a vehicle either from a letter carrier or from any private party who may be interested in submitting a proposal to provide this service. The rental of vehicles should be based on competitive bids in the same manner as heretofore.

NAMES ON APARTMENT HOUSE MAIL RECEPTACLES

In order to facilitate the work of the carriers, especially substitute carriers, and promote more efficient delivery service and reduce the number of undelivered pieces of mail addressed to tenants in apartment houses, it is essential that each apartment house mail receptacle show each tenant's name, as well as the name of all persons receiving mail in tenant's care.

The carrier, of course, can not be expected to take this matter up with the individual tenant, and it is difficult to obtain the cooperation of the manager, superintendent, janitor, or telephone girl where there are such persons in charge of the premises, and in order to reach the tenant direct there has been devised a form, No. 1801, which reads as follows:

NOTICE REQUIRING IMMEDIATE ATTENTION

In order to avoid risk of delay and possible loss of your mail, please place your name and the names of ANY PERSONS receiving mail in your care on your letter box without delay.

Mail intended for those whose names are not on the letter box must be addressed in care of the person whose name does appear or it is likely to be treated as undeliverable and sent to the dead-letter office or returned to sender.

Your letter box should be kept locked at all times, as otherwise your mail will be exposed to depredation.

Experience in the use of this form may show that the first notice is not heeded. In such cases, a second notice should be placed in the tenant's mail receptacle. If the first two notices are ignored, a third notice should be left. In other words, there should be a systematic follow-up in order to obtain the desired result.

Requisitions should be made on the Fourth Assistant, Division of Equipment and Supplies, for an adequate supply of this form to be placed by city carriers in all mail receptacles where no name appears thereon, or where a name does appear but there are other persons receiving mail addressed in care of the tenant.

MARKING WINDOW ENVELOPES

Beginning March 4, 1929, the disbursing clerk, Pension Bureau, will use window envelopes in mailing pension checks. Postmasters are cautioned, therefore, that great care must be exercised to see that in no case when it is necessary to return a pension letter is the window of the envelope broken, and any indorsements must be stamped or written on a part of the envelope other than on or across window.

Suitable instructions will be issued to all employees concerned, and postmasters and supervisors will make frequent check to insure compliance therewith.

HANDLING OF CALENDARS, PICTURES, AND OTHER LARGE FLAT MAIL

Caleendars, pictures, picture post cards, and other large flat mail is not in all instances being properly and carefully handled by our carriers and clerks. Complaints are being received that carriers frequently bend these pieces of mail double in order to get them into their sacks or into the patrons' mail receptacle. In one instance a valuable calendar was ruined, although it was wrapped in heavy corrugated cardboard (200-pound test). The condition of this piece of mail indicated that it was deliberately broken through the middle, apparently by the carrier, so that he could conveniently place it in his pouch.

Clerks likewise are causing injuries to this large flat mail by including one or two pieces of such mail in ordinary letter packages with the result that the cord cuts through the calendar or picture before arrival at destination, thus rendering it practically worthless to the addressee. Complete instructions as to the tying out of mail was given in the supplement to the Postal Guide for September, 1927, and all clerks engaged in preparing mail for dispatch should again read these instructions.

In order to obviate complaints of this nature, carriers, clerks, and other employees engaged in handling this flat mail of unusual size must be sure that they do not bend, break, or otherwise injure such mail or place it in a position whereby it will be liable to damage. Postal employees should endeavor to treat each piece of this mail just as though it were addressed to them personally. If this is done, I feel sure there will be no more complaints.

Postmasters and supervisors should give this matter careful attention and see to it that the employees under their jurisdiction follow closely the above instructions.

PERSONNEL—MOTOR VEHICLE SERVICE—AGE OF RETIREMENT FOR GARAGE-MAN-DRIVERS

With the concurrence and consent of the Post Office Department, the Civil Service Commission has changed the age of retirement for garageman-drivers in the motor vehicle service, heretofore fixed at 70 years, to the 65-year retirement age group. This change becomes effective April 1, 1929. Therefore, it will be necessary for postmasters to at once take steps looking to the retention beyond retirement age, or the retirement of all such employees, who are or will be 65 years of age on April 1, 1929, and who have a retirement status—that is, at least 15 years of allowable service to their credit. In order that the provisions of the retirement act and the civil-service rules may be complied with, it is necessary that postmasters give the matter of the deferred retirement of garageman-drivers in the motor vehicle service immediate attention.

PERSONNEL—RESIGNATIONS

Hereafter postmasters at offices of the first and second classes in submitting forms showing separation of post-office employees on account of resignation must attach thereto the written resignation of the employee concerned.

PERSONNEL—OVERTIME FOR SUPERVISORS

The attention of postmasters of first and second class post offices is invited to the notice of the Postmaster General, dated September 14, 1923, appearing on page 19 of the October, 1923, Supplement to the Postal Guide, reading as follows:

“Supervisory officials in post offices who are required to work overtime in emergencies may be compensated therefor in whole or in part by being given permission to be absent from time to time for short periods not exceeding four hours in any one day. A record should be made of such overtime and permission for absence granted by some authorized superior. This authorization is made because of the fact that supervisory officials, unlike other post-office employees, are not compensated in money for their overtime.”

It is deemed advisable to republish this order for the information and guidance of postmasters, inasmuch as a number of inquiries have been received which would indicate that there is doubt in the minds of some postmasters as to just what should be done.

DIVISION OF RAILWAY MAIL SERVICE

DAY-OLD CHICKS

The attention of all postal employees is again called to the fact that shipments of day-old chicks require very careful handling while in transit in the mails, and the following rules should be strictly observed:

See that all shipments are definitely and completely addressed.

Do not give food or water to chicks while in transit.

Dispatch as quickly as possible and deliver to addressee promptly upon arrival at office of destination.

Do not place in mail bags or cover with other mail matter.

Always keep parcels right side up and as nearly level as possible.

Do not expose to heat or cold, or place near hot pipes, stoves, or radiators.

Protect them from all extremes of weather.

Do not change the ventilation by punching additional holes in the containers, as it is the shipper's duty to provide proper ventilation.

Caution mailers as to the possibility of shipments made on Friday and Saturday reaching office of destination on Sunday, when no Sunday service is performed, thus necessitating the chicks remaining in the post office until the following morning. The same is true when shipments are made one or two days before a holiday.

Remember that day-old chicks are mailable only when the addressee can be reached before the chicks are 72 hours old, and that every shipment must bear a special handling stamp and be given the same expeditious handling, transportation, and delivery accorded to mail of the first class.

AIR MAIL: HAITI, SANTO DOMINGO, AND PORTO RICO—DISPATCH OF

Since the establishment of air mail service on F. A. M. route No. 6 from Miami, Fla., to Haiti, Santo Domingo, and Porto Rico, complaints of serious delay to air mail letters for those countries have been received due to these mails being mis-sent to New York City, foreign section, instead of to Miami, Fla., for airplane dispatch on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays.

Air mail for this route should be dispatched to Miami at all times, except between the closing dispatch of mail from New York at 8 p. m., on Wednesdays for Miami via C. A. M. 19 and the closing of mail for the steamer leaving New York at 12 o'clock noon on Thursdays. Any air mail letters originating at New York and in that immediate territory, which can be dispatched through the New York gateway between the above hours are advanced by boat dispatch over the plane leaving Miami on the following Monday.

All postmasters and Railway Mail Service officials will please have these mails dispatched accordingly.

USE OF WIRE OR METAL BANDS FOR TYING PARCELS FOR TRANSMISSION IN THE MAI

Reference is made to order dated May 7, 1928, appearing on page 8 of the June, 1928, supplement to the Postal Guide, forbidding the use of wire in attaching address tags to parcel-post mail. This order relates only to the use of wire instead of cord or twine for tying address tags to parcels and does not forbid the use of wire or metal bands for tying or fastening parcels to be transmitted in the mails which has been approved by the department; provided, however, that the ends of the wire are not so exposed as to render the parcel dangerous to handle, and the metal bands have no sharp or burred edges or exposed ends, thus eliminating any possible chance of injury to postal employees or damage to other mail matter.

DIVISION OF INTERNATIONAL POSTAL SERVICE**INSUFFICIENTLY PREPAID ARTICLES FOR ABROAD WHICH ARE INTENDED TO BE DISPATCHED BY AIR**

Air mail articles for abroad must be dispatched by air when fully prepaid the air mail fee applicable to the service or route concerned, even though the ordinary postage is short paid or unpaid.

In the case of articles intended to be dispatched by air on which the air mail fee is not fully prepaid every annotation relative to the transmission by air must be canceled officially by means of two heavy transverse lines and the articles dispatched onward by the ordinary means of transportation, or, where the regular postage is likewise unpaid or short paid, subjected to such other treatment, in appropriate cases, as may be prescribed by existing instructions.

In this connection, reference is had to the treatment prescribed for short-paid or unpaid "business" letters in section 12, on page 175, of the current Annual Postal Guide and to the requirements concerning prepayment or partial prepayment as set forth in the same section. Postmasters will note, however, that the requirements of partial or full prepayment of the regular postage on articles in the international mails which are to be transmitted by the ordinary means of transportation shall not be enforced with respect to articles which are intended to be dispatched by air mail and which are fully prepaid the air mail fee.

Air mail articles for Canada and Mexico, which are subject to the domestic air mail rates of 5 cents for the first ounce or fraction and 10 cents for each additional ounce or fraction (these rates include the air mail fees and the postage), must be entirely prepaid at said rates.

In this connection reference is had also to the notice of this office printed on page 12 of the February, 1929, Supplement to the Postal Guide.

Postmasters will see to it that the foregoing instructions, as well as those of October 16 and January 22, are fully observed at their offices.

INTERNATIONAL AIR MAIL SERVICE—PROPER FEES MUST BE FULLY PREPAID IN ALL CASES

In connection with the notice of this office dated January 22, 1929, which bore the above caption and was published on page 12 of the February, 1929, Supplement to the Postal Guide, postmasters should issue instructions at their offices to assure that articles on which the air mail fee is not fully prepaid as set forth in that notice shall, before dispatch (by the ordinary means), have every annotation thereon relative to the air transportation stricken out and be marked "Not in air mail."

INTERNATIONAL AIR MAIL SERVICE—ROUTE F. A. M. No. 8, BROWNSVILLE TO MEXICO CITY

Air mail service between Brownsville, Tex., and Mexico City, Mexico, has been inaugurated. A special cachet will be used on the first flight from Brownsville. There will be no change in the air mail rate now applicable to articles for

Mexico which is 5 cents for the first ounce or fraction and 10 cents for each additional ounce or fraction.

Letters may be sent the postmaster at Mexico City to be dispatched to addressees in this country on the first flight northbound if they bear Mexican stamps at the rate of 35 centavos for each 20 grams or fraction. Drafts and bank bills are not acceptable to prepay the Mexican postage, but postal money orders or bank checks are acceptable for such prepayment.

The air-mail fee in addition to the regular postage is:

5 cents each half ounce or fraction to *Cuba* and *Bahamas*.

10 cents each half ounce or fraction to *Haiti*, *Dominican Republic*, and *Porto Rico* and from *Porto Rico* on the return flights.

25 cents each half ounce or fraction to *Canal Zone* (and for points beyond to be dispatched by steamer from *Cristobal*).

The air mail rate to *Canada* and *Mexico* is 5 cents for the first ounce or fraction and 10 for each additional ounce or fraction. (This includes air mail fee and postage.)

The above fees and rates include dispatch by the United States domestic air routes where available as well as by the foreign routes.

FRANKING PRIVILEGE NOT APPLICABLE TO AIR MAIL

Referring to the item "Matter entitled to admission in the international mails free of postage," printed on pages 175 and 176 (sec. 13) of the current annual Postal Guide, attention is invited to the circumstance that the freedom of postage referred to in said section is not applicable to articles addressed for delivery in foreign countries and intended for transmission by air even though the articles must be forwarded over a part of the route by the ordinary means of transportation. In other words, these articles when intended for transmission by air are subject to payment of the air mail fee and the ordinary postage.

PARCEL-POST SERVICE TO THE UNION OF SOCIALISTIC SOVIET REPUBLICS

Effective April 1, mailers in this country who desire to have parcel-post packages which have become undeliverable in the Union of Socialistic Soviet Republics returned to origin must indicate on the accompanying customs declarations that the payment of all charges which have accrued will be paid at the time of return.

Mailers should be informed that undeliverable parcels not so indorsed will be treated as abandoned by the Postal Administration of the Union of Socialistic Soviet Republics.

INSURED PARCEL POST TO THE STRAITS SETTLEMENTS

A new parcel-post convention has been concluded with the Straits Settlements, effective March 1, 1929, which provides for the exchange of insured as well as ordinary parcels; and, in the event of complete loss of an insured parcel or loss, rifling, or damage of any article of pecuniary value inclosed in or forming part of an insured parcel, for the payment of indemnity corresponding to the actual amount of loss, rifling, or damage based on the actual value at the time and place of mailing of the lost, rifled, or damaged article, but not exceeding \$100 gold when mailed in the United States of America (including Alaska, Hawaii, Porto Rico, Guam, Samoa, and the Virgin Islands of the United States), and \$180 (Straits) when mailed in the Straits Settlements, provided that the indemnity shall not exceed the sum for which the required insurance fee was paid in the country of origin. Note thereof should be made in connection with the

information covering the parcel-post service with the Straits Settlements on pages 439 and 440 of the current Annual Postal Guide, and in section 63, on page 204, section 101, on page 216, and section 129, on page 221.

No indemnity will be paid in the case of loss or damage through force majeure, as the term is defined by the legal decisions or rulings of the country in the service of which the loss or damage occurs, or when loss, rifling, or damage has arisen from the fault or negligence of the sender or the addressee or of the representative of either or from the nature of the article.

Effective on the date named, postmasters will accept and insure, at the request of the senders and on payment of the required insurance fee in addition to the postage, mailable parcel-post packages addressed for delivery in the Straits settlements.

The limits of indemnity payable and the insurance fees chargeable will be as follows:

No insured parcel shall have written on it information as to the value of its contents, although this may be stated in the accompanying customs declaration.

The insurance of all parcels containing coin, bullion, valuable jewelry, or any other precious article is obligatory. If a parcel containing coin, bullion, jewelry, or any other precious article is mailed uninsured it shall be placed under insurance by the post office which first observes the fact of its having been mailed uninsured, and treated accordingly.

There will be no change in the postage rate, weight limit, dimensions, and prohibitions (except as set forth in the next preceding paragraph) now applicable to parcel-post packages for the Straits Settlements.

A customs declaration properly filled out must be attached to each parcel sent to the Straits Settlements.

The senders of insured as well as ordinary parcels may give instructions at the time of mailing for other disposition to be made of them if they are undeliverable as originally addressed, as set forth in section 53 on page 201 of the current Annual Postal Guide.

Every parcel shall be packed in a manner adequate for the length of the journey and for the protection of the contents. Articles wholly or partly of glass must be packed in rigid boxes of metal or wood. However, in the case of small articles of glass if they are packed with a large quantity of soft packing material around all their parts, they may be packed in a very strong millboard box. In the case of a fragile article particular attention is necessary to the internal packing of the parcel. The packing materials may be sufficient in quantity and quality, but the article is nevertheless inadequately packed if between any portion of it and the sides of the receptacles there is an insufficient depth of packing material to absorb unavoidable concussion.

As is the present practice, ordinary parcels for the Straits Settlements may be closed by means of wax, lead seals, or otherwise, at the option of the sender. Insured parcels, however, must in all cases be closed and securely sealed with wax or otherwise. The country of destination has the right to open sealed parcels (including the right to break the seal) as well as unsealed parcels, in order to inspect the contents. Parcels which have been so opened shall be closed again and officially sealed, except in the case of ordinary parcels which need not be sealed if they were not sealed by the sender in the first instance. Section 66 on page 204 of the current Annual Postal Guide should be modified accordingly.

Insured parcels exchanged with the Straits Settlements shall not be forwarded or returned to another country unless they are forwarded or returned as insured mail.

Senders may indorse insured parcels for the Straits Settlements "Do not forward to a third country," in which event the parcels shall not be forwarded to any other country. Unless such parcels are indorsed to indicate that the senders do not wish them forwarded to any other country other than that of the mailing or within the country of original address, they may be forwarded to a

third country if they can be forwarded as insured mail. Insured parcels may be returned to the sender in a third country in accordance with a return address on the parcels if they can be returned as insured mail. In case of the loss, rifling, or damage of an insured parcel forwarded or returned to a third country, the rightful claimant shall be entitled only to such indemnity, if any, for any loss, rifling, or damage which occurs subsequent to the redispach of the parcel in the country of original address, as the country in which the loss, rifling, or damage occurred is willing or obligated to pay under any agreement in force between the countries directly involved in the forwarding or return.

Refused parcels (ordinary and insured) from the Straits Settlements must be returned at once from the post office of destination to the United States exchange office from which they were received, marked "Refused," while other parcels which can not be delivered must be returned at the expiration of 30 days (as at present), after being marked to show the cause of nondelivery, as "Unclaimed," etc., unless the parcels were marked by the senders to be otherwise disposed of, as "Abandon" or "If not deliverable as addressed, deliver to ——," in which case the parcels must be disposed of as instructed by the senders.

Insured parcels for and from the Straits Settlements will be handled in transit between the United States post offices of origin or delivery and the authorized United States exchange offices of dispatch or receipt without being recorded or receipted for in transit between such offices; and, except as may be otherwise stated herein, will be otherwise treated in the same manner as has been prescribed for insured parcels exchanged with other countries, as set forth in the current Annual Postal Guide.

A parcel mailed to the Straits Settlements can not be recalled after it has left this service nor can the address of such a parcel be changed unless the parcel is undeliverable at the original address.

The attention of postmasters is directed to the necessity of keeping such separate records of the number of insured parcels addressed to the Straits Settlements originating at their offices, and of the insurance fees applicable to the parcels, as will enable them to render a report, upon request, showing, as separate items, the number of insured parcel-post packages, with their respective fees, accepted for mailing to the Straits Settlements during any fiscal year.

Postmasters are requested to give as much publicity to the insurance service with the Straits Settlements as is practicable without expense to the department.

The Following Notices Were Issued from the Bureau of the Third Assistant Postmaster General

NEW COUNTERFEITS

The Treasury Department furnishes the following descriptions of new counterfeit notes:

Ten-dollar Federal reserve note.—On the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago, Ill.; 1914 series; check letter G; face plate No. 420; back plate No. 1357; Frank White, Treasurer of the United States; A. W. Mellon, Secretary of the Treasury; portrait of Jackson.

This is a well-executed production printed from photomechanical plates on two sheets of paper, between which silk threads have been distributed in imitation of the genuine fiber. The seal and numbering are printed in dark, lusterless blue, while the general appearance of the face reflects a bluish-gray tone. The back is executed in a pale yellow-green shade. Specimen at hand bears serial No. G71438799A.

This counterfeit is deceptive and care should be exercised in handling notes of this denomination.

Ten-dollar national bank note.—On the Bank of California National Association, San Francisco, Calif.; 1902 series; check letter X; charter No. 9655; serial No. 3514; W. T. Vernon, Register of the Treasury; Lee McClung, Treasurer of the United States; portrait of McKinley.

This counterfeit is printed by photomechanical process on two sheets of paper, on which red and blue ink lines have been traced in imitation of the silk fiber in the genuine. Fictitious names have been executed in ink by hand, the specimen at hand bearing the names H. C. French as cashier, and J. E. Maurus as president. The figures comprising the serial number are imperfectly formed and out of alignment, and the note has a yellow tint, having been purposely discolored by chemical application to produce an aged effect. This note is believed to be the handiwork of the counterfeiters responsible for the \$10 Federal reserve note described in Circular Letter No. 603, issued May 28, 1928. This counterfeit will deceive the unwary handler of currency.

Ten-dollar Federal reserve note.—On the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago, Ill.; 1914 series; check letter G; face plate No. 441; back plate No. 1439; Frank White, Treasurer of the United States; A. W. Mellon, Secretary of the Treasury; portrait of Jackson.

This is a crudely executed photomechanical production printed on one sheet of paper. The thread fiber in the genuine note from which the counterfeit was photographed is visible on the face and back, having been etched in with the face and back designs and is without coloring other than the black and green surface ink. The serial numbering is printed out in black, while the seal is crudely etched, the lettering in the circle being almost illegible. The back is printed in a pale shade of green.

The workmanship of this counterfeit is so poor that the note should be easily detected.

Specimen at hand bears serial No. G78658239A.

DIVISION OF CLASSIFICATION

CENSUS MATTER IN THE MAILS

In view of the fact that the time is approaching when the fifteenth decennial census of the country will be taken, the attention of all postmasters is invited to sections 487, 488, and 869, Postal Laws and Regulations, from which it will be seen that matter relating to the census of whatever class or weight, when addressed to the Census Office or to officials thereof, and indorsed "Official Business—Census Office," is entitled to be transmitted free of postage and by registered mail, if necessary, and so marked.

It is contemplated, of course, that matter of this character shall be put up in packages of reasonable size and weight so that it can be conveniently handled in the mails. Generally speaking, the packages should not exceed the limits prescribed for fourth-class matter set forth in paragraph 1, section 450, and paragraph 4, section 451, Postal Laws and Regulations.

POSTAL INDORSEMENTS ON WINDOW ENVELOPES

In connection with the instructions pertaining to window envelopes embodied in article 111, page 21, of the July, 1928, Postal Guide, postmasters are reminded that when indorsing matter inclosed in such envelopes which is to be forwarded to the addressee or returned to the sender, great care must be exercised not to mutilate the window or obscure the original address. This is especially necessary in cases where the envelopes are of the open or uncovered window variety, but in no instance should any written or hand-stamped indorsements be placed on the window or over the exposed portion of the inclosure bearing the address.

Envelopes of the open or uncovered window variety will be used by the Pension Bureau for mailing pension checks on and after March 4, 1929, and all concerned are requested to be careful when returning to that bureau undeliverable matter inclosed in such envelopes not to place any indorsements or marks on any portion of the inclosure exposed through the opening or window.

POSTAGE STAMPS NOT TO BE COVERED WITH MUCILAGE OR PASTE

It has come to attention that when affixing stamps (especially precanceled stamps) to mail matter, particularly fourth-class or parcel-post mail, it is the practice of some persons and concerns to cover the face of the stamps with

mucilage or other adhesive material used in affixing the stamps and labels to the matter.

This is not permissible, as the stamps can not be properly defaced and loss of revenue may result through the possible reuse of the stamps. Postmasters should therefore advise patrons who follow this objectionable practice that it must be discontinued.

PLANTS AND PLANT PRODUCTS ADDRESSED TO PLACES IN WYOMING

The State of Wyoming has established places for terminal inspection under the provisions of the act of March 4, 1915, embodied in section 468, Postal Laws and Regulations, of the following plants and plant products:

"All field-grown woody plants, or cuttings or scions thereof, including cut flowers; and all strawberry plants: *Provided*, That said list of plants and plant products shall not apply to any nursery stock which bears a Wyoming tag certifying that the nursery stock is being shipped from a nursery licensed to do business in Wyoming for the current season, nor to tree and field seeds, bulbs, and hothouse or field-grown herbaceous plants."

All postmasters are therefore informed that packages containing any plants or plant products addressed to places in the State of Wyoming may be accepted for mailing only when plainly marked so that the contents may be readily ascertained by an inspection of the outside thereof. The law makes the failure so to mark such parcels an offense punishable by a fine of not more than \$100.

Postmasters within the State of Wyoming shall be governed strictly by the provisions of paragraphs 3, 4, 5, and 6, section 468, Postal Laws and Regulations, in the treatment of all packages addressed for delivery at their offices containing any of the plants or plant products above described as subject to terminal inspection.

Inspection service is maintained at the places in Wyoming named below, and all postmasters in that State shall, after receiving the required postage therefor, under the provisions of section 468, Postal Laws and Regulations, send to the nearest inspection point each package containing plants or plant products subject to terminal inspection: Sheridan; Casper; Laramie.

Owing to the perishable character of plants and plant products the packages containing such matter must be given prompt attention.

Any failure of compliance with the foregoing instructions or with the provisions of section 468, Postal Laws and Regulations, coming to the attention of any postmaster should be reported to the Third Assistant Postmaster General, division of classification.

NEWSPAPER PUBLICITY STATEMENTS DUE APRIL 1, 1929

The statements of ownership, management, circulation, etc., of publications entered as second-class matter, except such publications as have been exempted, required to be submitted semiannually by the act of August 24, 1912, are due not later than April 1, 1929. Postmasters should, therefore, at once furnish copies of Form 3526 to the publishers required to submit such statements.

After being carefully examined to see that they are fully completed, the statements should be promptly sent to the Third Assistant Postmaster General, division of classification. Reports should be made on April 10 of the names of any publications which have not filed the required statements.

Careful attention with respect to the foregoing is invited to section 411, Postal Laws and Regulations.

Copies of publications in which such statements are printed should not be sent to the department, but should be retained in the files of the post office as prescribed by paragraph 4 of the section mentioned.

DATE ON BUSINESS REPLY CARDS AND ENVELOPES

With respect to paragraph 7 of the instructions issued in connection with Order No. 8228, published on page 17 of the October, 1928, Supplement to the Postal Guide, pertaining to business reply cards or envelopes distributed for return under the provisions of section 384½, Postal Laws and Regulations, postmasters are advised that while it is desirable that all business reply cards or envelopes bear a date as to the time within which they should be mailed for their return, nevertheless, in cases where the distributor does not desire to place such a date thereon it may be omitted.

POSTAGE ON UNDELIVERABLE THIRD-CLASS MATTER ORIGINALLY MAILED IN BULK UNDER SECTION 435½, POSTAL LAWS AND REGULATIONS

It has come to attention that many postmasters are returning, rated with 1 cent due, undeliverable circulars and other miscellaneous third-class matter not consisting of books, catalogues, seeds, etc., which were originally mailed in bulk under section 435½, Postal Laws and Regulations.

The attention of postmasters and other postal employees is, therefore, invited to the fact that when third-class matter mailed under the provisions of the section mentioned is returned to the sender as undeliverable, it is chargeable with postage at the regular third-class rate—that is, 1½ cents for each 2 ounces or fraction thereof—except in the case of books, catalogues, seeds, cuttings, etc., which are chargeable with 1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction thereof.

Postmasters are requested, when such improperly rated matter is returned to their offices, to send a full report of the facts to the Third Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Classification.

FORMS 3614, 3615, AND 3616 ARE NOW STOCK FORMS

Forms 3614, 3615, and 3616 for the use in connection with the issuance of permits to use business reply cards and envelopes under section 384½, Postal Laws and Regulations, have been printed and placed in stock.

Postmasters who have been authorized to issue permits to patrons for the privilege of using business reply cards and envelopes may procure these forms by making requisition to their designated supply offices.

FORM 3548 NOT BEARING NAME OF POST OFFICE FROM WHICH SENT

Form 3548 has been sent to R. S. Wilson, R. F. D. No. 4, Center, Tex., advising him that a letter addressed to him is being held for postage. The card does not bear the name of the post office and State from which it was sent and it is not postmarked.

The postmaster sending the notice will communicate with Mr. Wilson and inclose another form completely and properly filled out.

DIVISION OF STAMPS

EXCESS REVENUE FROM STAMPED ENVELOPES AND WRAPPERS

The attention of all postmasters is called to section 162, Postal Laws and Regulations, which provides that the excess revenue above invoice value gained from the sale of stamped envelopes and newspaper wrappers, singly and in odd quantities, shall be accounted for and charged in the quarterly postal account to the department.

Regardless of the fact that excess revenue will accrue at every post office where stamped envelopes are sold in small quantities, a number of cases have come to notice where the postmaster failed to account for this surplus revenue, while in other instances the amount reported has been wholly incommensurate with the local business transacted in stamped envelopes.

It is not required that elaborate and expensive methods of accounting shall be adopted in post offices to determine the amount of excess revenue to be collected from stamp clerks, and the plan outlined in the above section will be found generally satisfactory. However, other and more accurate methods may be used when postmasters find it advisable to meet local conditions.

Postmasters are requested to give this matter personal attention in order that there may be a proper accounting of this surplus revenue in the future.

SALE OF 1/2-CENT POSTAGE STAMPS TO BE RESTRICTED

It has come to the attention of the department that many business firms have recently been making it a practice to use two 1/2-cent postage stamps on third-class mailings in lieu of a single stamp of the 1-cent denomination, in the apparent belief that better results are obtained by giving the appearance of first-class matter to the mail when received by the addressee. The heavy demand for 1/2-cent stamps in recent months, apparently for this advertising purpose, has exhausted the department's stock, causing delay in filling regular post-office orders specifically needed for fractional rate mailings.

As stated in paragraph 3, page 35, of the Official Postal Guide, the department does not sanction the use of two or more stamps to meet a specified postage rate when single stamps of the proper value are available, as a measure of economy in the cost of manufacture. This applies particularly to large quantity mailings requiring low denomination stamps that should always be available.

As the department does not approve of the use of multiples of 1/2-cent stamps on mail matter dispatched at the 1-cent or 1 1/2-cent rate, postmasters are directed hereafter to submit requisitions to the department for only such quantities of 1/2-cent stamps as estimated will be needed for use on mail matter having a fractional postage rate. Postmasters will place such restrictions on the sale as may be found necessary to prevent the wholesale misuse of 1/2-cent stamps by patrons.

DIVISION OF REGISTERED MAILS

SENDERS' REGISTRY RETURN RECEIPTS TO BE PROPERLY COMPLETED

It is reported that mailing post offices frequently fail to see that senders' registry return receipts bear complete return addresses. In some instances the name of the post office of mailing or the office to which the receipt is to be returned is omitted, in others the name of the sender, and in some cases both the name of the sender and the name of the post office to which the receipt is to be returned are omitted. These omissions are due to the fault of the postal employees preparing the return receipts at the offices of mailing, and such action should be taken by all postmasters as will result in the return receipts being properly prepared, in every respect, at the mailing post offices.

It is not intended nor expected that the employees checking registered mail out of the pouches at the post offices of address shall compare the return receipts with the articles to which they are attached, but all delivering postal employees should examine the return receipts before making delivery of registered articles, first to see that the proper return receipt is attached to the article involved, as in some instances the return receipt attached to the article when received at the office of address does not cover the particular article involved, and secondly, to see that

no omission has been made from the address portion of the return receipt which should show the name and address of the sender. If this checking is made by the delivering employees before delivery of the registered matter is attempted, a proper return receipt may be made out when necessary from the indicia on the registered article.

It is suggested that in order to guard against return receipts being sent from mailing offices without the names of those offices in the return addresses postmasters should instruct their employees to write or stamp the names of the mailing offices in advance on a reasonable supply of registry return receipts. This action will reduce the time necessary in making out the return receipts at the time of mailing and also the time and work required at the office of address when it is necessary to complete any incomplete return receipts.

If through inadvertence the names of the senders only are omitted from the return receipts, the postmasters at the offices of mailing, when the return receipts are received there, should supply the names of the senders from the mailing office record.

DISPOSITION TO BE MADE OF INSURED AND C. O. D. PARCELS BEARING THE REQUESTS OF THE SENDERS THAT THEY BE TREATED AS ABANDONED IF NOT DELIVERED

The instructions contained in article 72, paragraphs (f) and (g), page 132, of the July, 1928, Postal Guide provide in part as follows:

"(f) In the event any sender does not desire an undelivered insured or C. O. D. parcel returned to him, appropriate instructions as to the disposition to be made of the parcel must in each instance appear on the parcel. A parcel of this character which can not be delivered to the original addressee or in accordance with the sender's alternate instructions on the parcel when mailed will be considered as abandoned and thereafter the sender will have no claim upon it, nor be entitled to any reimbursement or indemnity. Such a parcel which is not of a perishable nature should be indorsed 'Abandoned' when it becomes undeliverable and sent to the post office to which dead parcel-post mail is ordinarily transmitted * * *.

"(g) In order that it may not be necessary for the senders of insured or C. O. D. parcels indorsed to show that the senders do not desire their return to make inquiries of the postmasters at the address offices as to the disposition made of the parcels in those instances where money orders are not received in payment of the charges on C. O. D. parcels or acknowledgments of receipt are not received from the addressees in the case of insured parcels, postmasters at the address offices should notify the senders of the disposition made of the parcels when it becomes necessary to treat them as abandoned. Form 3540 should be used for this purpose."

Many patrons of the service, especially those who mail stationery specially printed for their customers, have had printed on the address labels affixed to their parcels instructions to the effect that the parcels are to be treated as abandoned if not delivered within a specified period, usually 30 days, which is the maximum period for which insured and C. O. D. parcels may be held awaiting delivery. However, it appears that in many instances where parcels bearing such instructions fail of delivery, the postmasters at the delivery offices return the parcels to the senders instead of indorsing them "Abandoned" and transmitting them to the post office to which dead parcel-post mail is ordinarily transmitted. When such parcels are improperly returned to the senders, it is the practice of the postmasters at the mailing offices to return the parcels to the address offices for disposition in accordance with the senders' instructions thereon.

It is requested that postmasters give proper attention to the handling of insured and C. O. D. parcels bearing the request of the senders that they be treated as abandoned if undeliverable so that they may be properly disposed of as abandoned at the expiration of the period for which they should be held awaiting delivery. The senders should be notified on Form 3540 when undeliverable parcels are disposed of in this manner.

Reports of the failure of postmasters properly to dispose of insured and C. O. D. parcels bearing the instructions of the senders that they be treated as abandoned if undelivered should be made to the Third Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Registered Mails, on Form 3826-a.

NOTICES CONCERNING UNDELIVERED C. O. D. PARCELS TO BE SENT TO LOCAL OR NEAR-BY REPRESENTATIVES OF CERTAIN MAILERS

Article 149, appearing on pages 146 and 147 of the July, 1928, Postal Guide, provides for the sending of notices to local or near-by representatives of the senders of C. O. D. parcels, when the C. O. D. parcels bear address labels conforming to the requirements set forth in article 149 and showing the complete names and addresses of the local or near-by representatives, to whom the notices are to be sent. These instructions require that the representative shall be notified immediately when a C. O. D. parcel is refused, and notified not later than five days from the date of receipt for each C. O. D. parcel which is undelivered for any other reason than that of refusal.

Reports reaching this office indicate that in many instances postal employees have failed to send notices to the representatives of the senders of such C. O. D. parcels, and as a result the representatives were denied an opportunity of attempting to persuade the addressees to accept the C. O. D. parcels or of requesting that the C. O. D. parcels be delivered to themselves.

Postmasters are requested to issue instructions to the postal employees involved at their offices to assure notices being sent to the designated representatives of the senders covering undelivered C. O. D. parcels.

COUNT OF MAIL ON RURAL ROUTES

The attention of postmasters is particularly called to the letter sent to them by this bureau under date of March 18, 1929, directing that a count be made, during the period from April 1 to 13, 1929, of the number of pieces of mail, by classes, delivered and collected on each and every rural route. Forms for use in submitting the reports accompanied the letter of instructions.

The count and report as to each route *must be made* in strict compliance with the plain directions given.

It should be noted that the April count will take the place this year of the count regularly required to be made during the first 15 days of May of each year.

PROPER METHOD OF FORWARDING UNITED STATES MAIL LOCKS AND KEYS

The attention of postmasters is invited to sections 1453 and 1463, Postal Laws and Regulations, 1924, regarding the shipment of United States mail locks and keys to the mail equipment shops in Washington.

It is very essential that *all* keys, without exception, and all locks, with the exception of the LA and Double Star, be forwarded by *registered* mail, never by ordinary mail; they must be *carefully packed* and a letter inclosed explaining the reasons for the shipment.

The markings on the outside of the package will show clearly the name of the post office and the nature of the contents.

RURAL MAIL BOXES AND THEIR SUPPORTS TO BE KEPT FREE FROM OTHER RECEPTACLES OR ADVERTISING MATTER

Reports received by this bureau indicate that the practice sometimes obtains of attaching to the posts which serve as supports for rural mail boxes receptacles supplied by newspaper companies to be used as containers for newspapers delivered by their carriers; also that to some extent advertising matter is displayed on rural mail boxes or their supports.

The regulations of the department prohibit the attaching of receptacles of any kind or for any purpose to the posts, stands, or other supports upon which

CHANGES TO BE INSERTED IN THE JULY, 1928, GUIDE

CHANGE No. 124 (Canada, p. 260).

The following should be added to the subheading "Prohibitions" of the item "Canada—Regular Mails" on page 260.

"The Postal Administration of Canada advises that the publication entitled *Uj Elore*, published at 26-28 Union Square, New York, N. Y., is prohibited importation into that service."

CHANGE No. 125 (Czechoslovakia, p. 281).

The following changes should be made in the parcel-post table of the item "Czechoslovakia" on page 281:

"The weight limit applicable to ordinary and registered parcel-post packages exchanged between the United States and Czechoslovakia will be increased from 22 to 44 pounds, subject to the following transit charges, which are in addition to the postage rate of 14 cents a pound or fraction thereof, and registry fee in the case of registered parcels:

23 to 33 pounds.....	\$1. 10
34 to 44 pounds.....	1. 47

"Both postage rates and transit charges must be prepaid by postage stamps affixed to parcels at the time of mailing.

"There will be no change in the dimensions of parcels addressed for delivery in Czechoslovakia due to the increased weight limit."

CHANGE No. 126 (Estonia, p. 297).

The following should be added to the subheadings "Prohibitions" of the item "Estonia—Regular Mails and Parcel Post," on page 297:

"The importation of crude animal products is admitted only from countries or places in a foreign country where, during the past six months, there have been no contagious diseases of animals, such as the cattle plague, glanders, apthæ, tuberculosis, etc. For that purpose, each article must be accompanied by a certificate delivered by an official veterinary of the country of origin certifying that the products imported come from animals unaffected by contagion, that those products are themselves pure from the viewpoint of sanitation, that each article is provided with a mark or an imprint of exportation, and that the meat (if it is a question of meat) has been found fit for consumption. Crude animal products not accompanied by the said certificate are subjected to disinfection at the frontier at the expense of the importer.

"The above-mentioned certificates must be confirmed by the Estonian consul. They must also bear the testimony of the consul that the certificate in question has been issued by a veterinary duly authorized by the Government of the country of origin.

"Articles containing crude animal products are also subject to inspection at the Estonian border by an official veterinary charged with that duty by the Administration of Public Health, who verifies the above certificate and issues the entry permit.

"Fresh beef and horse meat can be imported only in pieces not smaller than one-fourth of the body of the animal, not including the head.

"Fresh veal, mutton, goat meat and pork may be imported only in pieces not less than half of the body of the animal.

"Smoked, dried, or salted beef and horse meat are not admitted in pieces weighing less than 4 kilograms; smoked, dried or salted mutton, goat meat and pork are admitted only in pieces weighing not less than 2 kilograms.

"The minimum weight of beef fat for consumption is 1 kilogram.

"Fresh and salted organs, such as the brain, the tongue, the sweetbread (*Gl. Thymus*), the lungs, the heart, the liver, the kidneys, and the udder, shall be imported only when organically attached to the respective parts of the body."

CHANGE No. 127 (Hungary, p. 340).

The following changes should be made in the parcel-post table of the item "Hungary" on page 340:

"The weight limit applicable to ordinary and insured parcel-post packages exchanged between the United States and Hungary has been increased from 22 to 44 pounds, subject to the following transit charges, which are in addition to the postage rate of 14 cents a pound or fraction thereof, and insurance fee in the case of insured parcels:

23 to 33 pounds.....	\$0. 86
34 to 44 pounds.....	1. 19

"Both postage rates and transit charges must be prepaid by postage stamps affixed to parcels at the time of mailing.

"There will be no change in the dimensions of parcels addressed for delivery in Hungary due to the increased weight limit."

CHANGE No. 128 (Iraq, pp. 344 and 345).

The following information should be added to the subheadings "Prohibitions" of the item "Iraq—Regular Mails and Parcel Post" on pages 344 and 345:

"Information has been received that medicines are prohibited in the regular and parcel-post mails to Iraq, unless addressed to those persons authorized to import such articles."

CHANGE No. 129 (Italy, p. 349).

The subheading "Prohibitions" of the item "Italy—Regular Mails" is modified by eliminating the sentence reading "Pastry, including biscuits made of wheat flour, are henceforth prohibited," appearing in the tenth line from the bottom of page 349.

CHANGE No. 130 (Mexico, pp. 378 and 381).

The following should be added to the subheadings "Prohibitions" of the item "Mexico—Regular Mails and Parcel Post," on pages 378 and 381:

"Medicines, beauty aids, toilet articles, etc., will be prohibited in the regular and parcel-post mails to Mexico, unless the manufacturers or their representatives have fulfilled the following registration and inspection requirements:

"The request for registration of patent medicines and pharmaceutical specialties must be submitted to the health department in writing, and in triplicate, and must contain the following information:

"I. Name and address of the applicant.

"II. Name of the product.

"III. Name of the manufacturer.

"IV. Location of the factory, laboratory, or establishment where the product is made or prepared.

"V. Name of the importer or of the representative of the manufacturer, and his business address, in case of an imported product.

"VI. Complete centesimal formula of the product, without abbreviations, symbols or chemical formulas, or synonyms not appearing in the legal pharmacopeia or formularies.

"VII. If the product contains simple, unstudied drugs or drugs not appearing in the legal pharmacopeia or formularies, there shall be inclosed and indicated:

"(a) The botanical classification of the drug.

"(b) The analysis of the plant.

"(c) A study of the pharmacodynamic properties of the drug.

"(d) Therapeutic applications of the same drug.

"VIII. Technique followed in the preparation in the case of biologic products, serums, vaccines, apotherapeutic products, and the like.

"IX. Does administered according to prescription.

"X. Uses of products.

"XI. Whether the product is already on sale, or whether it is to be introduced in commerce.

"The request for registration of toilet articles, beauty aids, and the like, must be made of the health department in writing and in triplicate, and should comprise the data called for in Paragraphs I, II, III, IV, V, VII, X, and XI above, as well as the names of the substances entering into their composition (i. e., their qualitative formula). The same information should be submitted with requests for registration of insecticides.

"In the case of soaps to which medicinal properties are attributed, their qualitative and quantitative formulas must be submitted.

"In the case of perfumes and lotions, their qualitative formula must be submitted, or in the absence thereof one must indicate the chemical functions of the essential oils of the aromatic substances (natural or artificial), of the vehicle and of the fixing liquids employed, and it must be specifically stated in the request that the product contains no substances harmful to the health.

"The requests referred to above must be accompanied by—

"I. Two specimens of each product, in the form in which they are intended to be sold to the public, except in the case of perfumes and lotions, one sample of which will be sufficient.

"II. Two copies of every prospectus, advertisement, etc., intended to be used for each product.

"A larger number of specimens may be required, if necessary for study, analysis, etc.

"Products presented for registration must bear, in Spanish, all information relative to their formulas, uses, doses, as well as all other information appearing on the containers or wrappers. These indications may also be printed in another language at the same time."

CHANGE No. 131 (Persia, pp. 406 and 407).

The information appearing under "Service (1)" and "Service (2)—Desert Motor Service" of the subheading "Observations" of the item "Persia—Parcel Post," on pages 406 and 407, should be changed to read as follows:

CHANGE No. 132 (Rumania, p. 422).

The following modification should be made to the subheading "Observations" of the item "Rumania—Parcel Post," on page 422.

Replace the third paragraph by the following:

"Parcel-post packages containing merchandise, except for those places shown below, must be accompanied by a commercial invoice. If several parcels are sent to the same addressee, the invoice should be included in one parcel only; in the other parcels should be inserted a note giving the name of the sender and the contents of the parcel."

CHANGE No. 133 (substitute rural carriers, p. 75).

Article 3, on page 75 of the Official Postal Guide for July, 1928, under the subheading "Substitute may serve on any route," is amended to read as follows:

"3. Where there are two or more rural routes from the same office, any properly bonded rural substitute may serve during the absence of any one of the carriers; for example, the substitute for the carrier on route No. 1 may serve during the absence of carriers on routes Nos. 2 and 3, if the latter have no substitutes available, but he may not serve more than one route on any day."

CHANGE No. 134 (Salvador, El, p. 192).

The following supersedes the item "Salvador (El)," on page 192:

Postmasters in the fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, tenth, eleventh, twelfth, and fourteenth divisions of the Railway Mail Service will send letter mail, prints, and samples for El Salvador via New Orleans and parcel-post packages by way of San Francisco, Calif., except that parcel post originating in the fifth, sixth, seventh, tenth, and fourteenth divisions should be dispatched by way of New York, when it can be advanced in delivery by such dispatch.

Postmasters in the eighth and thirteenth divisions will send all mail, including parcel post, for El Salvador to San Francisco, Calif.

CHANGE No. 135 (sec. 100, p. 215).

Paragraph (j) of section 100 on page 215 is modified to read as follows:

"(j) All inquiries, complaints, and claims for indemnity on account of the loss, rifling, damage, wrong delivery, or delay in delivery of ordinary parcels exchanged with Pan American countries should be forwarded to the *chief inspector.*"

AMENDMENTS TO THE POSTAL LAWS AND REGULATIONS

INSERT No. 445. ORDER No. 8583.

FEBRUARY 20, 1929.

Paragraphs 1 and 2 (a), section 460, Postal Laws and Regulations of 1924, are amended to read as follows:

"SEC. 460. All kinds of poison, and all articles and compositions containing poison, and all poisonous animals, insects, and reptiles, and explosives of all kinds, and inflammable materials, and infernal machines, and mechanical, chemical, or other devices or compositions which may ignite or explode, and all disease germs or scabs, and all other natural or artificial articles, compositions, or material, of whatever kind, which may kill or in anywise hurt, harm, or injure another, or damage, deface, or otherwise injure the mails or other property, whether sealed as first-class matter or not, are hereby declared to be nonmailable matter and shall not be conveyed in the mails or delivered from any post office or station thereof, nor by any letter carrier; but the Postmaster General may permit the transmission in the mails, under such rules and regulations as he shall prescribe as to preparation and packing, of any articles hereinbefore described which are not outwardly or of their own force dangerous or injurious to life, health, or property: *Provided*, That the transmission in the mails of poisonous drugs and medicines may be limited by the Postmaster General to shipments of such articles from the manufacturer thereof or dealer therein to licensed physicians, surgeons, dentists, pharmacists, druggists, and veterinarians, under such rules and regulations as he shall prescribe: *Provided further*, That all spiritous, vinous, malted, fermented, or other intoxicating liquors of any kind are hereby declared to be nonmailable and shall not be deposited in or carried through the mails. Whoever shall knowingly deposit or cause to be deposited for mailing or delivery, or shall knowingly cause to be delivered by mail, according to the direction thereon or at any place at which it is directed to be delivered by the person to whom it is addressed, anything declared by this section to be nonmailable, unless in accordance with the rules and regulations hereby authorized to be prescribed by the Postmaster General, shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than two years, or both; and whoever shall knowingly deposit or cause to be deposited for mailing or delivery, or shall knowingly cause to be delivered by mail, according to the direction thereon or at any place to which it is directed to be delivered by the person to whom it is addressed, anything declared by this section to be nonmailable, whether transmitted in accordance with the rules and regulations authorized to be prescribed by the Postmaster General or not, with the design, intent, or purpose to kill or in any wise hurt, harm, or injure another, or damage, deface, or otherwise injure the mails or other property, shall be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned not more than twenty years, or both. (Act of January 11, 1929.)

"2. (a) Spiritous, vinous, malted, fermented, or other intoxicating liquors of any kind, poisons of every kind, and articles, preparations, compounds, and mixtures which are poison (except as prescribed in the fourth paragraph hereof), and poisonous animals, insects, and reptiles, corrosive materials, fireworks, matches, and explosives of every kind, and inflammable materials liable to cause fire by self-ignition through friction, through absorption of moisture, or through spontaneous chemical changes, and infernal machines, and mechanical, chemical, or other devices or compositions which may ignite or explode, and disease germs or scabs (except as prescribed in sec. 461), and other natural or artificial articles, compositions, or materials of whatever kind which may kill or in any wise hurt, harm, or injure another, or damage, deface, or otherwise injure the mail or other property, live animals, insects, birds or fowls (except as prescribed in sec. 466), fresh hides or pelts, or any articles exhaling bad odor, whether sealed as first-class matter or not, shall not be admitted to the mails."

FEBRUARY 19, 1929.

INSERT No. 446. ORDER No. 8588.

The Postal Laws and Regulations are amended by the addition of the following as section 484½:

"SEC. 484½. Under such regulations as the Postmaster General shall prescribe correspondence of the members of the Diplomatic Corps of the countries of the Pan American Postal Union stationed in the United States may be reciprocally transmitted in the domestic mails free of postage * * *. The same privilege shall be accorded consuls of such countries stationed in the United States, and vice consuls when they are discharging the functions of such consuls, for the exchange of official correspondence among themselves and for that which they direct to the Government of the United States." (Act of February 14, 1929.)

2. The matter that may be sent free of postage in the domestic mails under the provisions of this section embraces all correspondence of the members of the Diplomatic Corps of the Pan American countries and Spain, and it likewise embraces the official correspondence of the consulates of such of these countries as have put this provision into effect in their own countries. (See current Annual Postal Guide for list of these countries.) These provisions do not apply to merchandise (fourth-class or parcel-post matter) or to articles other than written or printed correspondence within the usual meaning of that term. Such correspondence shall not exceed 4 pounds in weight. (Sec. 450.)

3. The envelopes, labels, etc., covering correspondence of the Diplomatic Corps mailed under the provisions of this section, should show in the upper left corner of the address side the name of the ambassador or the minister, or the name of the embassy or legation, as the case may be, together with the post-office address, while in the upper right corner of the address side should appear the inscription "Diplomatic Mail" over the word "Free."

4. The official correspondence of consulates mailed under the provisions of this section should show over the words "Official correspondence" in the upper left corner of the address side the name and address of the consul or consulate, as the case may be, as well as the name of the country represented, while in the upper right corner of the address side should appear the inscription "Consular mail" over the word "Free."

See section 869 as to free registration.

FEBRUARY 21, 1929.

INSERT No. 447. ORDER No. 8589.

In conformity with the act of Congress approved February 14, 1929, section 869 of the Postal Laws and Regulations of 1924 is hereby amended by the addition of paragraph 6, reading as follows:

"SEC. 869. 6. Under such regulations as the Postmaster General shall prescribe correspondence of the members of the Diplomatic Corps of the countries of the Pan American Postal Union stationed in the United States may be reciprocally transmitted in the domestic mails * * * and be entitled to free registration, but without any right to indemnity in case of loss. The same privilege shall be accorded consuls of such countries stationed in the United States, and vice consuls when they are discharging the functions of such consuls, for the exchange of official correspondence among themselves and for that which they direct to the Government of the United States." (Act of February 14, 1929.)

See section 484½ as to free postage.

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FEBRUARY 21, 1929.

INSERT No. 448. ORDER No. 8589.

Section 1070 of the Postal Laws and Regulations of 1924 is amended by the addition of a cross reference reading as follows:

"See section 869, paragraph 6, relative to the nonpayment of indemnity in connection with free registration of domestic matter mailed by members of the diplomatic corps, consuls, and vice consuls of the countries adhering to the Pan American Postal Union Principal Convention of Mexico."
