

#### DECENTRALIZATION—COMPLAINTS AND INQUIRIES, LOSS, RIFLING, DAMAGE, DELAY, WRONG DELIVERY, AND MISTREATMENT OF INTERNATIONAL MAIL

ORDER No. 9661.

DECEMBER 4, 1929.

Effective January 1, 1930, postmasters will report to the inspectors in charge of the divisions in which the American post offices of origin or destination are of the divisions in which the American post offices of origin or destination are located those complaints and inquiries concerning the disposition and mistreatment of foreign mail which are at present reported to the Chief Inspector; and postmasters at exchange offices will report to the inspectors in charge of the divisions in which they are located those irregularities disclosed by bulletins of verification which are at present reported to the Chief Inspector.

The sections of the Postal Laws and Regulations of 1924 affected by this order are section 634, paragraph 1, subparagraphs c, d, f, g, l, and o, section 634½(added by Order 3991, insert 212), paragraphs 1, 2, 5, and 6; and section 1000, paragraph 2.

Postal employees are directed to make appropriate potations in the margin

Postal employees are directed to make appropriate notations in the margin of the Postal Laws and Regulations opposite the sections affected. (See p. 3 of this supplement.)

#### CONDUCT OF POSTAL EMPLOYEES

For the good of the service and the protection of both the public and the membership of service organizations, it was recently found necessary to separate from the service six clerks because of misrepresentation, false affidavits, and misuse of funds in connection with the solicitation of funds for convention

The disclosures in this case have prompted a revision of section 57, Postal Laws and Regulations, 1924, which prohibits the solicitation of contributions of funds and the giving of entertainments, tickets to which are sold to the public. The amendment provides means under which funds may be solicited for the expense of national, State, or large sectional conventions of service organizations.

The department feels that service organizations should not solicit funds for sick benefits. Such a purpose is laudable, but post-office employees are as fully able as are employees in other vocations to finance their own welfare and fraternal work without positions the state of work without soliciting the general public and assuming the need of charitable

It is desired that postmasters bring to the attention of employees the provisions of section 57 as revised, with a view to securing their hearty cooperation in strict compliance with its provisions.

#### STORAGE OF NO. 1 LOCKING AND NONLOCKING SACKS

In order to relieve congestion in the several mail-bag depositories after December 25, all postmasters of first-class offices are hereby directed to store in their offices, so far as facilities will permit, all No. 1 sacks equipped with both locking and nonlocking cord fasteners received by them and not actually needed for use at their offices. Bundles of surplus No. 1 sacks must be opened and sorted by them, the No. 1 locking and the No. 1 nonlocking sacks to be separated and packed separately and placed in storage, piled separately, the other surplus sacks and pouches to go forward to regular designated depositories.

Careful examination must be made of these sacks before being placed in storage to see that no mail matter is left therein, and also that no defective

sacks are included with those placed in storage.

Semimonthly reports in the form of a letter are to be addressed to the General Superintendent, Railway Mail Service, reporting the number of sacks so stored, the totals of locking and nonlocking sacks to be shown separately, and these reports to be headed "Report of No. 1 sacks stored." Only such post offices as store these sacks need make these reports, which may be discontinued after October 1, 1930. Offices not storing should not make reports. Storage of these sacks is to commence immediately after Christmas and should continue until all available storage space is filled.

This matter must be given very careful attention by all concerned.

#### CHANGE IN CONVERSION RATES

ORDER No. 9653.

DECEMBER 3, 1929.

It is ordered that on and after December 6, 1929, in the issue of postal money orders the money of the United States shall be converted into that of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, Irish Free State, Commonwealth of Australia, Union of South Africa, and New Zealand at the rate of \$4.90 to the pound sterling.

#### AMENDING SELLING PRICES OF STAMPED ENVELOPES

ORDER No. 9696.

DECEMBER 18, 1929.

Order No. 9622, dated November 20, 1929, fixing the selling rates for stamped envelopes, effective January 1, 1930, is hereby amended to change the selling rate of No. 13, low-back standard quality envelopes from \$2.28 per thousand to \$2.08 per thousand in addition to postage value. #### DECENTRALIZATION COMPLAINTS AND INQUIRIES, LOSS, RIFLING, DAMAGE, DELAY. WRONG DELIVERY, AND MISTREATMENT OF INTERNATIONAL MAIL

Pursuant to the Postmaster General's Order No. 9661, printed on page 1 of this supplement, postmasters will on and after January 1, 1930, report to inspectors in charge complaints and inquiries concerning the loss, rifling, damage, delay, wrong delivery, and disposition of international mail and requests for return receipts on international mail in the same manner as such matters have hitherto been reported to this office.

#### IRREGULARITIES IN QUARTERLY POSTAL ACCOUNTS

The attention of postmasters at first and second class post offices is called to the necessity of guarding against the frequently occurring irregularities in their accounts listed below.

#### FIRST AND SECOND CLASS POST OFFICES

Forms erroneously inclosed with the quarterly postal accounts instead of being mailed direct under separate cover to the bureau designated in the instructions on the forms:

Quarterly stamp account, Form 3326.

Gross receipts and expenditures for clerical services, Form 1525. Statement of expenditures in City Delivery Service, Form 1809. Statement of dead-letter matter, Form 1503.

Statement of postage collected at pound rates on newspapers and periodicals, Form 3551.

#### VOUCHERS AND STATEMENTS

Every voucher and statement required to be submitted with the quarterly postal account should bear the post office name and State. Postmasters at central accounting offices should see that district office vouchers are complete in this respect.

#### OMISSION OF VOUCHERS AND STATEMENTS

The omission of vouchers or statements through inadvertence from the accounts would be avoided if an item by item check is made with checking list, Form 1249, when the account is ready for mailing, which is the purpose of the checking list.

#### ATTENTION—POSTMASTERS, SUMMER AND WINTER RESORT POST OFFICES

With the view to eliminating complaints in the handling of transient patrons' mail at summer and winter resort post offices, the department has adopted the following Forms 23 and 23-A, which can be secured upon requisition to the Fourth Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Equipment and Supplies. The forms referred to read as follows:

FORM 23-TO TEMPORARY PATRONS ARRIVING AT SUMMER AND WINTER RESORT POST OFFICES

Immediately please furnish your local postmaster with your full name, and at carrier delivery offices your temporary local address, including street and number, and length of probable stay at this address, in order that your mail may be delivered by carrier, unless you desire to rent a post-office box.

Remember, the general delivery at city and village delivery offices is intended only for the the use of Transients who can not receive mail by

carrier, and should not be used where it is possible to receive mail otherwise.

The purpose is to give patrons prompt and efficient service. Please cooperate and furnish this information TO-DAY.

FORM 23-A-TO TEMPORARY PATRONS LEAVING SUMMER AND WINTER RESORT POST OFFICES

Immediately please furnish your local postmaster with your home or forwarding address, including street and number at carrier delivery offices, thus avoiding delay to and mistreatment of your mail.

First-class mail, including letters, is forwarded without additional postage. Other mail requires new postage each time it is forwarded, of which you will be advised by the postmaster.

If you are a subscriber to a paper or magazine, notify publisher of your change

of address, thus insuring and expediting delivery.

The purpose is to give patrons prompt and efficient service. Please cooperate and furnish this information TO-DAY.

#### EXPENDITURES FOR CLERK HIRE AT THIRD-CLASS POST OFFICES

Notwithstanding repeated instructions, some postmasters of third-class offices continue to have their clerks sign pay vouchers in blank on the reverse side of Form 1545-A, the postmaster subsequently filling in the amount.

This procedure is contrary to law and must be immediately discontinued. Partial payments made during the quarter shall be covered by memorandum or temporary receipts which shall be surrendered by the clerk when he signs the full receipt on the back of Form 1545-A at the end of the quarter. At the end of each pay period the salary or compensation of each clerk for the full quarter must be computed and entered in the proper space in the voucher before the clerk affixes his signature. The action of the clerk in thus signing is his certification that the proper amount has been entered in the voucher and has been

received by him. (See instructions at the top of the receipt column at the right side of p. 2 of the quarterly report, Form 1545-A.)

Furthermore, while allowances for clerk hire at third-class post offices are fixed on an annual basis, only such part of an allowance as is absolutely necessary to employ the required help and maintain satisfactory service should be expended, and payment must be made to the person actually performing the service. Postmasters may not personally retain any part of an allowance for

clerk hire or sign any voucher covering such service.

If in any quarter it is necessary to expend more than one-fourth of the annual allowance, or more than the amount allotted to that quarter, the matter should

immediately be brought to the attention of this office.

Postmasters are directed to again read and closely follow the instructions on this subject published in the September, 1929, supplement, under the caption "Expenditures for Clerk Hire at Third-Class Post Offices."

#### AUXILIARY ALLOWANCES FOR CLERKS, CARRIERS, AND LABORERS DURING HOLIDAY SEASON

Postmasters are requested to give this matter their personal attention.

All first and second class post offices needing them have been granted allowances for auxiliary clerks, carriers, and laborers for use in connection with handling the holiday mails. These allowances, while not lavish, are deemed liberal and it is believed that in many instances postmasters will find it possible to return considerable amounts to the department at the end of the season. You are expected to promptly dispatch and deliver the unusual volume of mail with the least possible expense.

At all post offices a careful account shall be kept of expenditures from these allowances which will show at the close of each day the exact amount expended

up to that time and the amount still available.

#### DELIVERY OF PERISHABLE MATTER ON SATURDAY AFTERNOONS, SUNDAYS, AND HOLIDAYS

Complaints continue to be received in the department that many perishable parcels are still being received on Saturday afternoons, Sundays, and holidays, and not being handled in accordance with instructions.

In this connection attention is again called to the following notice which was published on page 3 of the January, 1928, supplement under the above caption, and instructions contained in paragraph 178, pages 28 and 29, of the current

Postal Guide:

"In connection with the receipt of perishable matter, such as edibles, flowers, etc., the attention of postmasters is directed to the notice printed on page 3 of the January, 1927, supplement to the Official Postal Guide, under the heading of 'Perishable Matter—Delivery in Post Offices.'"

Postmasters and postal clerks, particularly at parcel-post windows, must advise mailers of perishable parcel post that such parcels should be sent by special delivery when it appears that in the ordinary course of transmission through the mails they will arrive at office of destination on Saturday after-

noons, Sundays, or holidays.

Postmasters and clerks at offices receiving perishable parcel post on Saturday afternoons, Sundays, and holidays are likewise cautioned that such matter must be given special-delivery service, whether or not special-delivery stamps are affixed. If the special-delivery fee is not paid by the sender an effort must be made to collect it from the addressee. In all such cases, the messenger or other employee making delivery should leave a slip notice with addressee explaining the necessity for charging the extra fee and asking cooperation in having such matter mailed as special delivery in the future. It is believed that this course will be more effective than having the messenger make the explanation per-

In all cases where perishable parcel post not bearing special-delivery stamps is specially delivered the sender must be sent a card notice to the effect that "As parcel mailed by you to (give name and address or addressee) contained perishable matter and was received (late Saturday or on Sunday or a holiday as the case may be) it was necessary to give it special-delivery service and to collect the special-delivery charges from the addressee. In the future, all perishable matter mailed so as to reach destination late Saturday afternoon, or on a Sunday or holiday should be sent as special-delivery with the special-delivery postage prepaid and affixed."

#### MISSENT MAIL

The attention of all postmasters is called to the necessity for a strict observance of paragraphs 5 and 6 of section 562, and paragraph j of section 634, Postal Laws and Regulations, and for full cooperation with the officials of the Railway Mail Service in instances where the provisions of section 1552 are involved.

Postmasters should impress upon dispatching clerks the importance of routing mail properly and upon all employees the necessity of placing proper indorsements on missent mail passing through their hands and its immediate dispatch

in the right direction.

Further, proper reports of missent mail should be made so that the matter may be brought to the attention of the employees at fault. Violations of the regulation have become so frequent that it is necessary to state that employees who fail to make proper indorsements on missent mail will be held equally guilty with the employee who missent it.

#### DISPOSITION OF WASTE

With a view to securing uniformity in the handling and disposition of waste paper and twine at first and second class post offices, the following instructions are issued:

Bids for the purchase of waste, from the beginning of each fiscal year for a period of one year, should be secured on standard Form 33, standard Government short form contract, copies of this form being sent to dealers and also posted. This form should show at least two items-waste paper and waste twine-and if justified additional items of mixed waste, newspapers, cartons, and such other separations of waste as may be profitable. A supply of this standard Form 33, Government short form contract, may be secured upon requisition from the Fourth Assistant, Division of Equipment and Supplies.

Before complying with these instructions postmasters should read carefully sections 104, 107, and 510 of the Postal Laws and Regulations. Contracts on standard Form 33, when completed, should be sent to the Bureau of the First Assistant. Division of Post Office Service.

#### FIREARMS WARNING

Reports of injuries and fatalities that have resulted through careless handling in post offices of Government-owned firearms provided for the protection of the mails having been received, postmasters of offices furnished with such firearms will immediately issue definite instructions and warnings regarding the custody

The cleaning and handling of firearms should be entrusted only to persons familiar with firearms and in no case should anyone else be allowed to handle The custodian of firearms must see that they are not handled or inspected by anyone except if and when occasion arise for their use in protecting the mails.

Any employee violating these instructions will be deemed guilty of a serious

misdemeanor, subject to disciplinary action.

Due to the similarity in names a considerable amount of mail is being missent to the following post offices. The attention of the Postal Service is called thereto with the request that great care be exercised in the distribution of mail for these offices in order that the missending of and resultant delay to mail may be eliminated.

#### RATE FOR ARTICLES TO BE DISPATCHED BY AIR TO CUBA

A large number of letters for Cuba marked for dispatch by air, which weigh more than one-half ounce and not more than 1 ounce, are prepaid only 5 cents, indicating a general lack of knowledge of the fact that the rate of 5 cents is

applicable to the weight unit of one HALF OUNCE instead of 1 ounce.

Postmasters will give as much publicity as possible, without expense to the department, to the fact that the rate applicable to articles to be dispatched by air to Cuba is 5 cents for each HALF OUNCE or fraction, which rate must be fully

prepaid.

#### DIRECT AIR MAIL SERVICE EXTENDED TO URUGUAY

Air mail service on route F. A. M. No. 9 now operating from Cristobal, Canal Zone, to Buenos Aires, Argentina (connecting at Cristobal with the Miami-Cristobal route), will be extended to Montevideo, Uruguay, effective January 20, 1930. The service will be continued weekly. The rate (postage and air mail fee combined) will be 55 cents for each half ounce or fraction, which must be fully prepaid.

First flight letters for transmission by this extended service should be for-

warded in due time for dispatch from Miami January 11.

A cachet will be placed on all first-flight letters for Montevideo by the postmaster at Cristobal, and it is assumed that the postmaster at Montevideo will return first-flight covers by ordinary mail upon request therefor and the sending of international money order to cover return postage. Uruguay will not accept reply coupons. Letters should be marked "Par Avion—By air mail" from

#### MAILERS SHOULD PROPERLY PREPARE CUSTOMS DECLARATIONS ACCOMPANYING PARCEL-POST PACKAGES ADDRESSED FOR DELIVERY IN GREECE

The Postal Administration of Greece has advised that parcels continue to be received in that country bearing customs declarations improperly prepared. Mailers should therefore be warned that failure to list the entire contents of the parcel may result in the omitted articles becoming lost when the parcel is opened by the customs authorities for inspection in Greece. The complaint is also made that mailers fail to indicate on the customs declaration the value of the contents. Such omission results in protracted delay, as the customs authorities, under such circumstances, must first appraise the value of the contents before it will be possible to clear the parcel through the customs.

In this connection, attention is drawn to the proper manner of preparing customs declarations, as set forth in section 74, on page 220, and under the subheading "Observations" of the item "Greece—Parcel Post," on page 346 of the

current Official Postal Guide.

Postmasters should caution mailers respecting the importance of properly preparing customs declarations accompanying parcel-post packages to foreign countries, in order to prevent delayed delivery and the payment of extra charges by the addressees.

#### RETURN RECEIPTS FOR INTERNATIONAL MAIL AND FEES THEREFORE

Numerous registry irregularity reports are being received from exchange offices in this country showing that many postmasters, particularly at third and fourth class offices, are using Form 3811 (domestic form of return receipt) in connection with international registered and insured mail, whereas Form 2865 (old Form 3870) should be used as return receipts for such mail. However, when a third or fourth class office is not specially authorized to prepare foreign return receipts (Form 2865), the sender of a registered article addressed for delivery in a foreign country should, when a return receipt is desired, be instructed to write on the envelope or wrapper the words "Avis de reception" or "A. R.," which are equivalent to "Return receipt requested." The return receipt will then be prepared at the exchange office in this country to which the article is sent for dispatch to the foreign country involved. (See instructions contained in amended sec. 1,000, par. (a), of the Postal Laws and Regulations, as well as the provisions of sec. 118, p. 233 of the July, 1929, Postal Guide.)

However, in the case of registered articles for Canada, postmasters should use the domestic form of return receipt unless they are supplied with the International

form (return receipts are not furnished for insured articles addressed to Canada).

It is also reported that many post offices are collecting a fee of only 3 cents for return receipts requested at time of mailing in connection with registered articles addressed to Canada, whereas the proper fee is 5 cents as in the case of all other foreign countries. Attention is invited to the paragraph on page 272 of the July, 1929, Postal Guide, reading as follows:

"Registry return receipts.—Requested at time of mailing, 5 cents additional; requested after mailing, 10 cents additional. When a return receipt is requested for a registered article addressed for delivery in Garada, the mailing postmaster.

for a registered article addressed for delivery in Canada, the mailing postmaster

will prepare and send the domestic form of the return receipt (Form 3811) with the article unless he has Form 3870 (new Form 2865)."

All postmasters concerned are directed to adopt such corrective measures as

will assure strict compliance with the foregoing.

#### REGISTRATION AND INSURANCE OF ARTICLES IN THE INTERNATIONAL MAILS

It has come to the attention of this office that patrons are not kept fully informed with respect to the availability of registration and insurance of parcels in the parcel-post mails to certain foreign countries. Inasmuch as registration and insurance furnish certain safeguards and, in most cases, provide indemnity for the loss, rifling, or damage, subject to the conditions set forth on pages 229 to 232, inclusive, of the current Official Postal Guide, postmasters should, as far as possible, suggest the use of such services to the public. It should be impressed upon the public that the small additional fee chargeable serves as a means of protection in the event of loss, rifling, or damage.

In addition to registration or insurance of parcels in the parcel-post mails to certain foreign countries, registration is also provided for articles transmitted in the Postal Union (regular) mails to practically all foreign countries. A fee of 15 cents for this service, in addition to the postage, is chargeable. Indemnity is paid for the total loss of mailable Postal Union registered articles, in most cases, subject to the conditions set forth on pages 229 to 232, inclusive, of the current

Postal Guide.

# LOSS OF MAILS BY THE SINKING OF THE STEAMER "FORT VICTORIA"

By the sinking of the steamer Fort Victoria, which sailed from New York on the 18th instant for Bermuda, there were lost 13 sacks of letters for Hamilton, including 201 registered articles; 2 sacks of letters for St. George, including 16 registered articles; 31 sacks of prints for Hamilton and 3 sacks of prints for St. George; 144 sacks of parcel-post mail for Hamilton, including 1,140 ordinary parcels and 202 registered parcels parcels and 202 registered parcels.

The above-mentioned mails accumulated at New York between 9 a. m.,

December 14, and 9 a. m., December 18.

#### DIVISION OF CLASSIFICATION

#### SETTING OF POSTAGE METERS AT CLASSIFIED STATIONS

Postmasters at whose offices permits have been issued for the acceptance of metered permit matter are advised that the setting of the meters may be delegated to the superintendents at classified stations if more convenient to the metered permit holders, provided the organization at the classified station is sufficient and competent to do this work. It is necessary always to have two employees witness the setting of the meter. Metered permit matter may be accepted for mailing at classified stations if, in the judgment of the postmaster, the force at the station is sufficient to handle the matter and it will not operate against the service generally.

In cases where a classified station is delegated to set meters for metered permit holders the postmaster will give instructions that the remittance to cover the amount for which the meter is set shall be sent by the metered permit holder to the cashier at the main office in advance of the request for setting the meter, such remittance to be sent by mail or messenger, as the case may be, and on the receipt thereof the cashier shall advise the superintendent of the classified station interested. In such cases a key for the meter shall be furnished the superintendent

at the classified station who will be responsible therefor.

#### FAILURE TO FURNISH INFORMATION REQUESTED ON FORM 3547

Notwithstanding previous instructions, postmasters in many cases fail to furnish the proper information to the senders on Form 3547 when undeliverable third or fourth class matter bears one of the following requests:

"Postmaster: If addressee has removed, notify sender on Form 3547, postage

for which is guaranteed."

"Postmaster: If addressee has moved, notify sender on Form 3547, postage for which is guaranteed. In case of removal to another post office do not notify the addressee but hold the matter and state on Form 3547 amount of

forwarding postage required, which sender will promptly furnish."

Postmasters are earnestly requested to see that these requests are complied with and all the information furnished as requested, including the amount of forwarding postage when the notice contains a request therefor. In such cases care should also be taken that the matter itself is held a sufficient length of time to give the sender an opportunity to furnish the forwarding postage.

Where matter bears a request as above stated for a notice on Form 3547, postmasters should send that form in all cases where the forwarding address of the addressee is known, regardless of whether or not the matter is actually for-

When the address on the mail includes a key number, that should be shown

in connection with the address on Form 3547.

Postmasters should check up the procedure followed in their offices with respect to the treatment accorded third and fourth class mail bearing a request for notification on Form 3547, when the addressee has removed and his new address is known, and see to it that such notice is promptly furnished in order that the sender's mailing lists may be corrected and the amount of improperly addressed matter passing in the mails thereby reduced, to the mutual advantage of the mailers and the postal service.

# UNDELIVERABLE SECOND, THIRD, AND FOURTH CLASS MATTER BEARING PLEDGE TO PAY FORWARDING OR RETURN POSTAGE

It appears that some postmasters fail to forward to the addressee who has changed bis address to another post office matter of the second, third, and fourth classes which bears the pledge of the sender to pay the forwarding postage. Such matter, as well as all perishable fourth-class matter of obvious value addressed to one who has changed his address to another post office, should, when the addressee has filed an order to forward mail of these classes, be promptly forwarded charged with the forwarding postage to be collected on delivery. No notice on Form 3548 is sent in such cases. (See sec. 575, Postal Laws and Regu-

lations, and art. 206, p. 31, of the July, 1929, Postal Guide.)

It also appears that some postmasters fail to return undeliverable matter of the second, third, and fourth classes which bears a pledge to pay return postage.

Undeliverable mail of these classes which bears the pledge of the sender that postage for its return will be paid, and undeliverable perishable fourth-class mail of obvious value, should be promptly returned to the sender charged with the return postage to be collected on delivery. (See sec. 614, Postal Laws and Regulations, and art. 226, p. 33, of the July, 1929, Postal Guide.)

No particular form of pledge for payofictely below the sender's return postage is

prescribed, but it must be placed immediately below the sender's return card, which is required in all cases, in the upper left corner of the address side, and so worded as to show clearly that the forwarding or return postage will be paid. The following are suggested as suitable forms of pledges:

Forwarding and return postage guaranteed. Return postage guaranteed. If undeliverable please return after \_\_\_\_ days. Return postage guaranteed.

The postmark is partly illegible, the only portion which can be read being "21," evidently the date, and the name of the State, "Maine."

Form 3548 has been sent by a postmaster to Leo Horn, 215 East Second Street, Picher, Okla., care of Star Barber Shop, informing him that a piece of mail is being held for postage. The card Form 3548 does not bear the name of the office from which it was sent, bears no postmark, and is not filled out with the amount of postage required.

Form 3548 has been sent to C. G. Stallsworth, Drew, Miss., advising him that a letter addressed to him is being held for 2 cents postage. The card does not bear the name of the post office and State from which it was sent, and it is not postmarked.

## DIVISION OF REGISTERED MAILS

# REGISTERED ARTICLES DISPATCHED WITHOUT POSTAGE STAMPS BEING AFFIXED

Frequent reports received at the department indicate that employees at mailing post offices fail to see that registered mail requiring the affixing of postage stamps in payment of postage or fee, or both, is dispatched without stamps affixed. A number of such cases have arisen in connection with articles mailed by or addressed to financial institutions. It has been ascertained upon investiga-tion that it often happens that senders have prepaid the postage and fee and the articles involved were dispatched without any evidence of prepayment.

Postmasters and postal employees are enjoined to exercise extreme care to see that postage stamps are affixed to registered mail before dispatch in full prepay-

ment of postage and fee.

(See sec. 863 of the Postal Laws and Regulations of 1924, art. 4, p. 6, and art. 29, p. 119, of the July, 1929, Postal Guide.)

#### NUMBERING AND INDORSEMENT OF REGISTERED MAIL

Frequently the word "Registered" on registered mail is not sufficiently conspicuous, and the registration numbers are not placed immediately adjacent to such indorsement.

The indorsement "Registered" should be conspicuously placed on the address The registration number should be placed immediately side of registered articles.

under this indorsement.

Numbers should be written legibly and the use of stamped or typed numbers on large mailings of registered mail encouraged. Prefixes and suffixes should be eliminated in every instance practicable, and care should be exercised to see that registered articles bear no numbers other than the registration numbers, or such approved numbers as are permissible which, when used, should be added in such an inconspicuous manner that they will not be confused with the numbers assigned by the Postal Service.

#### SENDERS' RETURN RECEIPTS FOR REGISTERED AND INSURED MAIL TO BE INVARIABLY OBTAINED WHEN REQUESTED PROPERLY COMPLETED AND PROMPTLY MAILED TO THE SENDERS—DUPLICATE RETURN RECEIPTS TO BE PROMPTLY COMPLETED AND RETURNED TO THE POSTMASTERS WHO REQUEST SAME

The department is still receiving many complaints of failure to receive return receipts when requested and paid for, as well as numerous complaints that, when received, the return receipts are not properly or completely filled out, restrictive delivery indorsements frequently being ignored.

As a fee is charged for return receipts it is particularly essential that they be obtained when delivery is effected in all instances where they were requested by the senders. Even though a registered article is not accompanied with the prescribed receipt Form 3811, if it bears a notation indicating that the sender desires a return receipt, the receipt should be invariably obtained.

It is also extremely important that all details on the return receipt shall be

correctly filled out. A great many complaints indicate that the date of delivery is not shown, and an equal number show that the receipt is not postmarked to show the name of the delivering office and date of delivery. Failure to receive a return receipt, when requested, or to receive a return receipt that is not correctly completed in each detail, frequently results in much inconvenience to the senders and consequent criticism of the Postal Service. The date of delivery in the postmark on the return receipt should correspond with the date of delivery on the reverse side of the card.

Postmasters are therefore instructed to bring the matter to the attention of all employees involved in such a way as to impress them with the importance of invariably obtaining return receipts when requested and of having same dated and postmarked and of observing any restrictive delivery indorsements borne by registered or insured mail. Strict attention to these requirements will avoid complaints and save time and expense to all concerned. (See art. 59, pp. 129 and 130, and art. 72, pp. 152 and 153, of the July, 1929, Postal Guide.)

It has also been reported to the department that when complaint is made by the sender of a registered or insured article of failure to receive a return receipt, and Form 1516, accompanied by Form 3811, is sent to the office of address, it seems to be a general practice to return the Form 1516 to the postmaster making inquiry, filled out to show the disposition of the article, but unaccompanied by the completed Form 3811, and without any indorsement showing whether or not the Form 3811 has been completed and mailed to the sender direct. It is further stated that it is frequently the case that the duplicate receipt is not postmarked, or else is not postmarked with the correct date of delivery, making it necessary to return the receipt for correction, which, of course, requires additional correspondence and causes unwarranted delay in furnishing the mailer

Postmasters and postal employees are instructed that when a request is received from a postmaster for a duplicate return receipt for a registered or insured article, the receipt should be properly filled out, being postmarked to show the actual date of delivery, and mailed under cover to the postmaster making inquiry for same, for transmission to the sender, in order that the

postmaster may clear his files of the item.

#### OIL FOR CANCELING MACHINES AND SCALES

Notwithstanding several previous notices published in the supplements to the Postal Guide, this bureau continues to receive applications from postmasters for lubricating oil for canceling machines and automatic scales. The following instructions must be observed:

Postmasters at offices where Government-owned motor vehicle service is in operation will secure from their garages sufficient medium motor-vehicle lubricating oil to provide for their needs in connection with canceling machines and

automatic scales.

Postmasters at offices where canceling machines and automatic scales are in use and where there is no motor-vehicle service will forward requisition AND CONTAINERS to the nearest office indicated below, at all of which offices a stock of medium motor-vehicle lubricating oil is maintained. Postmasters at these offices will furnish the oil requisitioned.

# FORFEITURE OF PAY—SCREEN-WAGON CONTRACTORS GUILTY OF THEFT MUST FORFEIT PAY DUE THEM

The Comptroller General has ruled that a mail messenger stealing mail en-The Comptroller General has ruled that a man messenger stealing mail entrusted to him is not entitled to compensation accrued but not paid at the time his services are terminated for such offense. This ruling will apply also to the compensation paid screen-wagon contractors, also to compensation paid letter carriers for the hire of vehicles furnished under contract for use in the Postal

Postmasters are, therefore, advised that when the services of an employee are terminated under circumstances which warrant the forfeiture of any pay which may be due, this forfeiture also applies to any payments for vehicle hire which may have accrued prior to the separation of the employee.

Specific instructions on this point will be issued in each case involving a screen-

wagon contractor.


