The Following Notices Were Issued From the Office of the Postmaster General

FRANK C. WALKER, POSTMASTER GENERAL

REQUESTS FOR OCCUPATIONAL DEFERMENT FROM SELECTIVE SERVICE

ORDER NO. 19295; EFFECTIVE NOVEMBER 25, 1942.

On November 17, the President of the United States addressed the heads of all Federal agencies as follows:

I am anxious to make sure that no man should be deferred from military service by reason of his employment in any Federal department or agency either in Washington or in any other place.

If any such deferment has been given to anyone within your respective jurisdiction, would you please arrange for cancellation thereof as soon as possible and notify the Selective Service Board having jurisdiction? No further requests for deferment by reason of such employment should be made either by the agency or by the employee.

I am sure that in the overwhelming number of cases this action will be welcomed by the young men themselves who are involved.

I know that in certain technical or highly scientific or specialized branches of the service there are a few employees who, by reason of unique experience, are really irreplaceable by women or older men. If there are any which in your opinion fall within this category, will you please write me the full details of them so that their cases may be passed on individually.

Without exception, all officials and employees connected with the postal establishment shall comply immediately with the directions of the President.

Order No. 19025, Postal Bulletin of October 26, 1942, and Order No. 19195, Postal Bulletin of November 16, 1942, which orders were issued in pursuance of Directive No. XI of the War Manpower Commission, are hereby revoked. (Postal Bulletin No. 18521, November 27, 1942.)

AIR MAIL PARCELS

Supplementary Instructions Regarding Inspection

ORDER NO. 19126, EFFECTIVE NOVEMBER 6, 1942.

With reference to the instructions concerning the inspection of air-mail parcels published in the October 23, 1942, POSTAL BULLETIN, in connection with paragraph 6, section 511, Postal Laws and Regulations, as amended by Order No. 19008, it appears that in some cases parcels intended for dispatch by air mail contain articles of such nature as to make it impracticable to open the parcels

at post offices, examine their contents, and repack them without injury to the articles, or lessening the protection thereof as originally prepared. Among these articles are perishable laboratory specimens, vaccines, dentures, undeveloped photographic films, etc. In other cases such parcels contain confidential matter connected with the conduct of the war, or matter such as securities, currency, and jewelry, newspaper matrices, and photographs, commercial papers and similar articles presented regularly, some in considerable quantities, all of which are obviously unobjectionable.

In view of this the instructions accompanying Order No. 19008 appearing in the *POSTAL BULLETIN* of October 23, 1942, regarding sealed parcels or other articles presented for dispatch by air mail are amended as follows with respect to the prescribed endorsement to be placed on such matter by the examining postal employees:

When a postmaster has verified the fact that a parcel intended for dispatch by air mail is presented by a reliable concern and he is satisfied that it contains only articles known to be unobjectionable or of such nature that the parcel cannot be opened by postal employees without imminent danger of damage to the contents or because of other obviously valid reasons, there may be placed on such parcel, in lieu of the endorsement heretofore prescribed, the following:

followed by the name of the post office, signature of the accepting postal employees, and postmark of the office where mailed.

Referring to letters in their "ordinary and usual form" as used in Order No. 19008, this may be construed to include matter in large envelopes or flats, as, for example, envelopes 12 by 9 inches, etc., obviously containing only written or printed matter.

Packages or parcels accepted for mailing under the foregoing conditions without examination of the contents need not bear the notice authorizing opening for postal inspection. (*Postal Bulletin* No. 18513, November 9, 1942.)

PRISONERS-OF-WAR MAIL

Freedom from Postage in the Domestic Mails

ORDER NO. 19127; EFFECTIVE NOVEMBER 6, 1942.

Letters, post cards, consignments of money or valuables, and parcels of other mailable matter not exceeding four pounds in weight intended for or dispatched by prisoners of war, including civilian enemy detainees and internees, shall be accepted free of postage when mailed at and addressed to any place where the United States mail service is in operation. Such matter shall be endorsed by the sender to show in the upper left corner of the address side his name and address and in the upper right corner the inscription: "FREE—Prisoner-of-War Mail." Information bureaus instituted pursuant to Article 77 of the Convention between the United States of America and other powers, proclaimed by the President of the United States August 4, 1932, shall enjoy the same privilege of freedom from postage on postal matter as set forth in this section.

UNITED STATES SAVINGS BONDS

Designation of Depositories, Deposit of Funds, and Bond Supply

ORDER NO. 19129; EFFECTIVE NOVEMBER 6, 1942.

It is ordered that, effective December 1, 1942, all post offices, designated to sell United States Savings bonds, except Washington, D. C., shall remit savings-

bond funds, exclusive of canceled War Savings stamps of first-class offices, to the central accounting post office serving the district in which the remitting post office is located, as indicated on pages 58, 59, and 60 of the current United States Official Postal Guide.

All central accounting post offices are hereby designated as central depositary offices for savings-bond funds, and any post office which is now designated as a central depositary office and which is not a central accounting office, will be discontinued as such central depositary office.

The postmaster at Washington, D. C., and central accounting postmasters will continue to deposit savings-bond funds with the Treasurer of the United States, through Federal Reserve banks and branches and United States depositary banks, for credit of the Postmaster General, United States savings-bond account.

This will result in establishing as central depositaries the following listed offices:

Postmasters at first-class offices will requisition bond stock direct from the Department, addressing requisitions to the Third Assistant, Division of Postal Savings. Postmasters at second- and third-class offices and selected offices of the fourth-class will requisition bond stock from their respective central accounting postmaster. (Postal Bulletin No. 18513, November 9, 1942.)

SELECTIVE SERVICE—CLASSIFICATION STATUS

ORDER NO. 19195; EFFECTIVE NOVEMBER 13, 1942.

In order that the status of postal employees under the Selective Service and Training Act may represent as accurately as possible the decisions reached under War Manpower Commission Directive No. XI, postmasters, division superintendents, and bureau heads in the Department should ascertain the present classification status under the Selective Service and Training Act of all male employees, if such information is not currently available.

Postmasters, division superintendents, and bureau heads in the Department should then prepare Form 42B and send it to the appropriate local Selective Service Board for reclassification to class III-B of all employees who meet both of the following specifications:

- (a) Who are now in Class III-A; and
- (b) Who occupy positions listed in paragraphs 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 of Order No. 19,025, Postal Bulletin of October 26, 1942.

The Form 42B should be accompanied with a letter to the local board stating, "The position occupied by this employee is included in the list of key positions established in accordance with paragraph II of War Manpower Commission Directive No. XI for which occupational deferment was considered to be justified." (Postal Bulletin No. 18516, November 16, 1942.)

NATIONAL SALVAGE PROGRAM

The attention of postmasters and all field officers of the Postal Service is invited to the following letter received from the Director, Conservation Division, War Production Board, dated November 3, 1942:

MY DEAR MR. POSTMASTER GENERAL: The importance of scrap to our war production program can scarcely be exaggerated, especially in view of

the fact that production is, in many cases, limited only by shortages of metal, both ferrous and nonferrous.

The attached letter from Mr. Stephen Early shows a definite desire on the part of the President to have all departments and agencies of the Federal Government do their part in supplying these materials for war purposes.

Although the whole nation has combed and will continue to hunt for all available sources of scrap metal, and although much has been done by Federal agencies in the collection of waste and surplus metals, the time has now arrived when many metallic items now in use should be made available for scrap purposes. Fences, railings, gates, grille-work, and similar articles which are not needed for real protection purposes or are not otherwise performing an essential function and are not of irreplaceable historic or artistic value, should be turned in as scrap now.

I therefore request that you have all divisions of your organization report for disposal as scrap such items as fall within the above definition to the Procurement Division of the Treasury Department, which is cooperating with the War Production Board in this program. In some cases it may be necessary to revise or reinterpret existing departmental regulations or definitions which may hinder your organization from complying to the fullest with this request, and I hope that you will do this.

I wish to express my appreciation for the fine way in which you have cooperated with us in the past, and earnestly request that you aid us in this further and necessary step. What you do now will be an example to state, municipal and private owners.

Attention is also invited to orders and instructions published in Postal Bulletins of August 3; September 11, and September 23, 1942, concerning this subject and it is encouraging to note that 1,792,361 pounds of scrap metal have been made available for the war effort.

It is believed, however, that further survey will result in additional poundage of scrap metal being made available for this purpose. Postmasters and other field officers are requested to personally make surveys and dispose of all scrap metal in accordance with previous instructions. (Postal Bulletins August 3, September 11, and September 23, 1942.)

All postmasters and other field officers are requested also to make a survey of the exterior and interior of the building, and the grounds, and report to the Fourth Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Building Operations and Supplies, Maintenance Branch, all Government-owned metal items which, in their opinion, may be declared surplus and as not having a useful or protective value and which may be disposed of without affecting the Postal Service or the operation, maintenance and protection of Government-owned buildings and leased or rented Post Office and garage quarters. In submitting this report, indicate its location and state whether the removal of the particular item would create a hazard and, if so, to what extent.

Take no action to dispose of it until given specific instructions.

In view of the urgency of this subject and a very vital need of increasing quantities of scrap metal required in the prosecution of a victorious war, all postmasters and field officers are requested to give the foregoing their prompt attention and to submit prompt and detailed reports of their surveys. (Postal Bulletin No. 18516, November 16, 1942.)

ARMY POSTAL SERVICE

ORDER No. 19369, DATED DECEMBER 3, 1942.

Pursuant to the order published in the Postal Bulletin of July 20, 1942, the Post Office Department accepted on behalf of the War Department applications from qualified postal employees for commissions in the Army Postal Service, and a number of those whose names were submitted to the War Department in accordance with requests made by the Adjutant General have been commissioned. The War Department now has a large roster from which to make further selections if more are needed.

In a letter from the War Department dated November 20, 1942, it was stated:

In reference to the procurement of officer personnel for the Army Postal Service our requirements . . . have been met and no further appointments will be made from the lists of civilian employees from post offices and the Railway Mail Service until a new need exists.

At this time the Post Office Department has on file the names of several hundred additional postal employees whose eligibility was established since the War Department last requested a list of applicants and these names will be submitted if the War Department requests them. As the requirements of the War Department have been met, the need for further applications has passed and none will be considered. Because of the large number of applications on file, it is impracticable to conduct correspondence concerning them. The information herein will serve as a reply to inquiries.

The order published in the Postal Bulletin of July 20, 1942, is hereby revoked. (Postal Bulletin No. 18525, December 4, 1942.)

ELIMINATION OF OATH FROM STANDARD FORM NO. 1012-REVISED, TRAVEL EXPENSE VOUCHER

ORDER No. 19341, DATED DECEMBER 1, 1942.

Under date of October 30, 1942, the Comptroller General of the United States advised that in order to facilitate throughout the Government service the preparation and handling of travel expense vouchers on Standard Form 1012-Revised, "Voucher for Per Diem and/or Reimbursement of Expenses Incident to Official Travel," the said form is revised effective November 1, 1942, as follows:

The certificate of the claimant is changed to—

I certify that the above account and schedule annexed are true and just in all respects; that payment therefor has not been received; and that my statements of travel performed by the means herein set forth correctly reflect travel performed by me on official business.

This will eliminate the oath which has heretofore been required. Authority has been granted to exhaust the stock of old forms before using the new form by striking out the words "do solemnly swear (or affirm)" and writing in above this strike-out the word "certify."

Postmasters, other officials and employees should require that Forms 1012 be properly changed before submission to the Department.

Other changes are being made in Form 1012-Revised, among them being a provision that in the space where the provision for executing an oath or affirmation is deleted, the following will be substituted in the same location on the form:

PENALTY FOR PRESENTING FRAUDULENT CLAIM.—Fine of not more than \$10,000 or imprisonment for not more than ten years or both. (See 52 Stat. 197; U. S. C. 18:80.)

FORFEITURE OF FRAUDULENT CLAIM.—Falsification of an item in an expense account works a forfeiture of the entire claim. (See 36 Stat. 1141; U. S. C. 28:279, 280; 18 Comp. Gen. 603.)

The other changes do not affect the field service. (Postal Bulletin No. 18525, December 4, 1942.)

SECOND-CLASS OFFICES DESIGNATED AS DISTRICT OFFICES

ORDER No. 19316, DATE NOVEMBER 30, 1942.

Effective January 1, 1943, all post offices of the second class are designated as district offices of the central accounting offices serving their respective districts, as indicated on pages 58, 59, and 60 of the current U. S. Official Postal Guide.

Postmasters at offices of the second class shall treat all postal and money-order cash as postal funds, to be available for the payment of money orders, post-office salaries, and all other authorized expenditures.

At each second-class office the postmaster will make a complete and detailed record of all postal and money-order receipts, disbursements and trust fund

and fixed credit transactions in the new Post Office Account and Cash Book which will be provided together with detailed instructions.

Promptly after the close of each quarter a consolidated account, showing in detail all postal and money-order transactions, shall be prepared and submitted by postmasters at offices of the second class with all supporting vouchers, summaries, and documents, to the proper central accounting postmaster. Money orders issued shall be listed on proper abstracts and such abstracts forwarded with the quarterly account.

Postmasters at offices of the second class shall handle all postage-stamp stock on a revolving fixed credit basis, the initial stock to be received for on Form 3367 and all replacement stock to be purchased for cash, or cash items from the Central Accounting Postmaster.

Paid money orders will be treated as cash and remitted with other surplus postal funds to the proper Central Accounting Postmaster. (Postal Bulletin No. 18523, December 1, 1942.)

DANGER—FIRE HAZARDS

Personal observation and inquiries cause me to believe our postal personnel are well protected against fire hazards. Building changes, transfers of operations, and other varying conditions, however, bring about fire danger unless constant vigilance is exercised.

Postmasters, railway and air-mail service officers, and all other postal supervisors will make, without delay, personal examination of all buildings housing postal operations, their exists, heating plants and other heating devices, wiring, fire extinguishers, and accumulations of material which might constitute a fire hazard, as well as any other conditions which might endanger the lives of postal people.

Special attention should be given to large numbers of postal personnel working in space secured temporarily for the handling of holiday mail.

Post-office inspectors will be diligent in noting any defective conditions, calling attention of responsible officials to their existence and making suitable report of them through regular channels.

Prompt reports should be made to responsible bureau heads of any bad conditions found and the corrective action taken. All postal officers are enjoined to give this notice their personal and prompt attention. (Postal Bulletin No. 18527, December 9, 1942.)

DIVISION OF RETIREMENT RECORDS

Transfers Within the Service To Be Reported on Form 1551

Hereafter when an employee transfers from one position to another within the Postal Service the individual retirement record, Form 2806, will be completed to show the retirement deductions and service history up to the date of transfer. The use of Form 5213 will be discontinued for reporting retirement deductions and service history of employees transferring within the service.

In the future a transfer within the service should be treated as a separation from the office or position from which an employee transfers, and should be reported by the office concerned on Form 1551. In such cases, line 3 of Form 1551 should be completed to show "Transfer to _____ giving the name of the office or branch of the Postal Service to which transfer is being effected.

Report of Leave Required

Until such time as a form is adopted for conveying such information, a report should be submitted, to the office or branch of the service to which transfer is being made, showing the annual and sick leave accrued to the date of transfer and the amount of leave taken (all classes) during the current calendar year, January 1 to the date of transfer. These reports should be prepared in triplicate; the original to be forwarded to the office or branch of the service to which the employee is transferring; the duplicate to be attached to Form 1551; and the triplicate to be retained by the office or branch of the service from which an employee is transferred. Such reports should be in the following form:

Leave record

These instructions supersede all previous instructions concerning reports required in cases of transfers within the Postal Service, and all forms on which instructions to the contrary now appear will be appropriately revised when next printed.

Report of Separation To Be Submitted for Presidential Postmasters at First, Second, and Third Class Offices

Presidential postmasters are requested to submit reports on Form 1551 upon their separation from the service and to give the same reference to such reports as is given Forms 1551 covering separations of other employees at the same office. If the separation is a retirement, the service history side of the form should be completed to show the dates of appointment and termination of each period of service; also the salary at 100 percent by fiscal years for all service subsequent to August 1, 1920. (Postal Bulletin No. 18514, November 11, 1942.)

FORMS 1529-1, 1529-2, AND 1529-3

Reference is made to the instructions in the Postal Bulletin of October 9, 1942, under the above caption, on "HOW TO COMPUTE TOTAL MANPOWER HOURS—FIRST-CLASS OFFICES ONLY."

The second paragraph under subheading "CORRECTIONS" is changed to read as follows:

"To obtain the manpower hours of regular employees for 'same quarter last year,' the number of authorized positions **at** that time should be multiplied by the total working hours in the quarter (not including Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays). From these totals should be deducted the 'hours absent' during same quarter last year of regular employees on military leave with pay, civil service, court and jury duty, vacancies, detail of regulars to post office inspector, absence without pay, military leave without pay, detail of regulars to military unit, sick leave, **and** vacation. . . . The same procedure should be followed in computing manpower hours estimated for 'this quarter' except that the total 'estimated absence,' **not including Saturday, Sunday, and holiday compensatory time** will be deducted from the total regular manpower hours for 'this quarter.' Auxiliary hours under this caption will be the total of items 15 and 33." (Postal Bulletin No. 18518, November 20, 1942).

PREPARATION FOR EMERGENCIES

In line with the notice in the Postal Bulletin of December 20, 1941, lists of doctors and ambulances available, including their telephone numbers and addresses, should be attached to the doors of all first-aid cabinets in post offices. (Postal Bulletin No. 18517, November 18, 1942.)

COMPENSATORY TIME FOR SERVICE PERFORMED ON ARMISTICE DAY AND THANKSGIVING DAY

Reference is made to the Postmaster General's Orders relative to the postal service on Armistice Day and Thanksgiving Day at all post offices.

When a holiday, except Christmas Day, does not fall on a Saturday, there is no provision of law for the payment of overtime in lieu of compensatory time to foremen, special clerks, clerks, watchmen, messengers, laborers, and city carriers for the first 8 hours of service performed on a holiday. Postmasters should therefore refrain from requesting authority to pay overtime in lieu of compensatory time. See sections 464 and 924 of the Postal Laws and Regulations and, instructions "Compensatory Time," U. S. Official Postal Guide, as to granting of compensatory time. (Postal Bulletin No. 18514, November 11, 1942.)

Parcel Post Mail—Dispatch Unlocked When Necessary

The stock of ordinary mail locks as shown on depository reports indicate that there will again be a shortage of these locks this year for locking first-class mail during the approaching holiday period unless some parcel post mails are dispatched unlocked between now and Christmas.

Postmasters and officials of the Railway Mail Service will issue instructions, effective at once and continuing until Christmas, as follows:

1. All pouches containing first-class mail must be locked.
2. Sacks containing insured and c. o. d. parcel post will be locked when sufficient locks are available.
3. Ordinary parcel post will be dispatched unlocked, particularly on long-haul matter, and when necessary on short-haul matter, to permit an accumulation of sufficient locks in depositories for filling requisitions which will insure the locking of first-class mail. Mail-bag depositories are to show on their reports, Form 5047, each day, all surplus locks that can be spared in column headed "On hand—surplus for disposition."

Postmasters and Railway Mail Service officials are also to call attention of all employees to existing instructions that post offices and Railway Mail Service organizations shall dispatch surplus locks daily to the proper depository and retain only sufficient quantities to meet actual requirements as outlined above.

This is important and should be given attention by all concerned. (Postal Bulletin No. 18514, November 11, 1942.)

DIVISION OF INTERNATIONAL POSTAL SERVICE

SUSPENSION OF MAIL SERVICE TO CONTINENTAL FRANCE, CORSICA, AND MONACO

Effective at once, and until further notice, the mail service (surface and air) to Continental France, Corsica, and Monaco is suspended.

Any mail that may be posted for the destinations mentioned will be sent as usual to the proper United States exchange office, which office has been appro-

priately instructed with respect to the disposition to be made of such mail. (Postal Bulletin No. 18525, December 4, 1942.)

GIFT PACKAGES ADDRESSED TO AMERICAN CITIZENS SERVING IN BRITISH OR ALLIED UNITS

Information has been received from the Postal Administration of Great Britain that gift parcels containing tobacco and other articles not exceeding 11 pounds in weight addressed to American citizens serving in British or other Allied units in the United Kingdom are admitted free of duty. Such parcels must be addressed to the individual, by name, in care of an appropriate organization as follows:

Bulk shipments of gifts may also be sent to the American Eagle Club, Ltd., 28, Charing Cross Road, London, W. C. 2, for free distribution to American citizens serving in British or Allied units.

Parcels shall not be mailed oftener than once a week when sent by or on behalf of the same person or concern to or from the same addressee and shall not exceed 18 inches in length or 42 inches in length and girth combined.

The foregoing supersedes the instructions on this subject published on page 6 of the October Supplement, 1941, page 13 of the January Supplement, 1942, and on page 7 of the September Supplement, 1942. (Postal Bulletin No. 18518, November 20, 1942.)

MAIL AND PARCELS FOR MEMBERS OF THE CANADIAN ARMED FORCES OVERSEAS

It has come to the attention of this Office that some postmasters are refusing mail and parcel post addressed to the "Royal Canadian Air Force Overseas" and "Canadian Army Overseas" on the ground that such articles are inadequately addressed.

Mail and parcels addressed as indicated above and bearing the number, rank, and name of the addressee followed by the unit or branch of the service to which he is attached, without specific indication of the post office or country of ultimate destination, shall be accepted. (See sec. 28, p. 18, Part II, of the Postal Guide.) Mail so addressed should be sent into the Canadian Postal Service for onward transmission.

Regular (Postal Union) mail articles addressed as indicated to the Royal Canadian Air Force Overseas, the Canadian Army Overseas, or similar addresses, are subject to the postage rates and conditions applicable to Canada. No air mail service is provided for such articles beyond Canada. However, air mails for these addresses are subject to Order No. 18605 providing that all packages and that letters weighing more than 2 ounces shall not be accepted as air mail. Parcel-post packages are subject to the postage rate of 14 cents per pound or fraction applicable to parcels for Canada and are subject to Order No. 17471 as to weight, dimensions and frequency of mailing.

This notice supersedes notices on this subject appearing on pages 6 and 7 of the September Supplement, 1941, and on page 20 of the July Supplement 1942. (Postal Bulletin No. 18519, November 23, 1942.)

MAILS FOR UNITED STATES ARMED FORCES OUTSIDE THE CONTINENTAL UNITED STATES, VIA NEW YORK, N. Y.

Owing to the increased volume of mail for United States naval vessels, United States naval units, United States military units, etc., and in order to expedite distribution and dispatch of this mail at New York, N. Y., post offices and railway

post offices will, when the quantity warrants, make up separate pouches of letters and separate sacks of "prints" and parcel post as follows:

New York, N. Y., Morgan Annex (<u>naval mail</u>)	United States naval vessels, United States naval bases, etc., and United States Marine Corps units, addressed "Care Postmaster, New York, N. Y."

	American base forces followed by names of islands, such as Bermuda, Trinidad, etc.; base commands preceded by name of islands, such as Bermuda Base Command.
	The civilian personnel, including contractors and their employees who are nationals of the United States, and employed in connection with the establishment, maintenance, or operation of these bases, and the families of such persons.

When the quantity does not justify separate pouches of naval letters and military letters, such letters will be made up in packages under facing slips reading "New York, N. Y.—Naval Mail" or "New York, N. Y.—Military Mail" and these packages included in pouches labeled "New York, N. Y.—Morgan Annex—Military Mail." If the quantity of Naval and Military letters does not justify the preparation of a "New York, N. Y.—Morgan Annex—Military Mail" pouch include the packages of letters in the pouch labeled "New York, N. Y.—Foreign."

When the quantity of "prints" and parcel post does not justify a separate "New York, N. Y.—Morgan Annex—Naval Mail" sack, include such "prints" and parcel post in the "New York, N. Y.—Morgan Annex—Military Mail" sack. Should the quantity of "prints" and parcel post (a few pieces) not warrant either a "New York, N. Y.—Morgan Annex—Naval Mail" or a "New York, N. Y.—Morgan Annex—Military Mail" sack, then include "prints" in the "New York, N. Y.—Foreign—Prints" sack and parcels in the "New York, N. Y.—Foreign—Parcel Post" sack.

V-Mail letters addressed to members of the armed forces "Care Postmaster, New York, N. Y." should be tied out in separate bundles, the facing slips reading "New York, N. Y.—Morgan Annex—V-Mail—Naval" or "New York, N. Y.—Morgan Annex—V-Mail—Military," as the case may be.

Air mail for the naval vessels, naval units and Army post offices, etc., mentioned above should be made up in bundles or pouches labeled "New York, N. Y.—Morgan Annex—Naval—Air Mail" or "New York, N. Y.—Morgan Annex—Military—Air Mail."

Mail for the naval vessels, naval units and Army post offices, etc., mentioned above must NOT be included in the pouches or sacks containing mail for New York City (New York City or New York City Dis.).

The above instructions supersede those published in the POSTAL BULLETIN of January 13, 1942, and reprinted on pages 11 and 12 of the February Supplement 1942. (Postal Bulletin No. 18525, December 4, 1942.)

MAILS FOR UNITED STATES DEFENSE BASES, UNITED STATES NAVAL VESSELS, UNITED STATES NAVAL UNITS, AND UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS, VIA SAN FRANCISCO

With a view to expediting the distribution and dispatch of mail received at San Francisco, California, addressed to members of the armed forces abroad, all post offices and railway post offices will, effective at once, make the following separations of such mail: Mail for the Army should be labeled "Army Mail," mail for the Navy should be labeled "Navy Mail," and mail for the Marines should be labeled "Marine Mail."

**SEPARATION OF MATTER FOR ARMED FORCES ADDRESSED IN CARE OF POSTMASTER,
SEATTLE, WASHINGTON**

The Postmaster at Seattle, Wash., reports the receipt of direct pouches and sacks for Seattle containing military and naval mail. The inclusion of such mail in direct pouches and sacks for Seattle not only causes additional handling but results in delayed distribution and dispatch. Therefore, commencing at once, all post offices and railway post offices will include mail for the Navy and Marine Corps in pouches and sacks labeled "Seattle, Wash., Navy Mail," while that for the Army should be included in pouches and sacks labeled "Seattle, Wash., Army Mail." (Postal Bulletin No. 18519, November 23, 1942.)

**MAILINGS OF PARCELS TO PRISONERS OF WAR AND CIVILIAN INTERNEES CONFINED IN
ENEMY OCCUPIED COUNTRIES**

The Board of Economic Warfare, Office of Export Control, has issued a general license known as "G-PW-2," authorizing the exportation, by mail only, of gift parcels addressed to members of the armed forces of the United States and the Allied Nations who are prisoners of war in enemy occupied countries, and to civilians of the United States and the Allied Nations who are interned in enemy occupied countries. Persons desiring to send parcels under the general license may do so in accordance with the following provisions—**WITHOUT APPLYING TO THE BOARD OF ECONOMIC WARFARE FOR AN EXPORT LICENSE.**

1. Parcels shall not exceed 11 pounds gross weight, or 18 inches in length, or 42 inches in length and girth combined. These restrictions are designed to conserve shipping facilities for the transportation of war materials. (See page 2 of the May Supplement, 1942.)

2. One parcel only may be sent to each prisoner of war or civilian internee in each calendar 60-day period.

3. The contents of each parcel shall be listed on Customs Declaration Form 2966, which may be obtained at the post office, and must be affixed on the outside of the parcel at the time of mailing. In the event the post office does not have available a copy of Form 2966, the contents of the parcel may be listed on a piece of paper to be attached to the parcel.

4. Parcels addressed to members of the armed forces of the United States, who are prisoners of war, or to nationals of the United States who are interned in enemy occupied territory, must bear an official label which will be furnished in duplicate by the Provost Marshal General's Office, War Department, Washington, D. C., without request, to the next of kin or the person designated by the prisoner or internee as his beneficiary. These labels will contain the name and address of the prisoner or internee, will bear a Provost Marshal General's Office form number, and will state the calendar 60-day period in which it is valid for use. **IT IS NOT POSSIBLE FOR THE DESIGNATED BENEFICIARIES OR NEXT OF KIN TO SEND PACKAGES TO PERSONS WHO HAVE NOT BEEN OFFICIALLY RECOGNIZED AS PRISONERS OF WAR OR INTERNEES.** The next of kin or the beneficiary may transfer the labels to another person for use in mailing parcels, but the name of the sender shall be written in ink on such labels in the space provided therefor. One of the labels, properly filled in by the sender, must be pasted on the outside of the parcel, and the other label shall be placed inside with the contents. The general license number "G-PW-2" must be printed on the labels. (Due to lack of transportation facilities to South Pacific destinations, labels for prisoners of war and civilian internees confined in that area will not be issued at this time. When facilities are available to transport packages to Japan and Japanese controlled territory, labels will be issued to the next of kin without request.)

5. In the case of parcels addressed to members of the armed forces of the British Empire or to interned civilians who are nationals of the British Empire, the label issued by their respective Governments to the next of kin or other designated beneficiary of the prisoner of war or interned civilian must be affixed on the outside of the parcel by the sender.

6. In the case of parcels addressed to members of the armed forces of any of the United Nations (except the United States and the British Empire) who are prisoners of war in Germany or German controlled territory, and parcels addressed to nationals of the United Nations (except the United States and the British Empire), who are interned in Germany or German controlled territory, the sender must affix on the outside of the parcel the proper label issued by the German authorities to the prisoner or internee designated on such label.

7. In the case of parcels addressed to members of the armed forces of any of the United Nations (except the United States and the British Empire) who are prisoners of war in Italy or Italian controlled territory, and parcels addressed to nationals of any of the United Nations (except the United States and the British Empire), who are interned in Italy or Italian controlled territory, a certification in the following form must be written or pasted on the outside of the parcel by the sender:

I certify that the prisoner of war (or civilian internee) to whom this parcel is addressed is personally known by me to be at the address given and I have mailed no other parcel to this prisoner (or civilian internee) within the sixty days prior to this date, and to my knowledge no other package has been mailed to this prisoner (or civilian internee) in such period.

The signature and address of the sender must be written in ink.

8. In all cases the senders of parcels must write in ink under the address the following:

9. Parcels shall not contain any of the following:

- (a) Food of any type (except as specifically listed in following paragraph 10).
- (b) Medical supplies of any type (except Vitamin tablets in cardboard containers).
- (c) Articles in glass containers.
- (d) Articles in hermetically, vacuum, or soldered sealed tins.
- (e) Articles in collapsible tin tubes such as shaving cream or tooth paste.
- (f) Written or printed matter of any kind.

10. Subject to the limitations of paragraph 9, the following articles only may be included in gift parcels exported under general license:

Sugar in paper bags or cardboard boxes not in excess of one pound.

This is to be added to section 71 on page 55 of Part II of the current Official Postal Guide.

Any valid outstanding individual export license issued by the Board of Economic Warfare authorizing the exportation of articles to members of the armed forces of the United Nations who are prisoners of war or to civilians interned in enemy occupied territory who are nationals of the United Nations is not invalidated by this general license and may be used by the licensee for the purpose of sending such gift parcel as is covered by the license to the prisoner or internee designated on it. These individual export licenses must be taken up by the post office when the parcel is mailed and returned to the Office of Exports, Board of Economic Warfare, Washington, D. C., when the shipment is completed. (Postal Bulletin No. 18513, November 13, 1942.)

PRISONER OF WAR MAIL—RECEIPTS FOR PARCELS

Reference is made to the instructions published in the Postal Bulletin of May 6, 1942, and as Change No. 64 on pages 47 and 49 of the May Supplement, 1942, concerning the handling of letters and parcels for prisoners of war and interned civilians.

Receipts given by prisoners, or by camp spokesmen on their behalf, on an appropriate form furnished by the sender of the parcel with an indication that the receipt is from a prisoner of war and the further indication "Franc de port—Gebuhrenfrei—Postage free" shall be accepted in the mail free of postage and sent onward to destination in the same manner as other prisoner of war communications. (Postal Bulletin No. 18524, December 2, 1942.)

UNION OF SOUTH AFRICA AND SOUTH-WEST AFRICA**Books at Printed Matter Rate Exempt From Special Import License Requirements**

Information has been received to the effect that Books sent to the Union of South Africa and South-West Africa for resale are exempt from the special import permit requirements which became effective on October 1, provided such books are mailed at the postage rate and under the conditions applicable to PRINTED MATTER, with the exception of used and overissue magazines and periodicals in bulk. Magazines for sale on newsstands are not exempt from the restrictions which became effective on October 1, 1942. Packages of books which are mailed under the exemption referred to shall be endorsed by the sender with the words "PRINTED MATTER—BOOKS." Packages of books mailed under any other classification shall continue to be subject to the instructions published on pages 9 and 10 of the October Supplement, 1942, under the caption "Restriction on the Importation of Goods into the Union of South Africa and South-West Africa for Trade Purposes." (Postal Bulletin No. 18527, December 9, 1942.)

CAUTION AGAINST TRANSMISSION OF MONEY IN CASH, BANK NOTES, OR VALUES PAYABLE TO BEARER IN REGISTERED OR ORDINARY LETTERS ADDRESSED TO FOREIGN COUNTRIES

Aside from the risks involved in the transmission of money in the mails and the difficulty in fixing responsibility in certain cases where rifling has occurred, money in cash, bank notes, and values payable to the bearer are prohibited transmission in registered letters addressed to certain countries of the Postal Union of the Americas and Spain and in ordinary (unregistered) letters to any foreign country. Also, as stated in the relative portion of paragraph (s), section 22, page 17, in the July 1941 Postal Guide, Part II, the prohibition likewise applies to registered mail to certain other countries, as shown under the special prohibition of the respective country items in the Guide.

Postmasters are, therefore, again directed to have tactful and sufficient inquiry made in the acceptance of matter for registration to foreign countries in order to caution mailers against the practice of many at present of sending money to foreign countries by registered or ordinary mail.

As the international money-order system offers the safest method of transmitting funds to foreign countries, senders desiring to forward money abroad should be urged to use that system whenever it is available. (Postal Bulletin No. 18514, November 11, 1942.) B

COLLECTION OF PROPER INTERNATIONAL REGISTRY, INSURANCE, AND C. O. D. FEES

Instances have arisen in which the indemnity allowed in connection with international registered, insured, and c. o. d. parcel post did not cover the full amount of the loss, due to the fact that the fee paid was insufficient to allow indemnity in a greater amount. Also, it is invariably stated by the sender that assurance was given by the accepting employee that the fee paid was sufficient.

In each instance in which there is registry, insurance, or c. o. d. parcel-post service with a particular country in connection with which indemnity is payable, either a schedule of the fees chargeable and the limits of indemnity payable is published under the appropriate country heading in Part II of the current Official Postal Guide, or, reference is made to another portion of the Guide furnishing the relative information. There is, therefore, little justification, if any, for the collection of a fee so inadequate as to deprive the sender of the protection sought and which the sender was led to believe had been secured.

Postmasters are again directed to take the necessary corrective action to assure that all accepting employees at their offices exercise the care and diligence required of them in determining the proper fees to be charged on the class of mail matter referred to herein.

As a general rule, the responsibility of the accepting employee may not be involved unless the employee gave assurance that full reimbursement would be made in the event of loss, or, knowing the value, failed to collect the proper or the maximum fee chargeable, as the case may be. (Postal Bulletin No. 18514, November 11, 1942.)

REGISTERED ARTICLES EXCHANGED WITH FOREIGN COUNTRIES—NUMBERING AND POSTMARKING—RETURN RECEIPTS

In connection with the handling of international mail, postmasters are especially directed to see that registered articles addressed to foreign countries are properly postmarked and that all registration numbers, whether written or stamped with numbering machines, are clear and unmistakable, the use of stamped or typed numbers on large mailings of registered articles being encouraged. See sections 1207 and 2208 of the Postal Laws and Regulations.

Postmasters are likewise directed to see that registered articles addressed to foreign countries for which the sender requests a return receipt bear, on the front, the conspicuous notation, "Avis de Reception" (return receipt) or the imprint of a stamp "A. R." In such cases, Form 2865 shall be made up and fastened securely to the outside of the article by all first-, second-, and third-class offices, the return receipt being supplied by the dispatching exchange office in the case of registered articles originating at fourth-class offices. A fee of 5 cents shall be charged for a return receipt requested at the time of mailing and 10 cents if requested after mailing.

Also, particular care should be exercised to see that return receipts from foreign countries are duly signed and completed by the delivering postmaster so as to show the postmark of his office and the date of delivery. See paragraph 8, section 106, page 69, Part II, of the current Official Postal Guide. (Postal Bulletin No. 18514, November 11, 1942.)

DUTIABLE ARTICLES IN LETTER PACKAGES FOR FOREIGN COUNTRIES

It has been observed that occasionally letters or packages prepaid at the letter rate of postage, containing articles liable to customs duty, and otherwise conforming to existing regulations, are accepted for mailing to foreign countries without the green label, Form 2976 (C 1), affixed to the cover. Such articles not bearing the green label are subject to confiscation in some foreign countries.

Postmasters shall therefore see to it that all employees concerned are thoroughly familiar with the instructions set forth in paragraph 5 of section 3 on page 4 of Part II of the Postal Guide (including the requirement concerning the paper form of customs declaration (Form 2976-A (C 2), or an invoice), and that the provisions thereof are invariably brought to the notice of prospective mailers. (Postal Bulletin No. 18514, November 11, 1942.)

DIVISION OF POSTAL SAVINGS WAR SAVINGS BONDS

Dissemination of Misleading Information on Redemption

It has been reported that, in some instances, bond owners have been informed that immediate payment can be obtained if they will present their bonds personally at the office of the Treasurer of the United States or at a Federal Reserve bank or branch. Such advice is erroneous as checks are used to pay savings bonds, and the checks are always mailed. While some, being in the vicinity, will prefer to deliver their bonds in person, in general, owners should be advised to transmit the bonds they wish paid, after certification, to a Federal Reserve bank or branch or to the Treasurer of the United States by mail, preferably registered for their own protection. (Postal Bulletin No. 18517, November 18, 1942.)

WAR SAVINGS STAMPS

New Issue

The Treasury Department has designed a new War Savings stamp and production is now under way. The new design portrays the "Minute Man" figure in the center of the stamp flanked by the words "United States" on the left and "War Savings" on the right.

However, no general distribution of the new stamps will be made until all available stocks of the old issue are more nearly exhausted. Consequently, in response to requisitions received by the Department, shipments in the immediate future will, with the exception of the twenty-five cent stamps, be made of the old issue. The new issue of that denomination is now being furnished. (Postal Bulletin No. 18511, November 4, 1942.)

WAR SAVINGS STAMPS

Labels for Transmitting Bulky Packages by Registered Mail

Official labels (Form 910) have been printed for use by second- and third-class postmasters in registering remittances of packages of canceled War Savings stamps that are too large for enclosure in official registry envelopes. Postmasters whose remittances are bulky should requisition a supply of these labels from their designated supply offices. (Postal Bulletin No. 18511, November 4, 1942.)

WAR SAVINGS BONDS

Continuance of Quarter-Monthly Reports to State Administrators

Until otherwise directed by the Department, all postmasters are authorized, if requested, to continue to give quarter-monthly reports on the volume of bond sales in writing to State administrators of the War Savings Staff of the Treasury Department or their authorized representatives. These reports should be exactly like those now being furnished to Federal Reserve banks; that is, they should show the quantity of bonds sold by denominations and the total sales value and they should cover the inclusive dates 1st to 8th, 9th to 15th, 16th to 23d, and 24th to the last day of the month. Arrangements are being made to have the State administrators furnish postmasters with postal-card forms to be used in making the reports; but, in the meantime, if reports are requested, postmasters should prepare and forward an appropriate statement giving the specific information described above. Similar information may also be furnished orally or in writing in response to oral, telephoned, telegraphed, or written requests to local committee chairman of the War Savings Staff, or to bona fide news disseminating agencies, newspapers, periodicals, and broadcasting stations or to the authorized representatives of any of these. The quarter-monthly reports of bond sales to Federal Reserve banks should be continued as heretofore.

Postmasters in Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands report their bond sales in accordance with special instructions and may disregard the foregoing. (Postal Bulletin No. 18512, November 6, 1942.)

DIVISION OF STAMPS

NEW EDITION OF DESCRIPTIVE BOOKLET ON UNITED STATES POSTAGE STAMPS

The attention of postmasters is hereby directed to the issuance of a revised edition of the official booklet containing a description and illustrations of all United States postage stamps from the date of their introduction in 1847 to July 31, 1942, including plate numbers and quantities issued of commemorative and air mail stamps.

The new stamp booklet will be issued to the public through the office of the Superintendent of Documents at a price of 30 cents per copy with paper binding which includes the cost of delivery. All mail orders for this booklet should be directed as follows:

Remittances accompanying orders for the booklet may be in the form of postal money orders or checks. Postage stamps are not acceptable.

Postmasters should bring this notice to the attention of patrons who may be interested through the local press or otherwise, without expense to the Department. (Postal Bulletin No. 18517, November 18, 1942.)

DIVISION OF CLASSIFICATION

USE OF LIGHT-WEIGHT STATIONERY FOR AIR MAIL URGED

The volume of air mail is constantly increasing, while at the same time, facilities for transporting it have been curtailed in order to move essential war material and personnel. Therefore, in order that space available for air mail may be utilized for the fullest advantage of the greatest number of persons, it is necessary that all cooperate by reducing the weight of air-mail letters and packages as much as possible. By using light-weight envelopes and stationery (procurable generally through dealers) approximately twice the number of letters to the pound can be sent as when ordinary stationery is used. The limited space available for air mail in planes will thus be conserved for maximum use.

Postmasters are requested to give this immediate publicity through newspapers and radio as a matter of important public information; also by displaying notices in post office lobbies bearing slogans such as the following:

FOR AIR MAIL
USE LIGHT-WEIGHT ENVELOPES AND STATIONERY
SAVE SPACE AND WEIGHT ON PLANES

HELP REDUCE THE AIR MAIL LOAD
USE LIGHT-WEIGHT STATIONERY

SPACE ON MAIL-CARRYING AIRPLANES IS LIMITED
REDUCE THE LOAD
USE LIGHT-WEIGHT ENVELOPES AND STATIONERY

(Postal Bulletin No. 18514, November 11, 1942.)

WAR DEPARTMENT TIME VALUE PUBLICATIONS B

The Publications Branch of The Adjutant General's Office, located at Washington, D. C., and maintaining subdepots at Atlanta, Ga.; Chicago, Ill.; Ogden, Utah; and San Antonio, Tex., distributes for the War Department by mail many orders and directives having a definite time value. This matter is mailed in envelopes, wrapped packages, and sacks bearing the penalty label of the War Department.

In order that this material which is of the highest priority and urgency be expeditiously handled, wrapped packages and envelopes having a bona fide time value will be labeled "Letter Mail" in large letters above the address and "Time Value" in slightly smaller letters below the address. Tags attached to sacks of this matter will bear similar wording and a distinctive red band across the lower part of the tag. Labels bearing the words "Printed Matter" will be used on matter not having actual time value.

Time value matter will be separated from that with no time value and will be presented separately for dispatch. Postmasters and all postal employees concerned should give this matter close attention to assure prompt handling and expeditious dispatch of this class of mail. When it is necessary to handle such time value mail in storage cars, every effort must be made to see that it is promptly transferred and expeditiously handled to destination.

At a later date, five additional subdepots will be established at strategic locations in other service command areas. These same instructions will apply to mail from these depots upon establishment. (Postal Bulletin No. 18513, November 13, 1942.)

SIX-CENT AIR-MAIL RATE FOR CERTAIN CONTRACTORS AND CIVILIANS

Some misunderstanding has arisen with respect to Order No. 18989 dated October 21, 1942, extending the air-mail rate of 6 cents a half ounce to contractors and civilian employees receiving mail through Army and Navy post offices outside the continental United States.

This rate does not apply to all contractors or civilians located in possessions or bases outside of the continental United States. It applies only to such air mail sent to or by contractors and civilian employees who receive their mail through Army or Navy post offices. Therefore, in order to be acceptable at the rate of 6 cents a half ounce air mail sent to such contractors or civilian employees should show in the address the A. P. O. number or naval unit and be directed in care of the postmaster at the post office through which service is given such as Care of Postmaster, New York, New York, Care of Postmaster, San Francisco, California, etc. Air mail sent by such contractors or civilian employees should contain the same information in the return card. This is necessary in order to identify the mail as entitled to the reduced rate. (Postal Bulletin No. 18524, December 2, 1942.)

AIR MAIL FROM MEMBERS OF OUR ARMED FORCES

Postage on air mail should, under ordinary circumstances, be fully prepaid, or at least prepaid one full rate. The rate on letters sent by air mail by members of the armed forces of the United States is 6 cents for each ounce when mailed in and addressed for delivery in the continental United States, including Alaska; and 6 cents for each half ounce when mailed by members of such forces stationed outside the continental United States, including Alaska. Such letters may not be sent by air mail free of postage.

However, due to difficulties in maintaining supplies, particularly at distant points, postage stamps are not always available for use by members of our armed forces. Therefore, in order to avoid unnecessary delay, airmail letters sent by such soldiers, sailors, and marines located in the United States or any of its possessions or other places where United States domestic mail service is in operation, addressed to places in the United States or any of its possessions, when indorsed "Soldier's Letter," "Sailor's Letter," or "Marine's Letter" and signed thereunder either with facsimile handstamp or in writing, with his official designation, by a field or staff officer, base or detachment commander, to whose command the soldier belongs, or by a surgeon or chaplain at a hospital where he may be; and in the Navy and Marine service by any commissioned officer attached to the vessel or officer commanding a hospital or detachment ashore may, under the provisions of paragraphs 1 and 2, section 515, Postal Laws and Regulations, be dispatched to destination without prepayment of postage and only the single airmail rate of postage of 6 cents for each ounce or 6 cents for each half ounce, according to origin, shall be collected on delivery.

It is, of course, desirable where postage stamps are available, that postage be fully prepaid on air mail in view of the additional work and delay caused by the collection of postage due on delivery of such matter. Postal Bulletin No. 18527, December 9, 1942.

ARMED FORCES OF ALLIES UNDER U. S. COMMAND ABROAD

Rate on Parcels Addressed to Domestic Installations

With reference to Order No. 16605 of the Postmaster General and the instructions of this office issued in connection therewith, dated December 23, 1941, providing that parcels of fourth-class matter addressed to the personnel of the armed forces of the United States stationed at places outside the continental United States where the domestic mail service is in operation shall be chargeable with postage at the fourth-class zone rate applicable between the post office where mailed and the post office at the port from which the parcels are forwarded (such parcels being addressed in care of the Postmaster, New York, N. Y., San Francisco, Calif., etc.), postmasters are informed that this rate is also chargeable on such matter so addressed to members of the armed forces of our Allies serving under the command of the United States Army or Navy at leased bases or on naval vessels or other places outside the continental United States where the domestic mail service is in operation. Postal Bulletin No. 18527, December 9, 1942.)

CLASSIFICATION OF PRINTED MATTER BOUND WITH WIRE STITCHES

With reference to the requirement that books, catalogs, and similar printed matter of the third class, in order to be acceptable at the postage rate of 1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction thereof, or at the rate of 8 cents a pound under the provisions of section 562, Postal Laws and Regulations, shall, when bound by means of metal stitches, have not less than two such stitches, postmasters are informed that in view of existing conditions necessitating the conservation of metal such matter securely bound in book form with only one wire stitch may be accepted for mailing at the same rates of postage. This modification is also applicable when a single wire stitch is used to fasten an insert to a book or catalog in order to make it an integral part thereof.

The foregoing does not contemplate any modification of the requirements with respect to the fastening of pages of books and catalogs by means of stitching with thread or string, or by pasting. (Postal Bulletin No. 18527, December 9, 1942.)

UNDELIVERABLE THIRD OR FOURTH CLASS MATTER

Forwarding address not to appear thereon when returned to sender

Undeliverable third- or fourth-class matter bearing the sender's pledge to pay return postage is being returned by some postmasters indorsed to show the forwarding address of the addressee. When third- or fourth-class matter is undeliverable on account of the addressee having removed and the matter bears the pledge of the sender to pay return postage only, the forwarding address should not be placed on the matter. In cases where such address is placed on the matter in connection with its handling at the office of original address, the forwarding address should be obliterated before the matter is returned.

The proper manner for the sender to procure the forwarding address of the addressee of undeliverable third- or fourth-class matter is for him (the sender) to place in the lower left corner of the address side a request to be advised of such address on Form 3547, as prescribed by paragraph 5, section 769, Postal Laws and Regulations. A charge of 2 cents is required for this information and service.

Postmasters will take steps to see that the forwarding address of undeliverable third- or fourth-class matter does not appear on the matter when returned to the sender under his pledge. See section 806, Postal Laws and Regulations, as to the proper endorsement of such undeliverable matter. (Postal Bulletin No. 18517, November 18, 1942.)

SHORTPAID AIR MAIL FOR ARMED FORCES OVERSEAS

A large volume of air mail prepaid at the rate of 6 cents an ounce instead of 6 cents a **half** ounce, the proper rate, is being dispatched from post offices in the continental United States addressed to the personnel of the armed forces overseas. The rating and collection of postage due on this mail places an unnecessary burden on the service and considerably delays the receipt of the mail by the addressees.

All postmasters are requested to give the widest publicity to the fact that the rate of postage on air mail sent to and by members of the armed forces outside the continental United States is 6 cents for each **half** ounce. Every effort should be made to have such mail fully prepaid before dispatch from the mailing office. Letters weighing between one **half** ounce and one ounce but prepaid only 6 cents should be returned to the senders, if they are known and it can be done within a reasonable time, for the deficient postage. However, when this cannot be done without undue delay, such letters prepaid 6 cents may be rated with the deficient postage and dispatched.

Air mail addressed to a member of the armed forces in care of the postmaster at New York, N. Y., San Francisco, Calif., New Orleans, La., Miami, Fla., or Presque Isle, Maine, should be prepaid at the rate of 6 cents for each **half** ounce. Air mail addressed to a member of the armed forces in care of the postmaster at Seattle, Wash., should be prepaid at the rate of 6 cents an ounce. (Postal Bulletin No. 18509, October 30, 1942.)

DIVISION OF MONEY ORDERS

**MONEY-ORDER COUPONS, ADVICES AND APPLICATIONS NEED NOT BE MUTILATED
BEFORE BEING DISPOSED OF AS WASTE**

In the notice appearing in the POSTAL BULLETIN of July 18, 1933, it was suggested that the postmasters at the larger post offices mutilate paid money-order coupons, advices, and applications, which are to be destroyed because of age, by cutting them into four pieces before disposing of them as waste.

It has been found that at the larger offices this work is quite expensive, in some instances costing more than the sum realized from the sale of the waste. Therefore, postmasters who have heretofore been cutting the obsolete records into four pieces are authorized to discontinue the practice at once and instead deliver them to the contractor with, however, the distinct understanding that such documents will not be allowed to become scattered about the streets before delivery to the paper mill. (Postal Bulletin No. 18510, November 2, 1942.)

**MONEY ORDERS PAYABLE IN GREAT BRITAIN AND NORTHERN IRELAND SHOULD BE
MARKED "CANCELED"**

Although a notice was printed in Postal Bulletin No. 18371 of January 20, 1942, and in the January 1942 Supplement to the United States Official Postal Guide to the effect that the amounts of money orders purchased in this country on and after February 2, 1942; for payment in Great Britain and Northern Ireland would be paid by means of new orders issued at the London exchange office and that the United States orders should be marked "Canceled" and sent with the advices and coupons to the New York exchange office, a large number of postmasters continue to hand the order forms to the remitters who forward them to the payees. This procedure might result in double payment and the issuing clerk would have to stand the loss should adjustment not be made in the foreign country.

Postal employees should mark "Canceled" money orders drawn for payment in Great Britain (England, Scotland, and Wales) and Northern Ireland, and send them with the advices and coupons to the exchange office at New York. This method does not relate to orders payable in Ireland (or Eire formerly the Irish Free State) as orders drawn for payment in that country are paid on the original order forms and should be transmitted by the remitters to the payees. (Postal Bulletin No. 18524, dated December 2, 1942.)

MONEY ORDERS PAYABLE AT BERBERA, BRITISH SOMALILAND

In the December 1940 Supplement to the United States Official Postal Guide on page 14 there was a notice reporting the suspension of the issue of money orders payable in British Somaliland through the intermediary of the Postal Administration of Great Britain.

The British postal authorities now report that money-order service with Berbera in British Somaliland is available, and money orders may be issued in this country for payment there. However, money-order business with the other portions of British Somaliland is still suspended. (Postal Bulletin No. 18524, dated December 2, 1942.)

WRONG OFFICE NUMBER ON MONEY-ORDER FORMS

It is reported that the office number appearing on the money-order forms supplied for the use of the post offices named below is incorrect, and some of the orders are supposed to have been issued and paid. Postmasters having in their files coupons of any such orders should be careful in certifying to applications for duplicates and warrants, or in answering inquiries regarding payment.

Grain Valley, Mo. Serial numbers 63001 to 63443, inclusive. Reported as issued from September 21 to October 29, 1942. Correct office number is 15249 and not 15349. (Postal Bulletin No. 18526, dated December 7, 1942.)

Premont, Tex. Serial numbers 72001 to 73945, inclusive. Reported as issued from June 23, to October 19, 1942. Correct office number is 54154 and not 64154. (Postal Bulletin No. 18522, dated November 30, 1942.)

San Antonio, Brooks Field Branch, Tex. Serial numbers 23001 to 24567, inclusive. Reported as issued from September 1 to October 24, 1942. Correct office number is 52286 and not 52268. (Postal Bulletin No. 18511, dated November 4, 1942.)

DIVISION OF REGISTERED MAIIS

DOMESTIC REGISTERED, INSURED AND C. O. D. MAIL

Reduce Instances of Loss or Damage

Complaints and claims on account of loss of, or damage to, domestic registered, insured and c. o. d. mail will be reduced to a minimum, and efficient service rendered the public, if instructions relating to the following requirements are observed:

- (1) Adequate packing of articles to withstand handling in the mails, bearing in mind the distance the articles are to be carried.

- (2) Proper indorsement of articles containing fragile or perishable matter.
- (3) Careful handling of articles in post offices and in transit.
- (4) Correct, complete and legible addressing of articles, to permit of prompt and proper delivery to the addressees or their authorized representatives.

The foregoing requirements are, of course, applicable to all parcels at all times. With the approach of the Christmas season, it is especially desirable that this notice should be brought to the attention of all postal employees concerned so that Christmas gifts, many of which will be for members of our armed forces, will be delivered in good condition, thus avoiding the disappointment which is occasioned when gift packages are not received or the contents are damaged. (Postal Bulletin No. 18518, November 20, 1942.)

CURTAILMENT OF OFFICIAL FREE REGISTRATIONS

Continued effort is being made, especially because of wartime conditions, to reduce, so far as practicable, the number of official free registered articles. The law as embodied in Section 1211 of the Postal Laws and Regulations of 1940 restricts the privilege of free registration to matter which requires registration. It is thought probable that a canvass of the situation at post offices by postmasters will indicate that at times matter is being registered which could as well be sent as ordinary mail, such as, for example, comparatively unimportant papers, reports, correspondence, etc. In case of doubt as to the necessity of registering any matter of this character or of supplies of comparatively small value, appropriate inquiry should be made of the Department.

Postmasters receiving matter registered free by other post offices which apparently could as well have been sent as ordinary mail should report the facts to the Third Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Registered Mails, for consideration.

This notice should be given special attention by all postmasters as it is desired to limit the free registrations to the greatest extent practicable. (Postal Bulletin No. 18510, November 2, 1942.)

DIVISION OF FINANCE

RENTING BOXES FOR THE RECEIPT OF OFFICIAL MAIL

It has come to attention that in a number of cases recently, positive identification has not been required of military personnel and civilian personnel under military jurisdiction renting post-office boxes for the receipt of official Army mail.

Laxness in such cases might place important official mail at the disposal of unauthorized individuals and result in serious consequences; therefore, any person making application for a post-office box to be used for the receipt of official mail addressed to units of any branch of our armed forces or to any Government agency should be required to exhibit credentials and establish his identity prior to being assigned a box. (Postal Bulletin No. 18508, October 28, 1942.)

The Following Notices Were Issued From the Bureau of the Fourth Assistant Postmaster General

DIVISION OF MOTOR VEHICLE SERVICE

WAR AND SAFETY

It is essential that postmasters, supervisors, and especially the drivers of all mail-carrying vehicles, give diligent, vigorous, and continued attention to the prevention of accidents and to the conservation of all vehicle equipment and

related supplies. Our standards for safety and conservation must be kept at the highest.

There is a shortage of trucks and equipment. Replacements and repair parts are difficult, if not impossible, to obtain. An acute shortage of manpower exists in many post offices and also in private industries. Labor consumed in repairing damage resulting from accidents through neglect or carelessness is a burden and loss which all should strive constantly to avoid.

Operators must obey state and municipal traffic laws and regulations at all times. Where deviation from local regulations relative to parking is necessary, a satisfactory solution usually can be worked out between the postmaster and the authorities. Proper parking has a particular bearing on safety. It is important that double parking be resorted to only when no other public or reserved parking space is available, and then only in such manner as will involve a minimum of risk.

Government-owned mail trucks are equipped with governors to control their speed. The governed speed instructions for the various makes and sizes of trucks are shown in a letter of this Bureau dated February 18, 1941. Governor settings must be verified frequently by supervisors and adjustments made as required. Governors must be kept sealed. Employees should be cautioned specifically that they shall not be tampered with in any way. Although the governor settings in some instances may permit operation of trucks at speeds in excess of those authorized by traffic regulations, this is not to be taken as permission to do so. It is the responsibility of drivers to observe the law at all times. The recent order of the Office of Defense Transportation fixing a maximum speed of 35 miles an hour for operation of motor vehicles means that trucks may not be operated in excess of that speed. Where local traffic laws require a lesser speed, it must be adhered to strictly.

It is most important that the instructions and admonitions in the foregoing be observed carefully. The cooperation of every officer and member of the Postal Establishment is earnestly solicited in seeing to it that all mail-carrying vehicles are operated with safety to the public and the idea of conservation in mind. In this way you will be doing your part in furthering not only improved postal service but the war effort. (Postal Bulletin No. 18515, November 13, 1942.)

NATION-WIDE RATIONING: GASOLINE, TIRES, AND TUBES

The attention of postmasters, supervisors, and others is invited to General Order ODT 21, issued by the Office of Defense Transportation, relating to the conservation of motor equipment and the issuance of Certificates of War Necessity for and control of commercial motor vehicles, and also Ration Order No. 1A, "Mileage Rationing: Tire Regulations" and Ration Order No. 5C "Mileage Rationing: Gasoline Regulations," issued by the Office of Price Administration. The effective date of the foregoing has been changed to December 1, 1942.

Under General Order ODT 21, two forms have been devised for the use of commercial vehicles—SU-A and FU-A. The term "fleet operator" as defined in the order means any person owning or operating more than two self-powered commercial motor vehicles. Therefore, offices operating more than two Government-owned motor vehicles should use Form FU-A, and offices operating less than three commercial vehicles should use Form SU-A.

All offices operating Government-owned trucks, regardless of the number, should make application on OPA Form R-536, "Application for Transport Mileage Ration" and submit it, together with the Certificate of War Necessity to the Local Rationing Board for the amount of gasoline required to operate the vehicles during the respective quarters. Since these regulations and order are effective December 1, 1942, the allowance of gasoline for the March quarter, 1943, should include sufficient gallonage to cover the period from December 1, 1942, to March 31, 1943.

At offices having underground storage-tank facilities for gasoline, requests should be made of the local rationing board to mark ration books "T-1" and "T-2" to permit the delivery of gasoline in bulk instead of directly into the fuel tanks of motor vehicles. At the larger offices where the handling of a large number of rationing books would be unwieldy to cover your needs special bulk coupons of 1- and 100-gallon denominations will be issued by the board upon application therefor. "T-1" ration books contain a maximum of 96 coupons and book

"T-2" contains a maximum of 384 coupons, both having a value of 5 gallons per coupon subject to change at any time.

At offices not having underground storage facilities and where purchases of gasoline are made from filling stations under local quarterly contracts, application should be made for ration books of the "T-1" or "T-2" series, as may be required to cover your needs for the respective quarters.

At offices having official passenger vehicles assigned for supervision purposes application should be made to the local rationing board on OPA Form R-551, "Application for Mileage Ration for Official and Fleet Passenger Automobiles or Motorcycles." A Certificate of War Necessity is not required for the operation of passenger vehicles, provided no structural changes have been made in the vehicle which would have the effect of converting it to commercial purposes. In addition to Form R-551, Part B, "Tire Inspection Record," of Form R-534 should be executed for each official passenger vehicle and submitted to the local board with OPA Form R-551. The board will return the Tire Inspection Record, Part B of Form R-534, to postmasters operating official passenger vehicles. The "Certification of All Excess Passenger Type Tires of Fleet Owner" appearing on the back of Form R-551 need not be executed as indicated thereon.

Offices operating Government-owned equipment are not required under the regulations to turn in excess tires and tubes on hand.

Postmasters having official supervision cars should not make application for nor will the local board issue a Basic "A" Ration for this type of vehicle. A ration "B" or "C" will be issued for such vehicles, depending upon the quarterly mileage required. At offices having underground storage facilities your application to the local board should request that the "B" and/or "C" ration books be indorsed to permit the delivery of gasoline in bulk instead of directly into the fuel tanks of motor vehicles.

Borrowed Equipment Incident to the Handling of Christmas Mails

Army and Navy vehicles are not required under General Order ODT21, to have a Certificate of War Necessity to enable them to acquire gasoline for their needs. Therefore, postmasters who obtain Army and Navy vehicles for use in the collection, delivery, and transportation of the mails during the Christmas period or other emergency requiring the use of such vehicles, should apply to their local rationing board for such additional gasoline as may be required for the operation of Army and Navy vehicles when used in the Postal Service. This procedure is approved by the Offices of Price Administration and also Defense Transportation. When vehicles are obtained for the same purposes from other agencies of the Government, the loaning agency is required to furnish the postmaster with the required number of coupons to cover the operation of such vehicles in the Postal Service. This procedure is also approved by the Offices of Price Administration and Defense Transportation. In the event other agencies did not include the estimated mileage and the amount of gasoline which would be required for the operation of their vehicles when loaned to the Postal Service, the respective agency should make application to the local office of the Office of Defense Transportation to have their gallonage increased to meet the needs of their vehicles when used in the Postal Service.

Inspection Fees

General Order ODT 21 and Ration Orders Nos. 1A and 5C require that periodic inspections must be made of tires and equipment for which services inspectors are permitted to charge a fee as indicated therein. The attention of all postmasters is invited to the fact that there is no appropriation available in this Department from which such fees can be paid and postmasters are cautioned against making such payments because an authorization for the expenditure will not be approved.

For your information and guidance, the following is an excerpt from a release issued by the Office of War Information—Office of Price Administration, dated November 4, 1942, OPA-1074; X-5641; Edwards-74097: "Service or maintenance employees of truck and bus fleet owners who qualify as competent tire men may be appointed as official inspectors, OPA said. As such, they may inspect the tires on the vehicles in their employers' fleets and fill out the necessary inspection forms. This would not only be a convenience to the fleet operator, it was pointed out, but would reduce the burden on the inspection stations provided for the ordinary motorist."

In view of the foregoing, postmasters should make application on their local boards to have a competent employee or supervisor appointed as an inspector, in accordance with the Order of the Office of Price Administration and also to eliminate any controversy which might arise between postmasters and the local rationing boards in respect to the payment of inspection fees.

Rural Carriers, Star-Route and Screen-Wagon Contractors, Mail Messengers, and Special Delivery Messengers

Rural carriers, star-route contractors, screen-wagon contractors, mail-messengers, and special-delivery messengers who use a truck or commercial vehicle (not a passenger carrying vehicle) on their respective routes are required to apply for and obtain a Certificate of War Necessity, and submit it, together with OPA Form R-536, "Application for Transport Mileage Ration" to the local rationing board, in order to obtain gasoline required for the operation of their vehicles in connection with their official duties when engaged in the collection, delivery, and transportation of the mails. A Certificate of War Necessity is not required when a passenger carrying vehicle is used and in such cases application should be made to the local board for a basic mileage ration on OPA Form R-534 and also for a supplemental ration on OPA Form R-535.

When making application for a supplemental ration, consideration should be given to the following instructions contained in Ration Order No. 5C: "An applicant shall establish the average monthly occupational mileage driven within the continental United States and required for each of the following purposes, for the three-month period beginning with the date on which such ration is required:

1. Driving between home and a fixed place of work in connection with the principal occupation of the applicant or principal user of the vehicle.
2. Driving in the course of such principal occupation.
3. Driving to and from or in the course of any other occupation or occupations for which the vehicle is used.

Preferred Mileage

The mileage driven in a passenger automobile or motorcycle by the owner or a person entitled to the use thereof, necessary for carrying out one or more of the following purposes, shall be deemed preferred mileage.

* * * (d) For the transportation of mail on behalf of the United States Government.

Rented Equipment

Hourly rates and/or on annual basis.

When a truck is furnished on an hourly basis or an annual rate for use in the collection, delivery, and transportation of the mails, the owner thereof must apply for and obtain a Certificate of War Necessity and submit it, together with OPA Form R-536 "Application for Transport Mileage Ration," to the local board, in order to obtain gasoline. When a passenger car is furnished, application should be made to the local rationing board on OPA Form R-534 for a basic mileage ration and also on OPA Form R-535 for a supplemental ration, at which time consideration should be given to occupational and preferred mileage as defined above.

Rural carriers, star-route and screen-wagon contractors, mail messengers, special-delivery messengers and also persons or employees who rent or lease equipment for use in the city delivery service are not exempt because of the nature of their employment from any of the regulations prescribed in the General Order and Rationing Regulations, which apply to the type of vehicle(s) which they operate, rent or lease in the performance of their contract or agreement with the Government or are required to furnish in the performance of their official duties.

Limitation Area

On and after December 1, 1942, the present "S" coupons will be invalid for the procurement of gasoline and superseded by "T" ration books or bulk coupons. The present "B" and "C" ration books will be valid for the procurement of gasoline for the period indicated thereon. In the event these instructions are revised or amended by the Office of Price Administration, all concerned will be notified promptly.

Stickers will be furnished postmasters by local rationing boards, indicating the type of rationing they received and these stickers should be displayed on the windshields in the manner and place as required under the laws of the State in which the trucks are operating.

General Order ODT 21 was issued for the purpose of conserving rubber and automotive equipment, and also to assure the continuous operation of all vehicles essential to the war effort. Ration Orders Nos. 1A and 5C cover the same objectives and all are interrelated. It is, therefore, incumbent upon all of us to reduce wherever possible the mileage and hours of service of all automotive equipment required for the collection, delivery, and transportation of the mails.

Postmasters, supervisors, employees, and contractors should give this important matter careful and personal attention, with a view to conservation of automotive equipment. (Postal Bulletin No. 18518, November 20, 1942.)

GOVERNMENT-OWNED MOTOR VEHICLE SERVICE

Certificate of War Necessity

Pursuant to General Order ODT 21, issued September 8, 1942, by the Director of Defense Transportation, all operators of commercial vehicles, including those owned and operated by the Postal Service and also those obtained under lease or contract and used in the City Delivery and Transportation Services, are required to apply for and obtain a certificate of war necessity to assure continued operation after the effective date of the order, November 15, 1942.

The term "commercial vehicle" means (1) a straight truck, (2) a combination truck-tractor and semitrailer, (3) a full trailer, (4) any combination thereof, or (5) any rubber-tired vehicle, excluding a motorcycle, propelled or drawn by mechanical power and built (or rebuilt) primarily for the purpose of transporting property, and (6) bus, taxicab, jitney, or other rubber-tired vehicle, propelled or drawn by mechanical power, used in the transportation of persons upon the highways, or available for public rental, including ambulances and hearses, *but not including a private passenger carrying vehicle.*

The Office of Defense Transportation, Detroit, Mich., will mail a pamphlet of "Instructions for preparing application for certificate of war necessity" and Form FU-A to offices having three or more Government-owned trucks and Form SU-A to offices having less than three trucks. Upon receipt of the pamphlet and Form, postmasters should read carefully the instructions to assure submitting the necessary and required information as called for on the Form.

Because of the information you furnish to the Office of Defense Transportation will, in a way, govern the quarterly gallonage of gasoline allowed for the operation of the trucks at your office, careful consideration should be given to the estimated mileage and great care should be exercised to see to it that all factors which might considerably increase the miles and hours of truck service, during the present and subsequent quarters, are carefully analyzed and receive your personal attention.

Tires and tubes in excess of your immediate requirements and held in storage for the Department should not be included on the Form submitted to the Office of Defense Transportation. A separate report, showing the number and size of tires and tubes in excess of requirements and held in storage, should be submitted to this bureau, Division of Motor Vehicle Service, so that the tires and tubes may be forwarded to other offices having need therefor.

CAUTION.—Failure to give this matter immediate and personal attention might seriously affect the mail service at your office. Return the forms to the Office of Defense Transportation at the earliest possible date, but not later than November 1, 1942. (Postal Bulletin No. 18507, October 26, 1942.)

MAINTENANCE BRANCH AND DIVISION OF POST OFFICE QUARTERS

CONSERVATION OF FUEL

It is essential to guarantee the continued availability of adequate supplies of fuel for military and naval use and for vital industrial and agricultural operations.

The supply of coal is affected by the transportation situation, man power problem, production and other phases of the general over-all coal picture. If the present balance were upset, it would very easily result in a shortage of coal.

Gas requirements for war production and civilian uses has increased and, because of a scarcity of materials for the construction of pipe lines and other facilities, shortages of natural gas are threatened.

The shortage of fuel oil in the Eastern States is well known in that it has become one of the most critical problems confronting the Nation.

Every possible effort is to be made to hold the consumption of fuel to a minimum. This is a matter of vital importance and an earnest request is made for the fullest cooperation of all concerned. (Postal Bulletin No. 18518, November 20, 1942.)

FUEL OIL FOR HEATING POST OFFICE QUARTERS

The Office of Price Administration has issued a fuel oil ration order covering the following Eastern and Midwestern States: Connecticut, Delaware, Florida (east of the Apalachicola River), Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, South Dakota, Vermont, Virginia, West Virginia, Wisconsin, and the District of Columbia.

Postmasters in these States who purchase fuel oil, under Departmental authorization, for heating leased or rented quarters should make prompt application for a ration to their local War Price and Rationing Board, using Form OPA R-1101, and furnishing all required information. If fuel oil is supplied by the owner of the premises as a part of the rental consideration, the application should be made by the owner. (Postal Bulletin No. 18507, October 26, 1942.)

SPECIAL ATTENTION POSTMASTERS—DEFENSE COORDINATORS

The following letter, dated October 28, 1942, from the Office of Civilian Defense, is quoted for your information and guidance:

OPERATIONS LETTER NO. 80.

SUBJECT: New Types of Enemy Bombs, Incendiary and Antipersonnel.

1. The enemy recently has employed new types of bombs—both large incendiaries and the usual small type with a more powerful explosive charge set off by a time fuse. Experience with these bombs in other countries and our own study of the techniques developed to cope with them make it clear (a) that fire continues to be a most important weapon and (b) that, against fire, water is still the best weapon. When heavier, delayed-action explosive charges are added, they are primarily intended to hold off attack on the fire until it has gained dangerous headway.

2. New types of enemy incendiary and antipersonnel bombs are:

(a) The usual 2.2-pound fire bomb, with an extension of the nose containing a larger explosive charge. The total weight is increased to 5 pounds. The bomb is 17 inches long without its tail, or about 21 inches long over all. The incendiary section of the bomb ignites upon landing, but the explosive charge may go off at any time up to 7 minutes later. It would be possible to increase this lapse of time without major alteration of design, so that there can be little dependence upon the present time interval. The explosive part may become detached, but this does not lessen its effectiveness. This type of bomb has been employed by the Germans.

(b) A combination incendiary and high explosive bomb, in a casing the same size and shape as the 110-pound high explosive bomb (about 30 inches long and 8 inches in diameter). On impact it throws out 60 small metal containers with thermit-type filling and 6 larger tumbler-shaped fire pots containing a magnesium-type filling which is preignited. Almost immediately after ejecting the incendiary units, a 12-pound charge of TNT in the nose of the bomb explodes.

(c) A phosphorus-oil bomb in a casing similar to that of the 110-pound high explosive bomb, but containing only the usual type of fuse to split the casing open on impact and scatter its sticky liquid contents. The contents ignite spontaneously because of the phosphorus. The phosphorus may be extinguished by water but will break into fire again if allowed to become dry.

(d) A Japanese bomb weighing about 110 pounds and containing, besides a quantity of thermit, a considerable number of rectangular-shaped rubber-impregnated incendiary pellets which scatter widely and start a substantial number of small fires which may be attacked immediately.

3. The most effective method of attacking fires caused by these bombs is the same as was outlined in revised instructions last July concerning the ordinary magnesium-thermit type of fire-bomb—a jet or direct stream of water. The small fire bomb without explosive charge is still the most widely used of all types except by the Japanese. If bombs fall where they cannot start fire and cannot be seen from the air, they should be left to burn themselves out, but elsewhere they must be attacked. The bombs without heavy explosive charges or those which explode upon impact present only the problem of dealing with fire and thus require no additional instructions.

4. The small fire bomb with delayed-action explosive charge requires a revision of instructions concerning the types of cover that provide full protection from the blast.

(a) A brick wall four and one-half inches thick is considered full protection against the explosive charge now being used with a time fuse in small magnesium bombs. In walls built of outside bricks of the best quality, a 3-inch thickness will prevent penetration. Lath and plaster walls, wooden doors, tables, or chairs do not offer full protection from the explosion of this charge. Personal risk may be greatly reduced by assuming a crouching or prone position behind the best available cover.

(b) Where fires are likely to spread rapidly—as in congested districts and where there is relatively little fireproof construction—even bombs which may explode should be attacked promptly from behind the best available cover. Care should be exercised to expose no more than one hand while playing a stream of water on the area surrounding unexploded bombs, but this risk is considered necessary where unchecked fires might start a conflagration. Water may be thrown from a small (or 1 pint) container, dipping from a larger container, if a pump has not arrived. Although less efficient than a jet of water, this method may permit the wetting of inflammable material within range of the bomb. Water should be thrown from a crouching position from the cover of a solid wall, as in other methods. In this case the water need not be thrown on the bomb itself.

(c) Use of a jet of water enables the operator to work at a much greater distance than the "short-range" methods employing sand, other smothering agents, or a spray of water. Sand in the form of bags or mats cannot be depended upon, because these bombs, upon explosion, have a greater fragmentation effect than the explosive incendiary bombs formerly used. The public should be warned against the use of all such smothering agents as "bomb extinguishing" powders; also against such devices as scoops, grabs, and snuffers. They are entirely without merit and may endanger the lives of persons who depend upon them. The use of spray and sand is no longer recommended because the possibility of fragmentation makes it too dangerous to approach the bomb sufficiently close to apply them.

(d) The new types of bombs increase the importance of storing water in the home, as heavier explosive charges and larger bombs make it even more hazardous to depend upon normal water service. (Containers previously used for sand should now, if possible, be used for water.) It should also be pointed out that water storage tanks used in connection with water heaters, hot water or steam furnaces or other home equipment may be useful, if they can be drained quickly. The location of the drain valve should be marked so that it can be found promptly in the dark.

5. A thorough search of the premises should be made after every raid. Any unexploded bombs should be reported promptly to the bomb reconnaissance agent for inspection. Where phosphorus-oil bombs have been used, all areas touched by the oil should be kept wet until proper authorities have examined them to see whether phosphorus is present. Physical contact with fragments of such a bomb or any ground or equipment splashed with the liquid should be avoided.

6. These developments in enemy air attack mean that the forces of workers trained to deal with all types of bombs must be increased as rapidly as possible. Plans for recruitment and training of such an expanded force may be expected at an early date. Methods of attack may be changed frequently. Such changes may be even more rapid as our enemies desperately seek to incite fear in civilian ranks, but they should serve only to intensify our efforts to develop a large, alert, and well-trained force that is ready for any challenge.

DISPLAY OF PROCLAMATIONS ISSUED BY COMMANDING GENERALS OF EASTERN, WESTERN, AND SOUTHERN DEFENSE COMMANDS

Upon receipt by postmasters of copies of any public proclamations that may be issued from time to time by the commanding generals of the eastern, western, or southern defense commands, United States Army, these proclamations shall be displayed in a prominent location in the public lobby for an indefinite period in such manner as not to mar or deface the walls or woodwork. (Postal Bulletin No. 18511, November 4, 1942.)

POSTER ISSUED BY THE OFFICE OF WAR INFORMATION

Display in Post Office Lobbies Authorized

The Office of War Information will furnish postmasters in the near future with a poster entitled "Remember Dec. 7th!" Postmasters are authorized to display this poster in available space in post-office lobbies for a period of 1 month from date of receipt in such manner as not to mar or deface the walls or woodwork. (Postal Bulletin No. 18511, November 4, 1942.)

TYPEWRITERS AND ADDING MACHINES

B

Postmasters and other postal officials are directed to instruct all employees using typewriters and adding machines to see to it that the machines are cleaned daily and are covered at all times when not in use. Such action is necessary to obtain the maximum efficiency and service from the machines, and will result also in reducing expenditures for repairs to the minimum. Detailed instructions regarding the care of typewriters and adding machines, and repairs to such equipment, when needed, appear on page 54 of the List of Postal Supplies, Form A-7. (Postal Bulletin No. 18511, November 4, 1942.)

REGULATIONS COVERING THE BLACKING-OUT AND DIMMING-OUT OF POST OFFICES

By Presidential order and appropriation authorized by Congress the Public Buildings Administration, Federal Works Agency, is responsible for providing for the emergency safeguarding from subversive hostile acts and overt acts of aggression or depredation of Federal buildings and leased quarters, except those under the control of the War and Navy Departments.

The Postmaster General, in Order No. 17854 published in the Postal Bulletin of June 26, 1942, has designated postmasters to serve as defense coordinators. The Public Buildings Administration (Protective Construction Unit) will address communications as "Postmaster—Defense Coordinator." Postmasters will be expected to give immediate and personal attention to all correspondence received from the Unit mentioned and make immediate replies thereto. Copies of all correspondence with this Unit should be forwarded to the Bureau of the Fourth Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Building Operation and Supplies, Maintenance Branch.

In cooperation, the Post Office Department has agreed not to ask the Protective Construction Unit to furnish black-out facilities to offices where gross postal receipts are less than \$250,000 annually. Where receipts equal or are in excess of this amount, the Protective Construction Unit will initiate correspondence concerning those portions of buildings to be blacked out on the basis of the state of hazard of the community.

All postmasters will be expected to cooperate fully with local civilian defense organizations and local military authorities in the blacking out and dimming out of their quarters. The following suggestions are made to facilitate the dimming-out of quarters where Commanding Generals of the Eastern, Southern and Western Defense Areas have issued orders requiring the dimming of exterior and interior lighting:

Extinguish all exterior lights.

Lower all shades, venetian blinds or other types of shades.

Where venetian blinds are in use, adjust the slats so that interior lighting is deflected downward when viewed from the outside.

Use any available material to provide temporary blackout of windows. Where case lights are provided, use these and reduce general overhead lighting to absolute essential requirements.

Where possible make temporary rearrangements of cases and furniture so that no light will be reflected through windows.

Cardboard or heavy paper shields may be used on tops of cases and on the back of open distribution cases to prevent the case lighting from reaching outside windows.

Where overhead lights are essential, shield these in such a manner so as to deflect the light downward.

Where lights are burned over vaults, shield these so that direct lighting cannot be observed from the street.

Where vaults are equipped with tear gas relocking devices, vault lights should be extinguished.

Consult with your supervisors and devise such other means as may be appropriate in order that interior lighting may be made as obscure as possible when viewed from the outside.

Blacking-out

Postmasters will be expected to comply fully with the regulations and instructions issued by local civilian defense and military authorities in the obscuration of all lighting during air-raid alarms.

At offices where receipts are in excess of \$250,000 and where the Protective Construction Unit has not furnished facilities for obscuring lighting, all lights must be extinguished for the duration of the alarm unless arrangements can be made with the local civilian defense authorities to extinguish all lights for a period of approximately ten minutes from the initiation of the alarm and then turning the lights on in order to permit of the handling of the mails. During a real alarm all lights must be extinguished for the duration of the alarm. After facilities are furnished to obscure lighting, offices will be expected to operate fully during alarms.

Where the receipts are less than \$250,000 no facilities will be furnished for obscuring lighting and at these offices all lights must be extinguished for the duration of the alarm unless arrangements can be made with the local civilian defense authorities for a temporary period of blacking-out through turning out all lights and then a resumption of operations. If the local civilian defense authorities will not agree to a temporary period of blacking-out, then all lights must remain out during the entire period of the alarm.

Under no circumstances should the main switch be pulled. Turn off lights at the socket or pull panel switches.

At all post offices which are locked when the last employee leaves or at a later hour, all lights should be extinguished when the building is locked as it is not considered necessary to burn lights for protective purposes. At those offices where it is necessary to keep the lobby open, action should be taken to restrict lobby lighting to actual needs and to prevent lights from shining brightly through windows and doors. It is suggested that the cooperation of the local police be solicited in keeping the building under surveillance.

Each postmaster is requested and urged to *personally* study these instructions and see that they are followed in detail.

This is an important matter and failure to cooperate with the local defense council in the matter of dim-outs and black-outs subjects the Department to adverse criticism and reflects discredit upon the Postal Service of which you, as postmaster, are the local representative.

The Department cannot too strongly impress upon postmasters the importance of this matter. (Postal Bulletin No. 18512, November 6, 1942.)

YEAR TYPE FOR POSTMARKING AND DATING EQUIPMENT

Postmasters at post offices where Government-owned electric canceling machines are in use are advised that they should not submit requisitions for "1943" year type for these machines. The correct "1943" year type, or dies, for all electric machines will be mailed about December 10, without requisition.

Year type for "1943" for Model HD hand-power canceling machines with a serial number less than 1900, and for all Model HD machines at post offices of

the first and second classes will be mailed in the same manner as year type for electric machines. Year type for "1943" for Model HD machines with a serial number above 1900 was furnished with each machine. Postmasters having these machines should check the set of type to be sure the "1943" year type has not been lost. If not on hand, a requisition should be submitted on Form 4635. Year type for Model K hand power canceling machines will be mailed in the same manner as year type for electric machines.

Year type for hand stamps, postmarking and canceling stamps and rubber dating stamps must be specially requested by postmasters at offices of the first and second classes on Forms 1567 or 1580 from 30 to 60 days in advance of the forthcoming year. Postmasters at offices of the third and fourth classes should request this type from their designated supply office. Requests for type should be held to a minimum. In ordering "Steel year type" an impression of the stamp for which the type is desired must be submitted with the requisition. (Postal Bulletin No. 18507, October 26, 1942.)

UNAUTHORIZED USE OF GOVERNMENT-OWNED MAIL TRUCKS

It has come to the attention of this Bureau that Government-owned mail trucks have been employed recently for rural delivery service, although the Motor Vehicle Service Rules and Regulations prohibit the use of such trucks for any other purposes than outlined in section 1 thereof. Reports are also received from time to time of the utilization of Government-owned trucks for performance of Mail Messenger Service and for service on star routes, due to failure on the part of the contractor to maintain service.

Postmasters at offices to which Government-owned mail trucks have been assigned for city delivery service and/or for the transportation of the mails, are cautioned to see to it that the use of such trucks be confined to those services. (Postal Bulletin No. 18508, October 28, 1942.)

V-MAIL POSTER

Display on Trucks and in Public Lobbies Authorized

The War Department is preparing to distribute to all offices a poster advertising V-Mail. It will be furnished for display on Government-owned mail trucks and in post-office lobbies. Two posters for each truck will be furnished and they should be displayed for a period of 2 weeks from date of receipt. The lobby posters should be displayed indefinitely in a prominent location in all post offices, branches, and stations in such manner as not to deface the walls or woodwork.

Additional posters may be obtained from the Publications Branch, Adjutant General's Office, War Department, Washington, D. C. (Postal Bulletin No. 18508, October 28, 1942.)
