## (2) CENTRAL ACCOUNTING OFFICES.

AUGUST 5, 1922.

### ORDER No. 7883.

New Haven is designated as central accounting post office for the State of Connecticut, effective October 1, 1922, in place of Bridgeport, and Order No. 3904 of February 16, 1920, is amended accordingly.

AUGUST 5, 1922.

### ORDER No. 7952.

The post office at San Juan, P. R., is hereby designated central accounting office for the Virgin Islands, effective October 1, 1922.

AUGUST 5, 1922.

### ORDER No. 7968.

The post office at El Paso, Tex., is hereby discontinued as central accounting office. The post office at Austin, Tex., is designated as central accounting office for the following counties, in addition to those already assigned there: Brewster, Crane, Crockett, Edwards, Irion, Jeff Davis, Kinney, Maverick, Pecos, Presidio, Reagan, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton, Terrell, Tom Green, Upton, and Valverde.

The post office at Dallas, Tex., is designated as central accounting office for the third and fourth class offices in the following counties in addition to those already assigned there:

Andrews, Culberson, Ector, El Paso, Gaines, Glascock, Howard, Hudspeth, Loving, Martin, Midland, Reeves, Ward, and Winkler.

This change is to be effective October 1, 1922. Order No. 3904 of February 16, 1920, is amended accordingly.



## (3) ATTENTION OF BIG MAILERS.

At conference conventions of postal people, one of which will be held in each State, arrangements will be made to have the large users of the mails meet the Postmaster General and to discuss with him their mailing problems.

## (4) LITTLE EMBARRASSMENT TO THE MAILS.

The embarrassment to the mails incident to the recent strikes of certain railway employees and coal miners has passed into history. Our service has been delayed, but at no point has congestion occurred that was not relieved in a few hours.

## (5) CONDENSED REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL FINDINGS OF 985 EXAMINATIONS OF POST-OFFICE EMPLOYEES BY THE UNITED STATES PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICE.

This report gives in brief and without detail the number as well as the larger groups of physical defects found among post-office employees. All physical defects and physical impairments found in post-office employees were observed and recorded, and the examination was in no way an examination in which certain defects were looked for. Therefore this report must always be considered as only partial, but covering the major groups and the more common defects.

The following is a list of the defects and the number of each defect as found. It will be observed that there are many conditions here listed which are capable of subdivision, but for the sake of brevity they are combined. It is understood that the number of defects does not represent the actual number of cases, as, for instance, several defects may have been found in the same individual.

## (6) POSTAL EMPLOYEES OFFERED OPPORTUNITY FOR FREE MEDICAL EXAMINATIONS.

Initiating the plan for providing free physical examinations for postal employees, the Post Office Department has completed arrangements offering opportunity for such examinations in cities cited below and in near-by towns.

The plans have been made in cooperation with the United States Public Health Service, which will conduct the examinations in established stations. The examinations will be made by medical experts of the Public Health Service, each part of the physical examination being undertaken by an expert in a particular medical specialty. An oculist will test the eyes, a dentist examine the teeth, etc.

Preliminary examinations were conducted at Chicago and New York, much to the satisfaction and benefit of the employees of those offices. A thousand men took advantage of the opportunity for examinations, a summary of which is printed above.

The Public Health Service is not authorized by law to treat any cases; they can only make a thorough physical examination. An employee can then go to his own doctor, dentist, or oculist with the examination record and have the trouble corrected. The examinations are confidential with the employees.

The Public Health Service points out the advisability of individuals having physical examinations once a year.

**(7) SUPPLIES FOR SAMOA AND GUAM.**

SEPTEMBER 20, 1922.

ORDER No. 8078.

Effective November 1, 1922, all supplies of blanks, books, etc., for post offices of the third and fourth classes on the islands of Samoa and Guam will be distributed through the post office at San Francisco, Calif.  
The Fourth Assistant Postmaster General will issue detailed instructions in the premises.

**(8) AMENDMENTS TO THE POSTAL LAWS AND REGULATIONS.**

The amendments are printed on one side of pages at the back of the supplements and should be clipped therefrom regularly each month, as they are intended for pasting directly opposite the sections amended, or for posting in a blank book, the margin of each section amended being marked with the number of the insert affecting that particular section. The following notices were issued from the Bureau of the First Assistant Postmaster General—**JOHN H. BARTLETT**, First Assistant:

**(10) CORRECTING BAD CONDITIONS.**

The attention of postmasters is called to the desirability of their giving personal attention to the matters which are worthy of accomplishment along the line of welfare work.

In response to questionnaires sent to postmasters various items of improvement, some small and some large, have been suggested. These refer to lights, room, cleanliness, and other matters which have to do with the personal comfort and welfare of those in the service. We desire postmasters to make it their special duty to follow up the accomplishment of these suggestions. Some of the smaller matters may be accomplished by the postmaster himself through his organization and ordinary things can be righted by the employees themselves. There may be some that can not be accomplished for the present and others entailing some delay, but we desire each postmaster to keep a list of these things and to make it his business to secure action upon them. It is desired that the postmasters report to us such matters as have been corrected and the progress of correction in other matters, and to remind us of things which seem to be delayed.

It is the purpose of the department to do everything possible of a practical nature along these lines.

**(11) CORRECTIONS FOR ANNUAL GUIDE.**

The reference in paragraph 18, page 63, 1922 annual Postal Guide, should be to paragraph 24, page 56 (instead of to paragraph 25, page 52).

The reference in paragraph 52 on page 67 (which is now blank) should be to paragraph 143, page 27.

Postmasters will please have these corrections made in all copies of the annual Guide now in use in their offices.

**(12) DISPOSITION OF RECORDS AND GOVERNMENT PROPERTY ON THE DISCONTINUANCE OF DISTRICT POST OFFICES.**

Where a third or fourth class post office is to be discontinued the postmaster will be instructed to dispose of the records and Government property as follows:

*Money-order records.*—The register of money orders issued, register of money orders paid, coupons of money orders paid, applications for money orders issued, and money order advices, if any, should be delivered to the postmaster at the office where mail is directed to be sent after the discontinuance becomes effective.

*Money-order forms and M. O. B. stamp.*—All money-order forms and M. O. B. stamp and blank drafts on the Treasurer of the United States should be forwarded by registered mail to the Third Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Money Orders, Washington, D. C.

*Savings certificates.*—If any savings certificates have been registered at the office, whether with or without authority, the registration cards, Form WS 110, should be sent by official registered mail to the Third Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Stamps, Washington, D. C. Before doing so the postmaster should examine the cards carefully to be assured that every card representing a paid certificate bears a notation showing the payment in accordance with the regulations.



A letter should accompany the cards showing the full number of cards inclosed and the number representing paid certificates and fully explaining any irregularities. SEND REGISTRATION CARDS, WS 110, ONLY.

All the other Government property and post-office records, including the cash book and postmaster's account book, should be forwarded to the central accounting postmaster.

#### (13) DISCONTINUANCE FORM 3992, "EMPLOYEE'S PERSONAL RECORD."

At all first and second class post offices where employees' records are maintained on regular stock roster cards Forms 3953 and 3967, and efficiency credits and demerits kept in individual jackets on forms prepared for that purpose, the use of Forms 3992 and 3992A, "Employee's personal record," should be discontinued.

#### (14) NAMES NOT TO BE FURNISHED IN POSTMASTER'S PRIVATE CAPACITY.

The department's attention has been called to the fact that certain companies have sent to postmasters a circular letter which includes the following:

*Postmaster (personal):*

In addressing this letter to you "personal," we are making it legally possible for you to comply with our request, if you find it convenient to do so, and have the time, etc.

The above statement is based upon a misunderstanding of the postal regulations and should not mislead postmasters into compliance with the request for names. Postmasters and postal employees are not authorized to furnish complete or partial lists of names in either their personal or official capacity.

#### (15) STATIONERY.

Considerable inconvenience and loss of time is caused the department through the use by postmasters of stationery other than that furnished by the department which is of large or unusual sizes. As such letterheads will not fit in the cases, it is frequently necessary to cut them down before they can be filed.

The suggestion is therefore made to postmasters who furnish their own stationery that they do not use sheets larger than 8 by 10½ inches. Your cooperation in this matter will be greatly appreciated.

#### (16) MAIL FOR SOUTH ST. JOSEPH, MO.

A considerable quantity of mail for South St. Joseph, Mo., is being erroneously sent to St. Joseph, Mo., resulting in serious delays to important business mail and severe criticisms of the service.

Such errors, due wholly to carelessness, are inexcusable. Clerks in post offices and railway postal clerks should be especially watchful to see that mail for South St. Joseph is properly distributed and dispatched.

*South St. Joseph is not a station of St. Joseph, but an independent office.*

The following notices were issued from the Bureau of the Second Assistant Postmaster General—PAUL HENDERSON, Second Assistant:

#### (17) CONSULAR INVOICES AND SWORN COMMERCIAL INVOICES FOR PACKAGES SENT IN THE MAILS TO CUBA.

Senders of packages for Cuba mailed at localities where Cuban consular representatives are located should be informed that the Cuban consular regulations require, for shipments of whatever value, the presentation to such Cuban consular representatives, for consular certification, of one original invoice and four copies when shipments are addressed for delivery at Havana or one original invoice and three copies when shipments are addressed for delivery in other parts of the island, only one set (four or five copies, as the case may be) of invoices being necessary for one shipment sent at one time to one addressee, no matter of how many packages the shipment consists.

The wrappers of packages for which consular invoices have been secured should be marked with the series letter and number of such consular invoice, for example, "Consular Invoice B 1020."

The consulate office retains all copies of the invoice except the original, which, after being viséed, is returned to the sender who should either inclose such original invoice in the package or send the same under separate cover to the addressee. When the consular invoice is inclosed in the package, the wrapper should be so indorsed, in which case no customs declaration is necessary. When the shipment consists of more than one package and the consular invoice accompanies same, no customs declaration is necessary on any of the packages, but each package should be numbered consecutively and indorsed as to the particular package containing the consular invoice.

The shipper need pay for certification of only the original copy of the invoices, as follows:

Invoices for less than \$5 .....	\$0.10
Invoices from \$5 to \$49.99 .....	.50
Invoices from \$50 to \$200 .....	2.00
For every additional \$100 or fraction thereof .....	.25

No consular invoices are required for shipments from localities without Cuban consular representation, but commercial invoices (single copy only) covering such shipments are necessary, which commercial invoices should be sent to the addressee and must contain a statement, sworn to by the sender before a notary public, declaring that the merchandise is of American manufacture.

Each package of a shipment for Cuba which is not accompanied with a consular invoice must have a customs declaration attached.



**(18) REGULAR (LETTER) AND PARCEL-POST MAILS FOR NETHERLANDS (DUTCH) EAST INDIES, STRAITS SETTLEMENTS, MALAY STATES, SARAWAK, NORTH BORNEO, AND, BRUNEL.**

Effective at once, regular (letter) mails for Netherlands (Dutch), East Indies (including Sumatra), the Straits Settlements, Malay States, Sarawak, North Borneo, and Brunei will be dispatched to San Francisco, Seattle, or Honolulu for onward transmission.

Parcel-post mails for Netherlands (Dutch) East Indies (including Sumatra), the Straits Settlements, Malay States Sarawak, North Borneo, and Brunei will be dispatched via San Francisco, Seattle, or Honolulu.

The general foreign separating scheme on pages 158 and 159 of the annual Postal Guide for 1922 is modified accordingly.

**(19) MAIL FOR POLAND.**

A representative of the department who visited Poland on official business to observe the methods there employed in the receipt and dispatch of mail matter has reported that the delivery of letters and parcels will be expedited if the senders in the United States will include in the address on each piece of mail matter the name of the district or Province in which is located the post office of destination in Poland.

This representative also reported that frequently addressees could not pay the customs duty imposed on new articles of merchandise in gift packages and, therefore, the packages were returned to the senders, even though the larger portion of the contents consisted of articles that were not new, particularly clothing, and would have been delivered if sent alone, without the payment of customs duty.

Because of a number of complaints of alleged tampering with ordinary and registered letters addressed for delivery in Poland, an inquiry was made as to the methods employed in the handling of mails by the postal employees before delivery, and it was ascertained that the resealing by means of small strips of paper and the stamping of covers to indicate the action taken was a precautionary measure to assure the arrival of letters at destination with contents intact. It was learned that there is no censorship of the mail, and the examination made is solely for the purpose of establishing the condition of the mail before delivery.

Wherever possible to have the items of information in the foregoing published in Polish language newspapers, such action should be taken for the benefit of senders, without cost to this department.

**(20) WITHDRAWAL OF UNITED STATES POSTAL AGENCY AT SHANGHAI, CHINA.**

In accordance with the resolution of the Washington Conference on the Limitation of Armament, foreign postal agencies in China are due to be withdrawn by the close of this year. In fulfillment of the obligation incumbent on the Government, the agency maintained at Shanghai by the Post Office Department of the United States will be withdrawn on or about December 31, 1922. Consequently, no mail for this agency will be dispatched from the United States after the 30th of November.

On and after December 1, 1922, all mail matter originating in the United States addressed for delivery in the city of Shanghai, China, will, therefore, be subject to international postage rates and conditions, as in the case of mail matter destined for other parts of China, except that parcel-post packages for delivery in the city of Shanghai (only) will be accepted up to a maximum weight limit of 50 pounds, as per the announcement of the department dated August 1, 1922, and printed on page 17 of the August supplement to the Postal Guide.

Postmasters are particularly cautioned to observe the circumstance that after the 30th of November, and until further notice, parcel-post packages for Shanghai can not be insured or sent C. O. D., there being no provision as yet for the transmission of insured or C. O. D. international parcel-post packages. Parcel-post packages for Shanghai, as well as other parts of China, may, however, be registered.

**(21) CERTAIN PLANTS AND PLANT PRODUCTS FROM ONTARIO, CANADA, PROHIBITED IMPORTATION.**

Pursuant to a regulation of the Department of Agriculture (Federal Horticultural Board), celery, green beans in the pod, beets with tops, spinach, rhubarb, oat or rye straw as such or when used as packing, cut flowers or entire plants of chrysanthemum, aster, cosmos, zinnia, hollyhock, and cut flowers or entire plants of gladiolus and dahlia, except the bulbs thereof, without stems, may be imported from the Province of Ontario, Canada, only if accompanied by a certificate from the authorities of the Canadian department of agriculture to the effect that the plants or plant products have been inspected and found to be free from the European corn borer and other dangerous insect pests and plant diseases: *Provided*, That until further notice the articles above named may be imported from other portions of Canada without restriction under this quarantine.

Section 187 on pages 154 and 155 of the July, 1922, Postal Guide is modified accordingly.

Postmasters will cause careful notice of the foregoing to be taken at their offices, and any packages containing the articles in question received from Ontario, Canada, without the prescribed certificate to be disposed of in accordance with the regulations applicable thereto.

**(22) LOSS OF MAILS BY THE SINKING OF THE VESSEL "SHIRIN."**

By the sinking of the vessel *Shirin*, which sailed from Miami, Fla., for Nassau, Bahamas, on August 11, 1922, there were lost 1 sack of letters, 1 sack of prints, and 2 sacks of parcel-post packages, dispatched from Miami on August 11, 1922, and 1 sack containing 5 parcel-post packages, dispatched from New York, N. Y., on August 8, 1922.



**(23) OFFICIAL CORRESPONDENCE OF CONSULATES EXCHANGED BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND MEXICO TO BE ACCEPTED FREE OF CHARGE FOR POSTAGE UNDER THE PAN AMERICAN PRINCIPAL CONVENTION.**

Referring to the announcement of July 25, printed as item 49 on page 17 of the August Supplement to the Postal Guide, notice is hereby given that under the provisions of article 6 of the Pan American Principal Convention of Buenos Aires freedom of postage is granted, effective October 1, 1922, to the official correspondence of the consulates of Mexico in the United States when addressed for delivery in Mexico and to the official correspondence of the consulates of the United States in Mexico when addressed for delivery in the United States.

For the purpose of carrying out the foregoing, the envelopes, labels, etc., covering this class of correspondence should show over the words "Official correspondence," in the upper left-hand corner of the address side, the name and address of the consul or consulate, as the case may be, as well as the name of the country represented, while in the upper right-hand corner of the address side should appear the inscription "Consular mail" over the word "Free."

**(24) ARTICLES PROHIBITED IN THE REGULAR AND PARCEL-POST MAILS TO CERTAIN FOREIGN COUNTRIES.**

**REGULAR MAILS.**

**Australia.**—Page 179 of the annual Postal Guide for 1922, under heading "Prohibitions," eliminate paragraph reading "All goods bearing the word 'Bosch.'"

**Canada.**—The Postal Administration of Canada has advised this department that the publication entitled "True Confessions," published at Minneapolis, Minn., by Fawcett Publications and edited by W. H. Fawcett, has been placed on the list of publications which are prohibited from circulation by mail into Canada.

Postmasters will please see to it that copies of such publication found in the mails addressed for delivery in Canada are returned to the office of mailing.

The above prohibited publication should be added to the item "Canada" shown on page 144 of the annual Postal Guide for 1922.

**Cyprus.**—Silkworms; eggs of silkworms, except through previous authorization from the director of agriculture; envelopes, wrappers, cards; forms or any papers intended to be distributed or sent by the post or otherwise, or to be employed in any other way, marks of all kinds which imitate the marks or stamps of any post office belonging to the postmaster or to any British postal authority, foreign or colonial, or which resemble the said stamps or marks or which take the place of them, or words, letters, or marks of any kind signifying or implying that a postal article bearing the said words, letters, or marks is sent by His Majesty's service, or reasonably permitting the addressee to suppose that the article is sent by the same service. The same is true of envelopes, wrappers, cards, or any papers bearing similar notations which would be distributed by the post or otherwise.

Letters and any other articles which are contrary to the provisions above indicated may be confiscated, seized, or treated in any other manner authorized by the governor.

These articles should be added to the item "Cyprus" shown on page 144 of the annual Postal Guide for 1922.

**Czechoslovakia.**—This department has been advised that the newspaper "Amerikansky Ruesky Vjestnik" published at Homestead, Pa., has been prohibited importation into Czechoslovakia and postmasters receiving copies of such publication addressed for delivery in that country will return same to the postmaster at Homestead, Pa.

**Kenya.**—Arms, automatic and silent; manufactured articles bearing the name or the address or the trade-mark of a manufacturer or merchant or the name of any place in the United Kingdom or any British possessions, with the intention of giving them the special character of British products, and which are not such products; milk, skimmed, condensed, containing less than 9 per cent of cream; money, false or counterfeit, sterling money of the Protectorate; shaving brushes, Japanese; silver coins in circulation within the Protectorate, or any money taking their place, which is not legal in regard to weight and fineness.

The above articles should be added to the item "Kenya and Uganda" shown on page 147 of the annual Postal Guide for 1922.

**Lithuania.**—Celluloid, articles of; firearms and side arms; gold and silver, articles of, precious stones; labels, stoppers, bottles, and other receptacles bearing inscriptions or trade-marks of foreign firms, or labels, marks, or trade-marks, without the goods themselves; margarine, products of; precious articles; sticks and canes fitted with pomards, swords, and other articles.

These articles should be added to the item "Lithuania" shown on page 148 of the annual Postal Guide for 1922.

**Mauritius.**—Dyes, shells of the sea turtle or of the green turtle designated by the name of "As Kashonans"; turtle oil, except upon authorization of the collector of customs.

**Norway.**—The item "Norway" on page 149 of the annual Postal Guide for 1922 should be modified by eliminating the prohibition against all seeds.

**Sweden.**—This department has been advised that sporting guns may now be dispatched in the mails to Sweden. This modifies the items "Sweden" shown on pages 150 and 207 of the annual Postal Guide for 1922.

**PARCEL POST.**

**Australia.**—Page 179 of the annual Postal Guide for 1922, under heading "Prohibitions," eliminate paragraph reading "All goods bearing the word 'Bosch.'"

**Cyprus.**—Silkworms; eggs of silkworms, except through previous authorization from the director of agriculture; envelopes, wrappers, cards; forms or any papers intended to be distributed or sent by the post or otherwise, or to be employed in any other way, marks of all kind which imitate the marks or stamps of any post office belonging to the postmaster or to any British postal authority, foreign or colonial, or which resemble the said stamps or marks or which take the place of them, or words, letters, or marks of any kind signifying or implying that a postal article bearing the said words, letters, or marks is sent by His Majesty's service, or reasonably permitting the addressee to suppose that the article is sent by the same service. The same is true of envelopes, wrappers, cards, or any papers bearing similar notations which would be distributed by the post or otherwise. The importation of arms may take place only upon special authorization delivered with the consent of the governor.

The above articles should be added to the item "Cyprus" shown on page 185 of the annual Postal Guide for 1922.



**Czechoslovakia.**—According to an order of the Ministry of Commerce, effective at once, canceled and uncanceled postage stamps may now be exported from or imported into Czechoslovakia without the formality of obtaining a special license.

The above should be added to the item "Czechoslovakia" shown on page 185 of the annual Postal Guide for 1922.

**France.**—Fruits and vegetables, fresh, shipments of in general, when the presence of *Doryphora decemlineata* has been detected in such shipments, which shall be examined for that purpose upon their entry into France; potatoes and articles of packing which have served for the transmission of potatoes.

**France.**—Effective at once the importation of real pearls, stones, gems, and cut scientific stones into France is permissible, through the parcel post.

The annual Postal Guide for 1922 is therefore modified as follows:

Page 188, item "France," second paragraph under heading "Prohibitions," sixth line, eliminate the words "pearls, real"; seventh and eighth lines, eliminate the words "stones, gem and cut scientific stones, except stones for industrial uses."

**India, British.**—Plants which are infected by live parasitic insects and which are expressly introduced for the purpose of bringing in such insects may be imported without fumigation.

The above should be added to the item "India, British," shown on pages 194 and 195 of the annual Postal Guide for 1922.

**Lithuania.**—Firearms and side arms; labels, stoppers, bottles, and other receptacles bearing inscriptions or trade-marks of foreign firms or labels, marks, or trade-marks, without the goods themselves; margarine, products of sticks and canes fitted with poniards, swords, and other arms.

The above articles should be added to the item "Lithuania" shown on page 198 of the annual Postal Guide for 1922.

**Norway.**—The item "Norway" shown on page 202 of the annual Postal Guide for 1922 should be modified by eliminating the prohibition against all seeds.

**Sweden.**—This department has been advised that sporting guns may now be dispatched in the mails to Sweden. This modifies the items "Sweden" shown on pages 150 and 207 of the annual Postal Guide for 1922.

(25) PARCEL POST CHANGES.

**Belgium.**—This department is in receipt of a letter from the Brussels office of August 19, reading as follows:

It frequently happens that the senders of merchandise liable to ad valorem import duties to Belgium mention the amount of the invoice in the value column of the customs declarations.

However, in accordance with article 3 of the law of April 8, 1922, the value to be declared for the payment of duties may not be lower than the normal gross price of similar merchandise on the Belgian market at the time of importation, after making deduction of a sum proportional to the duties to which such products are liable upon introduction.

Consequently the customs service finds many cases of undervaluation and inflicts fines in many cases which must unjustly be borne by the addressees.

We shall thank you to give the necessary instructions to your services concerned, with a view to causing the senders to bear in mind the above legal provision when declaring the value for the Belgian customs.

As failure to comply with the requirements of the Belgian law as referred to above may lead to the infliction of fines, postmasters should call the attention of senders of packages to Belgium to the provisions governing the statement of value on customs declarations attached to packages for that country.

**Bulgaria.**—Effective October 1, 1922, senders of parcel-post packages mailed in the United States, addressed for delivery in Bulgaria, will have an opportunity to state the disposition that is to be made of parcels which are undeliverable in that service by stating on a paster attached to the parcel as follows:

- (a) "If not deliverable as addressed, abandon."
- (b) "If not deliverable as addressed, deliver to ——."

Parcels which are not so marked will be returned at the sender's expense.

Parcels will be held for 30 days in Bulgaria before being returned to the sender or abandoned.

Appropriate addition should be made to the item "Bulgaria" on page 183 of the July, 1922, Postal Guide.

**Cuba.**—Referring to section 22 on page 6 of the Postal Guide for May, 1922, it may be stated that this department has been advised of the continued receipt in the mails of a large number of packages of merchandise for Cuba which are closed against inspection or which exceed 4 pounds and 6 ounces in weight.

Postmasters are, therefore, cautioned not to accept such packages for mailing to Cuba, reference being had to paragraph (c) of section 1, to sections 2 and 3 on page 132 and to section 5 on page 133 of the Postal Guide for July, 1922.

**Great Britain.**—This department is in receipt of the following letter from the London office relative to the manner of packing of articles destined for Great Britain:

I am directed to inform you that parcels containing soft or light goods are frequently received from the United States in bad condition, in consequence of the inadequacy of the packing provided by the senders; and much time is spent by the British Post Office in making them secure. The packing usually consists of brown paper and string only.

The Postmaster General will be much obliged if you will be good enough to take such measures as may be practicable to insure the adequate packing of parcels sent to Great Britain.

Postmasters will please see to it that the matter is given the proper attention in order that no further complaint will be received relative to the inadequate packing of articles addressed for delivery in Great Britain.

**Mesopotamia (Iraq).**—Effective October 1, the transit rate applicable to parcel-post packages mailed in the United States addressed for delivery in Mesopotamia (Iraq), will be changed to read as follows:

The following notices were issued from the Bureau of the Third Assistant Postmaster General—W. IRVING GLOVER, Third Assistant:

**(28) REMITTANCES OF SURPLUS FUNDS.**

It has come to attention that many postmasters at offices of the third and fourth class do not promptly deposit postal funds when they amount to \$50 or more. Careful attention is therefore invited to paragraph 28 of order No. 7597 in the June, 1922, Supplement to the Official Postal Guide, from which it will be seen that when the surplus funds on hand at offices of the third and fourth class, including money orders paid from such funds, amount to \$50 or more they should be immediately sent to the central-accounting postmaster.

Pending payments expected to occur within 15 days may be deducted in computing the amount of surplus funds, but whenever the excess is more than \$50 the entire amount must be promptly remitted to the central-accounting postmaster.

**(29) NEW POSTAL SAVINGS POSTERS.**

There is being sent to every post office designated as a postal-savings depository a large poster advertising postal savings for display at advantageous points in post-office lobbies. Post offices having branches and stations designated to receive postal-savings deposits are being sent additional copies.

Additional copies of the new poster are available on requisition to the Director, Postal Savings System.

**(30) SEPARATE ADVICES OF MONEY ORDERS DRAWN ON CANADA AND OTHER COUNTRIES.**

The attention of postmasters at all money-order offices is urgently called to section 55, page 90, of the Postal Guide for 1922, and to the contents of Table 4, to be found in paragraph 49, page 88, of said Guide.

It is of the utmost importance that a postmaster when issuing a money order drawn for payment on any one of the countries enumerated in Table 4 shall at the same time prepare a separate advice on Form 6006 and dispatch it direct to the paying postmaster, in accordance with the provisions of the Guide above stated.

This bureau receives so many complaints from the postal administrations enumerated in Table 4 as to failure to comply with this rule that postmasters are urgently enjoined to strictly observe it.

**(31) USE OF FORM 6339 AS AN AID TO IDENTIFICATION.**

The department is constantly in receipt of complaints regarding the failure of postmasters to make use of Form 6339.

Postmasters are hereby directed to instruct issuing clerks that when a money order is drawn in which the remitter and payee are the same and the purchaser wishes to have the order paid at another office, the signature of the remitter-payee should be procured on Form 6339 and transmitted to the paying postmaster with a separate advice of the order. If Form 6339 is not available, a slip of paper bearing the signature should be forwarded with an explanation of the case. See in this connection amended section 1127 of the Postal Laws and Regulations.

**(32) MONEY-ORDER INQUIRIES ON FORMS 6002, 6006, AND 6126 SHOULD BE ADDRESSED TO MAIN OFFICES AND NOT TO BRANCHES OR STATIONS.**

The attention of postmasters at all money-order offices is directed to the fact that communications addressed to offices having branches or station with regard to money-order business must be forwarded to the main office. The name of the branch or station concerned should appear on the letter but in such position as not to show when window envelopes are used.

By careful observance of these instructions much correspondence and annoyance will be avoided, especially in cases where inquiries are made by use of Forms 6002, 6006, and 6126.

**(33) MODIFICATION OF METHOD IN DRAWING HONGKONG ORDERS.**

Beginning October 15, postmasters in drawing money orders on Hongkong will discontinue the practice of delivering the money-order form to the remitter for transmission to the payee. Every such order issued in the continental United States or in Alaska must accompany the advice and coupon which are sent to the San Francisco exchange office for certification. Every money order issued in Hawaii must accompany the advice and coupon which are sent to the Honolulu exchange office for certification.

As hitherto, payment will be made abroad on the original Hongkong order which, therefore, must still be fully and carefully made out and must not be marked "canceled." Moreover, when the payee and remitter are Asiatics, the latter must furnish on Form 6083 a supplemental statement in his own writing and language of the full name and exact



address of the payee, and this supplemental statement must be attached to the money order, advice, and coupon and sent with them to the exchange office.

Postmasters and money-order clerks at all international money-order offices, branches, and stations will exercise special care to comply exactly and literally with these instructions, as failure to do so will result in delay and inconvenience to the public and consequent discredit to the money-order system.

#### (34) RETURN CARD ON WINDOW ENVELOPES.

It has been reported that at various post offices throughout the country large numbers of window envelopes are being mailed which do not bear the return card of the sender as required by the regulation governing the use of window envelopes, and, consequently, such letters may not be dispatched, the resulting delay frequently causing embarrassment and inconvenience to the senders and addressees.

Postmasters are reminded and will so inform patrons that window envelopes must bear in the upper left corner of the address side the return card of the sender, which, to be complete, must show his name and address or the number of the post-office box rented by him in lieu thereof, when the post office is one having city delivery service, as well as the name of the post office and State. (See art. 106 on p. 24 of the July, 1922, Postal Guide).

Postmasters should take such steps as may be necessary to stop the use of window envelopes which do not bear the return card of the sender.

#### (35) SHORT-PAID PACKAGES OF PORTIONS OF PUBLICATIONS RETURNED BY NEWS AGENTS.

Some news agents and dealers are mailing to publishers and other news agents packages containing the covers, headings, or other incomplete portions of publications with postage prepaid at the transient second-class rate.

Such packages weighing 4 pounds or less are properly subject to postage at the third-class rate, while packages weighing more than 4 pounds are subject to the fourth-class zone rates. (See par. 7, sec. 446, and par. 7, sec. 463, P. L. and R.) Postmasters are, therefore, requested to see that the correct amount of postage is collected on packages of this character.

LOOK OUT FOR SHORT-PAID MAIL—PROTECT THE POSTAL REVENUE.

#### (36) COMPLAINTS REGARDING MISTREATMENT OF UNDELIVERABLE SECOND-CLASS MATTER.

It appears from information received that many postmasters are not strictly complying with the provisions of sections 640, 641, and 642, Postal Laws and Regulations, with respect to the treatment of undeliverable second-class matter in that no notices whatever are sent or the notices are incomplete. Attention is therefore invited to the regulations mentioned and the instructions on page 31 of the July, 1922, Postal Guide, and postmasters are urged to see that the required notices on Form 3578 are furnished and to exercise special care in the preparation of the notices so that all the information called for thereon, including the postmark of the office from which sent, shall be legible, and that copies of undeliverable publications returned under label Form 3579 shall bear an indorsement showing the date upon which notice was sent the publisher on Form 3578.

#### (37) ADDITIONAL PLANT INSPECTION PLACE IN STATE OF WASHINGTON.

Postmasters in the State of Washington are informed that provision has been made for the terminal inspection of plants and plant products at Everett, Snohomish County, and this place should, therefore, be added to the list of places within the State of Washington to which plants and plant products subject to terminal inspection may be sent by postmasters for inspection under the provisions of section 478½, Postal Laws and Regulations.

#### (38) EXTENSION OF QUARANTINE ON ACCOUNT OF EUROPEAN CORN BORER.

Referring to article 61, on page 25 of the February, 1922, Supplement to the Postal Guide, relating to Quarantine Order No. 43 of the United States Department of Agriculture on account of the European corn-borer infestation, postmasters are advised that this quarantine order has been extended so as to include certain newly infested areas, the additional infested areas being located as follows:

*Massachusetts.*—Attleboro, Berkley, Dighton, Fall River, Norton, Rehoboth, Seekonk, Somerset, and Swansea, in Bristol County; Acton, Holliston, Hudson, and Marlboro, in Middlesex County; Foxboro and Norfolk, in Norfolk County; Southboro, in Worcester County.

*Michigan.*—Bedford, Exeter, and Ida, in Monroe County.

*New York (Eastern).*—Goswams, in Albany County; New Baltimore, in Greene County; Canajoharie, Minden, and St. Johnsville, in Montgomery County; Cherry Valley, in Otsego County; Pittstown, in Rensselaer County; Carlisle and Fulton, in Schoharie County; Cambridge, in Washington County.

*New York (Western).*—Freedom, Machias, New Albion, and Yorkshire, in Cattaraugus County; Clymer, Ellington, and French Creek, in Chautauque County; Wales, in Erie County; Alabama, Batavia, and Pembroke, in Genesee County; Cambria, Lewiston, Lockport, Newfane, Pendleton, Porter, and Wilson, in Niagara County; Attles, Bennington, Middlebury, Orangeville, Perry, Sheldon, and Warsaw, in Wyoming County.

*Ohio.*—Austinburg, Harpersfield, Plymouth, and Sheffield, in Ashtabula County; Independence, Newburg, and Warrensville, in Cuyahoga County; Margaretta and Perkins, in Erie County; Chardon, in Geauga County; Amherst, in Lorain County; Allen, in Ottawa County; Townsend, in Sandusky County; Lake and Ross, in Wood County.

*Pennsylvania.*—Conneaut, Elk Creek, Franklin, Washington, and Wayne, in Erie County.

Under the provisions of paragraph 1, section 478, Postal Laws and Regulations, the acceptance for mailing of the plants and plant products referred to in Quarantine Order No. 43 from the infested areas is subject to the restrictions of that order, and postmasters will be governed accordingly.



**(39) NEW 11-CENT POSTAGE STAMPS, 1922 ISSUE.**

1. Postmasters and other officers and employees of the Postal Service are notified that the department has issued a new 11-cent postage stamp. It is the first stamp of a new series which will replace the present issue of ordinary stamps known as the series of 1912.

2. A description follows: The stamp is the same shape and size—seventy-five one hundredths by eighty-seven one hundredths inch—as the present series of stamps, and is printed in peacock-blue ink. The central design is a portrait of Rutherford B. Hayes within an oval and is partly inclosed in a panel which is supported on either side by acanthus scrolls. Above the portrait in a curved line appear the words "United States Postage" in white roman letters. On a ribbon below the oval is the name "Hayes," and under this, at the bottom of the stamp, appears the word "Cents." In both lower corners within ovals with dark backgrounds are the white numerals "11." The entire stamp is inclosed within a cross line border with small triangular ornaments in both upper corners.

3. The first issue of the new 11-cent stamp will be placed on sale October 4, 1922, at Fremont, Ohio, in connection with the celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the former President's birth. They will also be placed on sale October 4, 1922, at the philatelic stamp agency, Division of Stamps, Post Office Department, for the benefit of stamp collectors and dealers.

4. The new 11-cent stamp will not be issued to postmasters until the present supply of the current issue is exhausted.

**(40) CHANGE IN PRICES OF TREASURY SAVINGS CERTIFICATES.**

The Secretary of the Treasury, on September 16, announced the discontinuance at the close of business September 30, 1922, of the sale of the issue of Treasury savings certificates of the \$1,000, \$100, and \$25 denominations at the prices of \$90, \$80, and \$30, respectively, and the placing on sale, beginning October 2, 1922, of new Treasury savings certificates of like denominations and maturity value at selling prices of \$82, \$82, and \$20.50, respectively. At these selling prices the new certificates yield approximately 4 per cent interest, compounded semiannually, if held until the date of maturity, five years from the date of issue. If redeemed before maturity, they yield about 3 per cent simple interest.

The certificates previously supplied to postmasters positively must not be sold after September 30. The new certificates are indicated by a different sequence of serial numbers and are printed in different tints from the old, and postmasters should use great care to avoid confusing the two issues. The serial numbers of the new \$1,000 certificates begin above 200,000; \$100 certificates above 5,000,600; \$25 certificates above 1,000,000.

The \$1 Treasury savings stamps were withdrawn from sale, effective at the close of business September 30, 1922. They must not be sold after that date.

A supply of the new certificates was sent to postmasters at all accounting offices. Central-accounting postmasters, promptly on receiving their supplies, were instructed to furnish on credit to each district postmaster a supply of the new certificates in accordance with existing instructions. The new issue is to be accounted for in the same manner as provided in the July, 1922, Postal Guide, except for the change in the selling price. Central-accounting postmasters were supplied with a sufficient number of copies of these instructions to inclose one copy with each initial shipment of the new certificates to district postmasters.

Prompt requisition should be made in the usual manner for needed additional supplies of the new issue.

The present accounting forms 334 and 334b will continue in use until a modified form is printed. Accounting postmasters should alter with pen columns 1, 2, and 3, forms 334 and 334b, to conform to the new selling value of the new issue of Treasury savings certificates.

Copies of a poster announcing the change in prices of Treasury savings certificates have been mailed direct to postmasters at all offices issuing Treasury savings certificates. This poster should be displayed prominently in the post office for the information of the public. New leaflets of information will be furnished by the Government savings organization.

Detailed instructions for the recall of the stock on hand of blank Treasury savings certificates of the present issue and of the stock of unsold \$1 Treasury savings stamps have been sent by this department to all accounting postmasters. Central-accounting postmasters were instructed to give necessary instructions to postmasters at district offices for sending in their supplies.

**(41) RIGHTS OF HOLDERS OF TREASURY SAVINGS CERTIFICATES.**

The Treasury Department has issued a revised edition of Circular No. 149, "Regulations concerning United States Treasury savings certificates," dated August 1, 1922, replacing the circular of the same number described in a notice published in the Postal Bulletin under date of January 20, 1922, and as notice No. 64 on page 26 of the February, 1922, Postal Guide. Copies of the new circular, for officer reference, will be sent by this department to the postmasters at all offices issuing Treasury savings certificates. Additional copies may be obtained by postmasters or the public by addressing the Secretary of the Treasury, Division of Loans and Currency, Washington, D. C. The provisions of the new circular apply to all issues of Treasury savings certificates.

The Secretary of the Treasury writes to the Postmaster General as follows:

"Apart from a considerable number of minor changes, I would particularly call your attention to the provisions for the reissue of Treasury savings certificates, in case of the death of the registered owner, in the name of the designated beneficiary or other person entitled, at the option of such beneficiary or other person, which are set forth in Sections XI to XIII of the circular. The purpose in permitting such reissue was to obviate the hardship of enforcing redemption prior to maturity in case of the death of the registered owner, when the certificates, if held to maturity, would have considerably increased in value. I believe that this change in the regulations substantially increases the desirability of Treasury savings certificates for investment."



Appended to the circular are copies of revised forms to be used in connection with applications for payment of Treasury savings certificates under special circumstances, as follows:

Form L. & C. 273.—Application of undertaker, doctor, or other preferred creditor for payment of Treasury savings certificates.

Form L. & C. 274.—Application by beneficiary for payment or reissue of Treasury savings certificates.

Form L. & C. 275.—Application for the issue of duplicates or for payment of lost, stolen, or destroyed Treasury savings certificates.

Form L. & C. 276.—Application for payment or reissue of Treasury savings certificates held by deceased owner to person other than a duly appointed legal representative or preferred creditor.

Form L. & C. 277.—Application by parent or person with whom infant resides for payment of Treasury savings certificates registered in name of infant.

Form L. & C. 279.—Application of executor or administrator for payment or reissue of Treasury savings certificates.

These forms may be obtained by the claimants, as the need arises, from the Secretary of the Treasury, Division of Loans and Currency, Washington, D. C. Postmasters who find it advisable to keep on hand a small stock of any of these forms, for the benefit of patrons, may apply direct to the Secretary of the Treasury, Division of Loans and Currency. The specimen forms appended to the circular may be detached and used, if desired, when others are not available.

#### (42) POSTAGE STAMP SUPPLIES FOR HOLIDAY MAILINGS.

1. The personal attention of all postmasters is directed to the necessity of submitting requisitions for extra stocks of stamps needed for holiday mailings further in advance than has been the practice heretofore in order to relieve congestion in the mails and the extra expenditure for car service which has been necessary in the past, due to heavy shipments of stamped paper being made after the holiday rush begins. With the cooperation of every postmaster it is believed that all, except emergency, shipments can be made by December 1.

2. In order to provide for the filling of these requisitions before December 1, postmasters at all direct and central accounting post offices having storage space available are directed to submit requisitions for extra stock as promptly as possible after October 15. Postmasters at post offices having less storage space may submit requisitions after November 1, but all requisitions for this surplus stock should reach the department not later than November 25.

3. Postmasters at district post offices are directed to replenish their stocks of postage stamps in November during the designated periods of the month and to suspend all requisitions for stamp stock to central accounting postmasters during December, except in emergencies. Where necessary, a temporary increase in fixed credit will be given post offices of the third class upon application to central accounting postmasters.

4. It is particularly important also that shipments of postal cards and plain stamped envelopes be reduced to the lowest possible amount during December and direct and central accounting postmasters should submit requisitions for additional stocks needed before January 1 as early as practicable after the receipt of this notice.

5. The department expects all postmasters to give this matter careful attention in order that all unnecessary shipments of stamp stock can be eliminated during the month of December.

6. The attention of postmasters is also called to the importance of continuing the use of 3-cent stamps on parcel-post and other mailings, requiring this or a larger amount of postage, in order to reduce the present excess supply in the department. Direct and central accounting postmasters will, therefore, include as large quantities of this denomination in requisitions for holiday mailings as can be disposed of in this manner.

#### (43) SALE OF EXTRA-QUALITY ENVELOPES TO BE PROMOTED.

1. The department has on several occasions published notices inviting postmasters to bring to the attention of stamped envelope users the superior qualities of "extra-quality" envelopes which are now supplied in all current sizes except the No. 3. While the demand for these envelopes has been increasing, it has not yet reached such proportions as to warrant the department in assuming the public has become aware to any great extent that such desirable envelopes as these are available. This view is substantiated by the numerous letters received from the public asking if envelopes of better grade than standard quality can be furnished. It is believed that many postmasters have not been able to inform patrons properly with respect to extra-quality envelopes through the lack of samples and that the action taken by the department to provide all office-request envelopes in extra quality beginning August 1 will be the means of bringing them to the attention of patrons more effectively than ever before.

2. In order to further promote the popularity of extra-quality envelopes it is desired that plain envelopes of this variety be carried in stock in all post offices where envelopes are sold in considerable quantities, and patrons calling for 25 or more envelopes given an opportunity of purchasing them in lieu of standard quality. Extra-quality envelopes, being banded in packages of 25, will appeal to most purchasers and facilitate the handling of envelopes at stamp windows. The attention of purchasers may also be called to the slight difference in cost, 2 cents for 25 of the No. 5 size. Postmasters at all presidential post offices will submit requisitions on the proper forms for such additional stocks of plain extra-quality envelopes as will be needed to meet the requirements, following these instructions.

3. All patrons ordering special-request envelopes should be shown samples of extra-quality and the desirable features explained before orders for standard quality envelopes are accepted, provided the purchaser has not previously been informed.

4. Extra-quality envelopes are banded in packages of 25 and packed in special boxes of 250 envelopes each. The paper used in the manufacture having a bursting strength test of 35 points compared with 25 for standard quality and a weight of 28 as compared with 25, insures greater opaqueness, added strength, and superior writing surface. The special boxes used in packing extra-quality envelopes and the separate box-board shipping containers in lieu of tie-sacks used with package orders of standard quality envelopes reduce damage to the envelopes in transit to a minimum. These facts should be explained to purchasers.

5. The cooperation of all postmasters in advising patrons of the advantages offered in using extra quality in lieu of standard quality envelopes is earnestly requested.



**(44) RETURN RECEIPTS FOR ARTICLES ADDRESSED TO FOREIGN COUNTRIES.**

The postal administration of Lettonia reports the receipt from the United States of many registered letters which bear the notation, "Return receipt requested," but which are not accompanied with the form of return receipt (Form 3870) required to be sent with registered articles for foreign countries in those cases where the senders have requested return receipts. Postmasters at all the United States exchange offices and at other post offices which have been authorized to prepare and attach the foreign return receipt blank (Form 3870) will exercise care to see that the proper form, correctly filled out, is attached to each registered article for foreign destination in those instances where the senders have requested a return receipt.

**(47) UNSEALED REGISTERED PARCELS OF NOMINAL VALUE FOR CUBA TO BE DISPATCHED THROUGH THE WASHINGTON, D. C., POST OFFICE BY POSTMASTERS IN INDIANA, KENTUCKY, MICHIGAN, OHIO, AND WEST VIRGINIA.**

Commencing October 1, 1922, all postmasters in Indiana, Kentucky, Michigan, Ohio, and West Virginia will dispatch toward Washington (or in registered jackets, inner registered sacks, or through registered pouches), addressed to the postmaster at Washington, D. C., when the quantity or the bulk warrants the make-up of jackets, sacks, or pouches, all unsealed parcel registered mail of apparently nominal value addressed for delivery in any post office in Cuba. Letter registered mail, and unsealed parcels of apparently more than nominal value should be given the same dispatch and treatment as heretofore.

This arrangement is made so that unsealed parcel registered mail of nominal value intended for delivery in Cuba may be assembled in Washington, D. C., as an exchange office for Cuba and dispatched direct to Key West, Fla.

Any postmaster frequently having sufficient parcel registered mail of nominal value addressed for delivery in Cuba to warrant in his opinion a direct registry dispatch to any office in Cuba will so advise the Third Assistant Postmaster General (Division of Registered Mails) stating the quantity and bulk of registered articles which would probably be involved for each post office in Cuba and how frequently the dispatches are made, in order that the advisability of direct dispatches to certain offices in Cuba may be determined.

**(46) COIN AND SIMILAR OBJECTS CONTAINED IN LETTERS PRESENTED FOR REGISTRATION TO BE SECURELY PREPARED FOR MAILING.**

The Chief Inspector has reported that a number of cases under investigation by his office relating to the loss of coin from registered letters indicate that postmasters are failing to observe the requirements of section 881 of the Postal Laws and Regulations relative to the acceptance of registered letters containing coin improperly prepared for mailing.

Postmasters are therefore requested to carefully read and observe the instructions in section 881 of the Postal Laws and Regulations as to the manner in which coin or heavy articles should be prepared for transmission as registered mail and also the instructions in articles 4 and 5, page 84, and article 10, paragraph (d), page 96, of the July, 1922, Postal Guide.

**(47) C. O. D. PARCELS ADDRESSED TO PHILIPPINE ISLANDS SUBJECT TO ADDITIONAL FEE ON DELIVERY.**

This office is in receipt of advice from the postal administration of the Philippine Islands that because the revenue derived is below the cost of handling a fee of 10 cents gold (United States currency) will be collected on each C. O. D. parcel from the United States delivered in the Philippine Islands, effective November 1, 1922.

This fee collected in the Philippine Islands is in addition to the C. O. D. charges and the Philippines money-order fee.

Postmasters will please advise interested patrons accordingly and give this notice the widest possible publicity without expense to the department.

**(48) INSTRUCTIONS REGARDING EXAMINATION OF C. O. D. PARCELS.**

In regard to the notice issued in the daily Postal Bulletin of July 29, 1922, directing attention of postmasters to the regulations which prohibit postal employees from permitting examination of contents of C. O. D. parcels by addressees before delivery has been effected and the charges paid, and wherein it was requested that reports be made to this office in cases where mailers print such permission on the wrappers of their C. O. D. parcels, it has been noted that a number of these reports refer to postal inspection of sealed parcels mailed at the fourth-class rate of postage in accordance with amended section 469 of the Postal Laws and Regulations.

It should be understood that the notice prohibiting examination of C. O. D. parcels by the addressee before delivery has been effected does not apply to the inspection of such parcels by postal employees.

**(49) FAILURE TO RETURN SENDER'S COUPON WITH MONEY ORDERS FOR C. O. D. PARCELS.**

Numerous complaints have been received regarding the failure of postmasters to return with the money orders issued as remittances for C. O. D. parcels, the sender's coupon such as is authorized in article 53, page 115, of the July, 1922, Postal Guide and used by some firms for identification purposes.

Particular attention of postmasters and postal employees is directed to the instructions appearing in article 57, page 115, of the July, 1922, Postal Guide. Failure to comply with these instructions has been a source of continual annoyance and complaint, and has caused a great deal of dissatisfaction with the service.

All postmasters are expected to cooperate in an effort to have the sender's coupons returned with the money orders in all instances and to observe the instructions and regulations regarding C. O. D. mail in order that the best possible service may be rendered.



**(50) TREATMENT OF "PLEGGED" AND "PERISHABLE" UNDELIVERABLE C. O. D. PARCELS.**

Despite the efforts of this office to procure the proper treatment of undeliverable C. O. D. parcels at offices of address complaints still continue to be made by patrons of the service in connection with the action of some postmasters in requesting such patrons to furnish return postage covering undeliverable C. O. D. shipments, bearing *return postage guaranties*, or indorsed "PERISHABLE."

Postmasters are directed to see that the provisions of amended sections 595 and 637, Postal Laws and Regulations; also the provisions of article 35, pages 112 and 113, July, 1922, Postal Guide be brought to the attention of their employees, in order to preclude the necessity of complaints being made in this connection with a consequent criticism of the efficiency of the Postal Service.

The following notices were issued from the Bureau of the Fourth Assistant Postmaster General—H. H. BILLANY, Fourth Assistant:

**(51) INFORMATION REGARDING REPORTS TO BE MADE BY POSTMASTERS FOLLOWING THEIR INSPECTION OF RURAL ROUTES.**

Postmasters having rural routes from their offices are required to make an inspection of the routes within the months of April and October of each year. Section 748, Postal Laws and Regulations, prescribed that reports of such inspections shall be submitted to the Fourth Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Rural Mails, on Form 4248 and that a copy of each of such reports shall be kept in the files of the post office.

The section of the regulations mentioned was amended on the 15th instant to provide that when an inspection shows no changes practicable, and the postmaster has no recommendation to make, reports are to be filed in the post office. If changes are deemed necessary, reports will be made in duplicate, the original to be sent to the department the duplicate being retained in the post office.

The amended regulations should be followed in connection with the inspection of the service, to be made during October.

A circular letter in regard to this matter will be sent to all postmasters concerned within a few days.

**(52) USE OF ROADS BY RURAL AND STAR ROUTE CARRIERS.**

It has been brought to the attention of the department that in some instances rural carriers have caused trouble to road contractors by tearing down barricades and by disregarding warning signs. This has occurred in connection with Federal aid road projects. It causes unnecessary annoyance, and often results in damage to the roadway and delay in completion of the work.

It is desired that postmasters remind carriers that neither rural nor star route carriers have any special privileges in the use of public roads, and that they are not warranted in ignoring instructions given by duly constituted authorities, nor in removing barricades erected for the protection of roads under construction or repair.

Rural carriers are required to serve their routes in accordance with instructions of the department and as officially described, and star route carriers must follow the routes contemplated by the terms of the contracts and advertisement and the instructions of the department, except in cases of emergency, when necessary deviations shall be made so that as nearly full service shall be rendered as may be practicable.

**(53) RURAL MAIL BOX.**

The following-named concerns have submitted models of rural mail boxes to the department which have been approved, and the makers have been authorized to sell the approved boxes at not exceeding the prices listed:

The Madewell Pipe & Culvert Works, East Twelfth Street and Twenty-fifth Avenue, Oakland, Calif., No. 1 box, f. o. b. Oakland, \$1.50.

S. W. Buckwalter, R. F. D. No. 4, Dayton, Ohio, No. 1 box, f. o. b. cars or post office, Dayton, Ohio, \$2.

**(54) SUPPLIES.**

Many special requests on letterheads and miscellaneous scraps of paper for blank forms, books, and miscellaneous items are received at the Division of Equipment and Supplies of this bureau: as a matter of fact, the number of special requests received exceeds the total of all regular periodical requisitions. This is contrary to the instructions contained on page 74 of the Postal Guide for July, 1922, particular reference being had to paragraphs 1, 2, 3, and 4.

It is absolutely essential that postmasters and postal employees anticipate their need for postal supplies of all kinds and forward formal requisition on the proper requisition blank at the regular requisition period. This will result in a material reduction in the number of requisitions required to be handled by said Division of Equipment and Supplies.

It is not the purpose of the department to decline to honor such requests at times other than as directed, it being assumed that these special requests in some cases are unavoidable, but such special requests must be reduced to an absolute minimum and the need for blank forms, books, and miscellaneous supply items anticipated at the time of the submission of the periodical requisition.

**(55) PRINTED FACING SLIPS.**

Printed facing slips for use at post offices of the third and fourth classes, and for railway postal clerks, may be obtained at the expense of the purchaser, at the rate of 18 cents per 500 in lots of 500 to a form, or 23 cents per 1,000 in lots of 1,000 to a form, from the Mail Printing Co., Spearfish, S. Dak.

Do not order less than 500 slips of any one title.

Transportation charges must be paid by requisitioning officers.



**(56) INSTRUCTIONS FOR ORDERING PRINTED FACING SLIPS.**

In the future when requisitioning ordinary printed facing slips, postmasters and railway mail officials are requested to list in groups of like quantities, the various titles desired, using Forms 1581 and 5364, respectively. List the smaller quantities first, and have the others follow in regular sequence.

Example:

- 1,000—Wellsville, N. Y.
- 1,000—Penn. Term. R. P. O. — P. P.
- 2,000—Detroit Term. R. P. O. — P. P.
- 2,000—Ash. & Lou. Tr. —.
- 2,000—Cin. & Nash. Tr. — States.

Disregard the instructions in paragraph 3, reverse side of Form 1581, which reads "Titles must be arranged in alphabetical order."

Do not order less than 1,000 slips of any title, and when more than 1,000 are desired, order in multiples of 1,000.

The listing of quantities in regular order will greatly facilitate the printing of facing slips for the Postal Service.

Postmasters must order strip labels in accordance with instructions printed on Form 1578, and railway mail officials will conform to instructions issued by the general superintendent.

**(57) PRINTED FACING SLIPS AND STRIP LABELS.**

Postmasters and railway mail officials are enjoined to have all clerks preparing requisitions for facing slips and labels use care when ordering these items, particularly as to the quantities desired, proper abbreviations and correct spelling of titles, and names of towns and cities. The requisitions are forwarded to the printer and used as his copy.

One postmaster at an office of the first class recently forwarded a requisition to the department for 85,000 strip labels, and it was found that the names of the towns for 85,000 of the quantities desired were incorrectly spelled. For example, Monterey was written Montery, and Falls City was written Fall City. More care must be exercised in the preparation of requisitions for slips and labels.

Frequently requisitioning offices will order 600, 900, or more strip labels for use in dispatching first-class mail on a certain train. As a train with a given number leaves a town or city only once a day, 300 labels will care for the dispatching of one sack each day for 300 days. Please do not order in excess of the actual need.

The department does not desire to furnish strips or labels to any point of the Postal Service for a period of more than one year.

The minimum quantity of facing slips allowed is 1,000 of any one title, and the minimum quantity of labels allowed is 500 of any one title.

**(58) TWINE.**

Many communications have been received from postmasters throughout the country pledging their support and the support of their employees of the program of the department, which must be maintained during the present fiscal year, for the conservation of twine.

It is necessary that all postmasters and all postal employees cooperate in this endeavor in order that the actual consumption of twine may be kept within the appropriation allowed by Congress, which is one-third less than the appropriation for the last fiscal year.

Economy in the consumption of twine must be practiced in all branches of the service. Will your employees do their share?

**(59) FRAGILE TAGS.**

With reference to the discontinuance of "Fragile" tags, Form 5133, postmasters and other officials having a supply of these tags on hand may now dispose of them as waste postal material.

The following notices were issued from the office of the Comptroller—**CHARLES A. KRAM**, Comptroller:

**(60) INSTRUCTIONS TO CENTRAL ACCOUNTING POSTMASTERS.**

Central accounting postmasters are directed to send delinquent notices to all district postmasters whose accounts are not received within five days after the close of each quarter, and a second notice should be sent on the 10th to each postmaster who is still delinquent. On the 15th day of the month following the close of each quarter, a delinquent report should be made in duplicate, one copy to be sent to the Comptroller of the Post Office Department and the other to the post-office inspector in charge of the division headquarters. In making up these lists do not include accounts which have been returned to postmasters for correction.

In adjusting district postmasters' accounts, any difference in favor of the postmaster may be adjusted by a cash remittance. Differences of \$5 or less in favor of the United States should be indicated on the account, and will be reported to the district postmaster in due course when his account is audited. If the balance due the United States is more than \$5, the postmaster should be directed to remit the amount due at once. If remittance is not received by the 20th, enter the balance on the account and forward with the other district office accounts to the Comptroller of the Post Office Department.

Each central accounting postmaster is directed to prepare and forward his quarterly account with all supporting vouchers, district office accounts, abstracts, and summaries to the Comptroller of the Post Office Department within 20 days after the close of each quarter.



**(61) PROMPT RENDITION OF DISTRICT POSTMASTERS' ACCOUNTS.**

Each district postmaster is directed to prepare and forward an account within three days after the close of each quarter to his central accounting postmaster. Use new Form 1545a, third class, or 1558, fourth class.

Each district postmaster authorized to transact money-order business should also inclose in the same envelope a quarterly list of money orders issued, Form 1846, accompanied with the spoiled forms and a remittance letter, Form 1842, with sufficient cash items or paid money orders to balance his account.

**(62) PROMPT RENDITION OF FIRST AND SECOND CLASS POSTMASTERS' ACCOUNTS.**

The postmaster at each first and second class post office (except central accounting offices) is directed to prepare and forward to the Comptroller of the Post Office Department a quarterly postal account with all supporting vouchers, abstracts, and documents within 30 days after the close of each quarter.

## INSERT NO. 789. ORDER NO. 7999.

Paragraph 1, section 293, Postal Laws and Regulations, is hereby amended to read as follows:

1. Postmasters at offices of the first, second, and third classes shall be granted, upon application, 30 days leave of absence with pay and, when necessary, 30 days with pay on account of personal sickness, each fiscal year. Sundays and holidays are not included in annual or sick leave but must be counted in all other leave.

## INSERT NO. 790. ORDER NO. 8060

The first paragraph of section 748, Postal Laws and Regulations, is amended to read as follows:

Postmasters shall supervise the work of rural carriers and see that they perform their duties in an efficient manner, and shall keep themselves informed as to the conditions of the routes attached to their offices, and the business transacted on them. Postmasters shall make trips of inspection over the rural routes twice each year, within the months of April and October, such inspections to be made without expense to the department. If the inspections show no changes practicable, and the postmaster has no recommendations to make, reports are to be filed in the post office. If changes are deemed necessary, the reports will be prepared in duplicate, the original submitted to the Fourth Assistant Postmaster General, Division of Rural Mails, and the copy filed in the post office.

Should any be presented, refuse payment, wire the post-office inspector in charge of your division, and also the Third Assistant. Similar action must be taken in case of the theft of forms.

When notice of the theft of money orders is received, immediately examine the coupons of paid orders to ascertain whether any orders bearing the numbers and name of the office advertised have already been presented and collected. If any are found, report the fact, without loss of time, to the Third Assistant Postmaster General, and await instructions. If the payment was recent, use the telegraph, stating the number of the order.

To provide against payment of stolen orders postmasters should conspicuously post warning notices where they can be readily consulted by the paying clerks.

Exercise unusual caution in paying orders issued at any of the offices named on this card, even though numbers differ from those printed hereon.

Business men should be cautioned not to accept money orders from strangers without satisfactory reference.

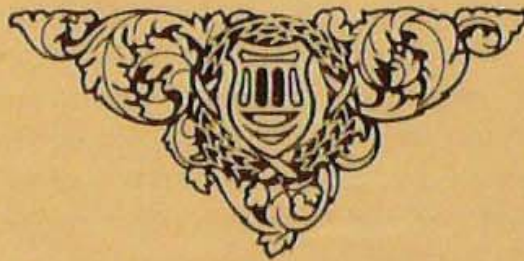

## *Rural Carriers in Attendance upon Conference-Conventions*

---

*There being no funds available for the maintenance of service over a rural route during the absence of a carrier, except when granted annual or sick leave with pay, the following three suggestions are offered as a possible means of enabling rural carriers who either have no annual leave or do not desire to take it for such purpose, to attend the Conference-Conventions in their respective States:*

*FIRST: Postmasters may, where practicable, advance the schedule on the day the Conference-Convention is held, if this will permit the carrier to complete service and return to the post office in time to attend.*

*SECOND: At offices where there is more than one rural carrier, any carrier may be excused to attend the Conference-Convention who can arrange to have his route served by a fellow carrier after the latter has completed service over his own route. In cases where this is practicable, the postmaster is directed to cooperate by adjusting the schedules of the two routes so as to permit such an arrangement.*

*THIRD: A carrier may, at his own expense, employ a bonded substitute or some member of his family who is qualified to serve in his stead.*

*When the arrangement made necessitates a deviation from the official schedule, due notice of the schedule to be observed and of the reason for the change, should be given patrons in order that no confusion may result.*

*In case any one of the suggestions is followed, no report of the absence of the carrier should be made to the disbursing postmaster. However, should a carrier prefer to take his annual leave for the purpose of attending the Conference-Convention, his absence should then be reported in the regular way.*

*It must be distinctly understood that the three suggestions offered are to be followed only for the purpose of permitting carriers to attend the Conference-Conventions.*
